Bon Zanmi Boulanje (Good Friend Bakery)

An Update from Haiti

I am speechless and caught flat-footed that the solar oven goal was reached so quickly. Wow!

Our church continues to bring good things to Haiti through missional visits and hands-on and in-kind contributions, as well as continued financial assistance to feed children.

The results of this project will not only feed more kids, but also will be an asset to the community. The Bon Zanmi Boulanje Bakery is planned for opening in 2019. With your contributions of over \$16,000 plus a matching donor's grant of \$15,000, you have brought the fund to \$31,000 for the bakery project. We have also received \$15,000 from Mt. Olivette UMC in Arlington, Virginia. All of these funds will be used for the bakery equipment once the building is ready. We are actively seeking funds for the facility.

The project has now engaged a Haitian architect involved with the design, and we have met with local government agencies in regards to the requirements and permits. It will be professionally built and meet standard American building codes. The bakery building will begin as a 460 sq. ft. masonry block building, as modern as those you would find in the US. Storage will be made from the cargo container that the ovens were packed in for shipping.

The bakery is planned for the IMEC School, a school we support, on its campus in Arcahaie. Solar ovens will be the center of the cooking. Each oven can produce over 1,000 meals daily and will feed all of the students in our project.

The bakery is also to have a storefront to sell baked goods and other fast food. Wholesale Baked goods are also planned to be sold to establishments along national Hwy 1, such as hotels, bars and restaurants.

This enterprise will be a giant step to self-reliance for the schools by providing not only lunches but also an income stream to support the schools.



Church Council Report

The Church Council met on May 16 and June 20, 2017.

ARC

Bob Baker led a tour of the ARC, which is substantially complete. The County issued the Occupancy Permit June 23. A basketball camp for youngsters, "Wolfpack Basketball," is scheduled for June 26 to 30.

Jim Burk, interim ARC manager, reported he has lined up quality renters for the ARC and has a waiting list of potential renters. All-church nights will be scheduled for designated activities. The facility will be open 90-plus hours per week as follows: Monday-Friday 7 a.m. to 9:30 p.m.; Saturday 8 a.m. to 9:30 p.m.; Sunday noon to 6 p.m. *The dedication ceremony for the ARC is scheduled for Sunday afternoon, September 10.*

Finance Committee

Through May, total income is \$37,468 over budget, with total expense \$4,900 under budget, resulting in a favorable variance to budget of \$38,615. The year-to-date net surplus in the General Fund is \$71,552.

Pastor Ron plans to propose the creation of a **Mission Service Fund** with the goal of inviting small groups from our Church to team with small groups from other churches for service work, Bible study, meal sharing, discussion, etc. This would be an

opportunity to pay forward the generosity that has been extended to our Church, such as the ARC, sanctuary, and courtyard remodeling.

The Council approved the Finance Committee's recommendation to adopt a **Policy Allocation of Undesignated Gifts.** The policy sets forth guidelines for allocation of bequests or other gifts not designated to fund a specific group or activity within the Church.

Staff Parish Relations Committee

Rev. Lorraine McNeal has been named interim Associate Pastor, effective July 1.

Meet and Greet sessions with Pastor Lorraine are scheduled.

Laura Roy has been hired as full-time Director of Children's and Family Ministry, effective June 26, 2017.

A search is underway to fill the vacant Director of Youth Ministry position. Carrie Metcalf and Susan Dunn were recognized for stepping up to manage the Youth Program in the absence of a Youth Director.

Anne Burk and Susan Doran were recognized for their fine efforts in producing the celebration and going away event for Pastor Luke, Stephanie and Caleb.

In February, the Council charged SPRC to perform an assessment of SRVUMC's current staffing structure to determine the effectiveness and efficiency of the structure by July 1, 2017. SPRC concluded that the only change called for now is to reduce the Associate Pastor position from full-time to three-quarter time, resulting in a net savings of \$26,908. Another benefit of the study is that SPRC members and Church staff increased overall understanding how work is done at the church and how each position adds to the greater whole. SPRC recommends repeating the process in the coming year as the Associate Pastor position is interim, the needs of the ARC will be clarified, and other staff positions can be addressed as appropriate.

Youth Council

Chair Carrie Metcalf reported on the Youth Council's efforts to carry out youth activities over the summer. The houseboat trip scheduled for the last week of June was **cancelled**.

Strategic Development & Implementation

A new graphic visual description for executing the strategic initiatives was presented by the strategic planning steering committee. Representatives from the ARC, the Preschool, Music, and Youth will be included on the steering committee.

Board of Trustees

The BOT received responses to the **congregational survey regarding serving alcohol on campus.** Findings will be discussed at the July Council meeting.

Missions and Service

Mission Sunday is scheduled for October 8. Only one service will be held, followed by a playground equipment build and food packing. Additional service opportunities will be available during the week preceding Mission Sunday.

The minutes of the May 16 and June 20 Church Council meetings, written committee reports, and other documents mentioned above, are posted on the Church website.

The next Church Council meeting will be held on Tuesday, July 20, 2017 at 7:00 p.m. in the Fireside Room. All members are welcome to attend.

ARC VOLUNTEERS AS ASSISTANT MANAGERS STILL NEEDED

Over the last two years, we have recruited volunteer Assistant twelve men and women who are excited about helping to Managers for two reasons. First, we wish to have staff on site during the entire time the ARC is open so as to watch over the facility and to assist those people and organizations who are using the gymnasium. The ARC, as approved by the County, is allowed to be open from 7:00 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. on Monday thru Friday; and 8:00 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. on Saturday; and from 12:00 noon to 6:00 p.m. on Sunday. Whether we will be able to consistently fill the ARC with recreational activity during these 92 hours will be tested in the days and months ahead.

