November Communion Offering Benefits Loaves & Fishes & Food Bank of Contra Costa & Solano Counties



As we begin our transition from fall into the holiday season this month, we remember and support two local organizations who are caring for and feeding local families, seniors and children who are hungry, the working poor and homeless segments of our society. Your generous giving through our November Communion Offering on Nov. 2 benefits Loaves & Fishes Family Kitchen of San Jose, and the Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano Counties in Concord.





For the last 34 years, the Loaves & Fishes Family Kitchen has provided, free, hot meals to families, seniors and the working poor. What began years ago as a simple meal of bread and fish for eleven adults and fifteen children, now serves as many as 1,000 healthy meals per day. According to a 2012 University of Santa Clara study, hunger affects 44% of children and 12% of seniors in the Santa Clara valley. These meals, served at three San Jose locations, remove one large concern off the worry list for the low-income people this program gladly serves.

Your Communion Offering giving will help Loaves & Fishes buy kitchen supplies, meal ingredients and support their Goodwill and shelter meal delivery service. In addition, it will fund seeds, seedlings and materials needed to grow fresh produce for Loaves & Fishes at Father Larry's Farm, and fund campaigns to end hunger. The other beneficiary of our November Communion Offering is the Food Bank of Contra of Contra Costa & Solano Costa & Solano Counties. This

organization works to feed hungry families, adults and seniors and provide farmer's market vouchers in the counties they serve, raise awareness of hunger and issues related to food, and reduce food waste. Your Communion Offering giving helps these families stretch their limited income and provides a better quality of life.

Under the leadership of Lee Rust, our church regularly sends teams to the Food Bank's warehouse in Concord to help sort and prepare food for distribution. Lee led a team of about 25 adults and youth on this fall's Mission Saturday to the Food Bank. In a mere two hours, they packed up 160 boxes of produce, which represents about 5,400 lbs. of fresh produce! This means people from our community who may be experiencing a difficult time, will be able to enjoy fresh fruits and vegetables as a result of this Mission Saturday team's hard work.

If you're interested in serving in this way, Lee is hosting another mission team trip to the Food Bank, on January 17 from 11:30 a.m.-1:30pm. There *is* No Place like Home!



Every day in our own community, hundreds of families including hundreds of children, go to sleep homeless. In fact, Contra Costa County has one of the highest rates of homelessness in the nation, despite also being home to some of the country's wealthiest individuals.

Fortunately, Hope Has a Home through Contra Costa Interfaith Housing (CCIH), and San Ramon Valley United Methodist Church is already helping through our ongoing support. Currently, CCIH is serving over 700 low-income, at-risk residents, including over 300 children, in our community. But CCIH needs your help.

CCIH's Annual January Auction, Ruby Slippers, generates a significant portion of CCIH's annual budget, and we need SRVUMC's help again this year. Each member faith community for CCIH, including SRVUMC, is being asked to donate auction items for the silent auction portion by having members of the congregation select items from an "Auction Board" to purchase and donate. This auction board will have approximately 10 suggested items ranging from approximately \$100-\$500, such as two bottles of wine, a golf foursome, a camping starter set, a spa gift card, etc. The items were selected based on what people in the past bid on the most. So look for Jeff Rideout between services with the CCIH Auction Board- it is fun and an easy way to help. Buy A Student A Meal

Hello all, I pray all is well with you and your loved ones.

I hope all of you enjoyed James Lazarre's visit and sermon.

In his sermon he said to you that "You are in Mission EVERY day with your gifts of love, talents, money and time". I am proud to be his mentor and to work with him in this initiative.

I am proud of our church and of our efforts to help those in Haiti to a better life. You are actively in Mission.

Not long ago, our congregation raised over \$20,000 for water purifiers and we have installed 10 of them and they are giving clean drinking water to over 1000 people every day. Today we are again seeking your assistance with providing funds for food to the children in these schools. For 3 years we have fed children daily and as of now we have 2 lunch programs in operation and are serving 400+ meals each day during the school year. Each meal cost 50 cents and is purchased in country at the local markets. This is our only cash flow need and since we come to know these children, and many of you are pen pals with them, we ask that you find it in your heart to help in this very important need.

In most cases this one meal is the only meal the child will receive in that day. God bless you


Here are some new ones you'll find on the library cart on Sunday, November 2. Watch for them!

Outliers MALCOLM

Kindness Matters Corner

Must Kindness Be So Unusual?

The news seems to be full of stories of kindness and "paying it forward" events. Why are acts of kindnesses so often reported, almost advertised? Why can't acts of kindness merely be a way of life, like breathing for instance? Is each breath reported, is it a big deal, is it something to be admired? Why can't kindness be ingrained in us like breathing?

One quite ordinary act of kindness caused a friend to ponder this question and think of the contrast between an act of kindness and almost any other type of act. It began in a local coffee shop, a woman friend of mine stood behind a young man who was obviously the office "go-for." He had a list of half a dozen orders, special orders every one—you know very few people drink just coffee anymore. She watched this poor fella as he moved into the "making sure" phase of his purchase, making sure all orders were correct, all orders

were received, all orders had a better than fair chance of reaching the office without spilling while retaining heat.

