As we move through our current series of sermons on "The Once and Future Church," we are thinking about the challenges that we face as we move through what Bill Easum has called, "a crack in history." This is the term that he has used to describe this period of profound change and upheaval in our culture—a time in which institutions (including the Church) that once played a central role in our culture are now viewed with suspicion and even hostility. According to Easum and Loren Mead (author of "The Once and Future Church), the Church must adjust to the changes and challenges that it currently faces, or it is not likely to have a future.

With that sobering assessment in mind, we have been thinking and, hopefully, talking together about the ways in which we might respond to this challenge of change. There isn't, of course, one specific blueprint or template that we can follow as we carve out our path. There isn't a "one size fits all" approach that can be adopted. Each congregation must find its own way

our courtyard and make it into a more hospitable area for our Sunday morning coffee hour and other gatherings. Our meditation garden is also being redesigned to accommodate small gatherings such as weddings and outdoor communion services. As you, no doubt, have noticed, we have taken initial steps to "open up" the chancel area in the sanctuary by downsizing our pulpit, lectern and worship table while slightly increasing the square footage of the chancel itself.

These physical changes to our facilities and landscape are being made in the hope of making our campus more useable and adaptable to the needs of our ministry in the future. In effect, these efforts are "pouring the foundation" upon which we will build our various ministries and programs in the years to come.





Church Council Q & A

Continued from the September 2016 Newsletter

Last month, we explored how the Church Council relates to San Ramon Valley United Methodist Church. We also saw a list of its various responsibilities to the church as a whole. We also saw an explanation of the Charge Council, which links SRVUMC to the general United Methodist Church. This month, we continue the discussion with a look at the internal organization of the Church Council.

How is the Church Council organized?

The Council Chair and Vice-Chair, Co-Lay Leaders, Secretary and Chairs of Trustees, Staff Parish and Finance were appointed to the Administrative Board by the Church Conference on November 17, 2015. These positions transitioned to the Church Council on March 1, 2016.

The Chair of Strategic Development & Implementation, a new position, was filled by Jim McKnight, who volunteered for the position. Also, the Co-Chair of Nominations and Lay Leadership (formerly Committee on Lay Leadership) was filled by Fred Toney, a then-current member of that committee. These appointments will be recommended for ratification by the Church Conference in November 2016.

The Practice Groups are new. The Administrative Board asked

those who agreed to chair the Groups to serve, and they agreed to do so. These appointments will also be recommended for ratification by the Church Conference in November.



Church Council Report

The Church Council met at 7:00 p.m. August 16 in the Fireside Room.

Co-Lay Leader Lea Hickman reported that she and Co-Lay Leader Debra Brady have received feedback from the congregation regarding diversity (gender and age) in leadership roles at SRVUMC. Fred Schreiber, with 45 years of experience in Human Resources, will attend the next Council meeting to lend perspective on this matter.

Finance Committee representative Rhonda Poole reported that **income and expenses through July were favorable to budget.** Finance is optimistic that the year may close with a surplus.

The 2017 budget process starts earlier this year with initial draft budget to be submitted to stakeholders for input. Finance Committee's goal is to recommend a budget to the Council at the October meeting.

Finance Committee's recommendation to allocate funds to the Council Reserve Fund for this year will be presented at the next Council meeting.

Paul Kuelz, Risk Taking Mission & Service Practice Group Chair, reported that the refugee family from Yemen relocated from Daly City to Foster City. Catholic Charities East Bay and the United Methodist Circuit refugee task force, under Liz Bayat's leadership, had hoped to move them to the East Bay where services would be more readily available for them. The refugee task force will assess the situation and continued funding of the family. A way forward will be reported back to the Council at the next meeting.

Mission Saturday will be on Sunday, September 18. Two mission outreach opportunities will be available for families: Habitat for Humanity Playhouse Build of 2 playhouses and Stop Hunger Now packing of 15,000 meals. Other service opportunities will follow in upcoming weeks. The trip to the UMCOR depot in Salt Lake City and the Guatemala mission trip to deliver wheelchairs are almost fully staffed with volunteers.

Trustees Chair Mark Miller reported that significant trenching will begin in the parking lot on September 20, which will temporarily reduce parking spaces through October. And, although the ARC project is currently a couple of months behind schedule, the contractor remains optimistic that construction will be completed in February 2017.

Jim McKnight, Vice Chair and Strategic Development & Implementation Chair, complimented Children's and Family Ministries' efforts in developing and promoting the proposed children's facility space, the **Tot Spot**, as an instrument in implementing the SRVUMC strategic initiative to *Develop Thriving Family Ministries*.

The following list of guidelines to support the **Tot Spot** proposal were discussed:

- A Child Care license (like Preschool) will not be pursued at this time.
- A fee will not be charged for child care service at this point.
- Two attendants will be present when children are in the facility.
- Parents of children must remain on campus during the duration of the child's stay at the facility.
- Stephanie Ham will post the conditions that exist for the parents so they can read them when dropping off their children.
- Approximate cost to the church to establish this facility: Children's Ministries \$6,000, BOT \$2,000.

The Council approved a motion to set up a Tot Spot childcare service in Lamm Hall for the purpose of encouraging families with children to utilize these facilities and ultimately join in the ministries of our church.

Jim presented a decision-making process for committees and groups to follow for use of space on campus. A committee or group identifies needs for space and presents a request to the Board of Trustees. Trustees will evaluate the request and make a proposal to the Council for approval.

Jim reported that the Mission Council will merge with the Risk Taking Mission & Service Practice Group as the Council structure continues to be fine-tuned. He also reported that the Practice Group chairs continue to nail down their committees and fill openings.

Fred Toney, Co-Chair Nominations & Leadership Development Committee, reported NLDC is in the process of filling positions on Committees and Practice Groups for next year. He encouraged the Committee and Practice Group Chairs to identify and submit names to the NLDC, specifically looking through the lens of diversity regarding age and gender.

Staff Parish Relations Committee Chair Don Field reported that the search for the **Director of Youth** has produced a promising candidate but would require that the position be

filled as a full-time position. The Council approved the position as full-time.

Beth McClelland has taken on the position of Cherub Choir Director.

Laura Sanchez of MLK Peacemakers reported a new program, *The World Has Met Itself: The Dynamics of Interfaith Spirituality and Practice,* led by Thomas P. Bonacci, Director of The Interfaith Peace Project of Antioch, CA. began at the Church beginning September 22, and met four Thursday evenings in September and October.

Laura also reported that the MLK Peacemakers is changing its name to Peace and Justice Committee. ND will have more of an advocacy role than in the past.

The minutes of the August 16 Church Council meeting and written committee reports are posted on the Church website.

Council meetings are currently scheduled for 7:00 p.m. on the third Tuesday of each month in the Fireside Room. The Council will meet September 20, and again on October 18. All are welcome to attend.

WINTER NIGHTS 2017





Feel free to skim these chapters but don't miss her hilarious, heartwarming, strange chap-

ters about her ongoing relationship with her lab partner, Bill. These two are true soulmates—with no romantic entanglement—who live in their lab, love their subject and are smart enough to expand our knowledge of the world. 