Second, if we are able to successfully recruit volunteers from our congregation to fill these important staff positions, then we can save significant expense dollars and facilitate our desire to have the ARC cover our expenses each week, month, and annually. It also gives us the opportunity to test our ability to prove that we can cover our expenses and run a recreational operation on a sound financial non-profit basis.

Our objective is to recruit enough personnel such that the challenge to cover this large number of hours is not a burden to any one of our volunteers. We currently have a roster of

provide coverage. However, we still could utilize additional people who are truly interested in helping us with this objective, and for which the physical challenge of these positions is well within their capabilities. Also when you factor in the personal situations that can arise such as temporary illness, or the desire to take vacations, you can potentially never have enough staff coverage.

July Communion Offering

This month, our Communion offering supports two organizations serving the needs of local families for decades.

STAND! For Families Free of Violence

<u>STAND!</u> For Families Free of Violence is a Bay Area organization committed to eliminating family violence. They offer "a complete spectrum of prevention, intervention and treatment programs." Specifically, STAND!




provides children's therapy, childcare and children's educational programs to abused children and children impacted by domestic violence. The organization also trains legal and law enforcement personnel, human services professionals, educators and healthcare providers.

STAND! Against Domestic Violence began in the 1970s as a single telephone line in a utility closet in Contra Costa County. By the 1980s, the dedicated volunteers who staffed it had built their organization into one of the Bay Area's leading domestic violence community services. Meanwhile, another organization, Family Stress Center, was expanding its services to include parenting education, the Latino Family Program and Proud Fathers. The two nonprofit agencies cooperated to share effort and skills. In 2010, they unified as STAND! For Families Free of Domestic Violence, and today this organization is the sole provider of comprehensive services for those impacted by domestic violence in the region.

Monument Crisis Center

Based in Concord, <u>Monument Crisis Center</u> offers nutritious food and other resources to families in Central and Eastern Contra Costa County. Last year, Monument provided about one million meals to its clients.





International of Pleasant Hill and independent donors, while enthusiasm came from area high school students. Today, Monument serves over 4,000 different households per year, and each distribution serves between 80 and 120 families. The group purchases food from the food bank, but it also receives private food donations.

Monument's core effort is food distribution, but it is not its only program. Additionally, this organization:

- Provides a Youth Enrichment Program, offering after-school tutoring, a teen center and summer camp for school-age kids.
- Hosts a resource fair annually, acquainting visitors with opportunities for employment, health and wellness, and English language classes available locally.
- Provides lunch and bingo through the Senior Moments program, as well as health screenings and some groceries with this opportunity to socialize for senior citizens.







Come to view a series of 30-minute lectures by noted New Testament scholar Bart Ehrman of UNC Chapel Hill. So far, we have covered the diversity of early Christian movements, including the Gnostics. These groups eventually died out, and their texts did not make it into the canon (e.g., the Gospel of Peter or The Secret Gospel of Mark). However, some of their theology did survive and is being revived today.

At the end of each video, we typically have a lively discussion. These series will cover the history of the Orthodox Christian movement, which includes the formation of the New Testament canon, the Orthodox corruption of the Scripture, and the early Christian creeds.


All are welcome. No reading is necessary, although Dave does send out an outline of each video prior to class.

Hyde, Catherine Ryan. Take Me With You. Burned-out science teacher August Shroeder has not had a drink since his nineteen-year-old son died. He plans to do what he does every summer—tour the West in his RV, but this year will be very different, because only Philip's ashes are going with him. When his van breaks down and he's short of money for the repairs, he gets a surprising offer from the mechanic. "Take my two boys with you—

I have to serve a 90-day sentence and have no one to take them. Drop them off here at the end of summer—and I'll repair your van for nothing." At first August refuses, but as the boys stand there, barely breathing with excitement, he reluctantly relents. Watch three lives being changed and prepare for a lump in your throat.



Jenoff, Pam. The Kommandant's Girl.


How brave would you be, and which compromises would you make, when the stakes are very high? Emma Gershmann had been married only six weeks, and never believed she would deny her Jewish heritage, pass as a Gentile, and become a German Kommandant's assistant—and much more to him. But she was desperately afraid for her parents confined in the Krakow ghetto, and her fervent young

husband who had left to fight in the Resistance. How far would she go to protect them and perhaps learn information that might help them and save countless lives? Compromises were made. A page-turner.



Smith, Dominic. The Last Painting of Sara de Vos. Ellie Shipley is a brilliant young art student who consults in art restoration when she agrees to paint an exact copy of a rare Dutch masterpiece. She knows this is art forgery but the technical challenge intrigues her. Over 40 years later, Ellie is a respected art historian and curator mounting an exhibition of Dutch paintings when she learns two respected museums have each sent that painting to

her exhibit. One of them will be her forgery and almost certainly destroy her life and career. What to do now?



Vance, J. D. Hillbilly Elegy; A Memoir of a Family and Culture in Crisis.

An elegy is defined as a mournful or melancholy lament, and that is certainly what J. D. Vance is putting forth in this eloquent and astonishing account of his hillbilly childhood. Product of a truly dysfunctional family, he recounts with a clear eye the shocking life that almost broke him, but recognizes the power of family love and loyalty-and the U.S. Ma-

rines—to change lives. His grandmother, Mamaw, swears like a sailor and has dubious opinions on many issues, but is his constant haven of safety and fountain of common sense. Memorable.