As the young man gave the last order, his own, to the server, my friend said, "Here, please, let me buy your coffee for you." The young man couldn't believe it! Here was a woman who, for no reason other than kindness, was buying his coffee! He couldn't contain himself, and he almost stumbled as he expressed his thanks and joy for the \$3 gift. You would have thought he had hit the jackpot from this act of kindness. The young man's reaction caused my friend to consider the contrasts between kindness and other acts.

My friend's thoughts were these: Each day many people trudge through as if they are wearing raincoats. It is

let it just run off

of them. Consider the negative actions that come your way or that you observe in just one day. The range of settings and the unkindness's tossed our way are unending. We trudge along while the increasing severity of unkindness results in fog, mist, sporadic raindrops, steady rain, hail, or sleet, and each smacks against us and our raincoat. Sometimes with the wind's help, we're physically pushed. With the exception of very unkind acts, we adjust and just deal with it. Most times there is nothing to do, but accept it. It isn't worth the trouble; it isn't worth the risk of receiving further unkindness. We accept it, and we move along, eyes down, looking at what is immediately before us. There is really nothing

anyone can do, but accept it.

But then, somehow the clouds part, the bright sun shines through, and, without advance notice or fanfare, a woman buys a cup of coffee. The raincoat comes off because who needs it now—a kindness has been given to me. Thank you, thank you! Let's begin a campaign to remove the raincoats worn by those close to us, right now.

When it was all said and done, I had to tell my friend, "You know, if kindness becomes the norm, then I'm out of a job!"


Afternoon Book Group

Have you ever been watching a sporting event where one of the teams played like they were falling apart at the seams? The pitcher giving up run after run. The defensive line that just can't stop anyone. It's a mess. Finally the coach calls it: "Time out!" He brings the team in, takes a moment to regroup. He adjusts and recalibrates to get his team ready to get back on the field and face their opponent.

The same goes for life.

Everything can be going well. You're happy at work. The kids are excelling at school, and they are even getting along with each other at home. Life seems pretty perfect. Then overtime something happens. Not overnight and maybe even so gradually that you don't notice it. But one day you wake up and it seems like nothing's going right and everyone is grumpy. Something is off. Something is broken. And everyone needs a time out. There are just some things that need an adjustment.

You always have something to be grateful for.

- Take time to say "thank you."
- Take time to adjust your attitude.
- Take time to celebrate what God has done.
- Take time to remember how others have helped you.

God wants to work in your life and the lives of your kids to tweak some things in your character. In a lot of ways, He's taking a time out and making adjustments to conform you to the image of His Son. In those times, it's like God is pulling us over to the side and reminding us when we need to recalibrate a few things. And it makes sense, really. If God made us, He knows what we need to give attention to. That's why it's important to pay attention to His instruction manual and what He has to say about certain attitudes. Take the idea of GRATITUDE, for example. If we never take the time to acknowledge what God has done in our lives or how others have helped us, we may develop an unhealthy ego or a growing frustration at the people around us. We might become bitter and complain about every little thing.

That's why GRATITUDE is a really big idea that God talks about so much. It affects more of your life than you probably have ever imagined. That's why we're taking this month to talk about what it means to show GRATITUDE: letting others know how they've helped you. Sometimes gratitude takes a little bit of intentionality. Sometimes, you have to literally take a time out and remember what you have to be grateful for. A great way to do that is through giving.

Our format of two youth groups a week (one for High School, one for Middle School) has been working out quite nicely. We've seen several new youth from outside of the church coming to check out our youth group. Our Edge Youth Worship on Sundays has been blessed with great music from the Youth Band under the direction of Teri Hawk. Sometimes, I think it can be easy to overlook how blessed we are with young people at this church. I would like to share with you an excerpt from my sermon on October 19th to illustrate how I see our church making a difference in young people's lives:

In our time of strategic planning and visioning for our faith community, Pastor Ron often brings up a simple question.... If "San Ramon Valley United Methodist Church Disappeared tomorrow..., in what ways would the community around us notice?"

Well, I can tell you in my relatively short time at this church I have seen our Youth program help young people make better decisions about drugs, alcohol and unhealthy relationships.

I have seen this church help families deal with addiction.

I have seen this church help get youth through the fact that their parents are separating, and family life will never be the same.

I have seen this church be the one place youth feel comfortable enough to share that they are suffering from abuse and need help to get free of the situation.

I have seen this church be a place where youth can reach out for help before making the decision to try and end their lives.

I have seen this church provide mission experiences that allow youth to see that the world is very different outside of our little valley. Where there is work that they can do to bring a positive impact for those who are as not as fortunate as we are.

I have seen this church bring a child who hasn't smiled in weeks to belly laughing with joy.

I have seen this church bring young men to tears because they can finally vent all the difficult things that are going on in their life out loud.

Do you realize that this church is one of the only thriving Christian youth ministries in the San Ramon Valley that allows space for youth to ask questions about who they are attracted to or love?

Do you realize there is not another Christian space with a critical mass of youth in our community where the ideal of Open Hearts and Open Minds can be explored and lived???

We have something truly special and unique here. We have something that God is using in powerful ways.

Thank you to all those who make the San Ramon Valley United Methodist Church a place that welcomes Youth. A place that allows a safe space for them to realize how much they are loved, and how much of a positive impact they can have on the world around them.
