Church Council Meeting Takeaways

July 18, 2017

Board of Trustees Makes Alcohol Policy Recommendation; Motion Passes to Hire New Youth Director

Some brief notes from the Church Council meeting, made by the newsletter editor. *These bullet points should not be equated with more complete, detailed meeting minutes.*Monthly minutes are posted on the church website.

Remember, monthly Church Council meetings are open to all members.

- ARC: The ARC completed its 23rd day of operation as of this Council meeting with a gross income of over \$6,800; Volunteers have proved hugely important in reducing expenses. Currently, volunteers number 15 to 20, but more adult volunteers—especially those who can assist in the physical work of setup and take-down—will be needed as the youth volunteers return to school. On the horizon: ARC Commission will eventually manage ARC operations. Jim Burk is still drafting job descriptions for this commission.
- **Building Commission:** ARC dedication ceremony slated for Sunday, September 10 at 4 p.m.
- Board of Trustees (BOT): The Board has reviewed the results of the alcohol survey and recommends no change in the existing alcohol policy at this time.
 The survey among church members had a 75% response rate. Two thirds of respondents were female, and 88% of

respondents report some alcohol consumption in their private lives. While roughly two thirds of respondents favored permitting alcohol consumption on the church campus, the question of serving alcohol at church-related functions (like the Crab Feed) resulted in a nearly even split. The intensity of opposition, together with liability concerns, informed BOT recommendation. After significant lively debate, the Church Council voted to adopt the Board's recommendation.

- SPRC: Motion to hire Jamere Crawford as Youth Director passes. Currently, Jamere holds a part-time position in youth ministry in Lafayette while pursuing his master's degree in social work. The position at SRVUMC is a full-time post with responsibilities that have been covered through much of the spring and summer by very dedicated (but tired!) volunteers. No start date for Jamere yet.
- **Budget:** Total June income is \$16k favorable to plan, down from last month. The favorable number offers some cushion through the summer months, traditionally a low giving period. Rhonda Poole's detailed budget report was made available at the meeting.

Estate Planning Thoughts from the Endowment Committee

Some people have accrued a sizable sum in tax deferred retirement accounts. These accounts provide a comfortable back up for pension income. However, there are some disadvantages when you withdraw funds from these accounts. Upon death, state and federal taxes must be paid on the funds. Also, as individuals exceed 70.5 years in age, a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) tax must be paid on the income. This income, added to regular pension income, can push the income into a higher tax bracket.

Congress has made permanent a rule that permits a donation from the deferred account to an approved charitable organization (maximum \$100,000). Such a gift can cover all or a major portion of the RMD. This provides several benefits. The RMD income is not added to your gross income, the amount in your IRA is reduced for later taxes, no taxes are due for the donated RMD funds and you have enabled a charitable organization to extend its services.

You may want to discuss this possible gift with your tax advisor.

The annual conference met to conduct the business of the California-Nevada conference, to inspire, and to stay connected.

Bishop Minerva G.Carcano is the new bishop following the retirement of Bishop Brown. Her priorities for our conference:

- Minister to all people, especially the marginalized
- Work in our district circuit to renew congregations and help plant new ones
- Align ministries with the in Carcano, shown here the United Methodist Church's four areas of focus

More Developments

- A new, fifth district (Bay District) was created
- The 2018 conference will elect new delegates who will attend a specially called 2019 General Conference to talk about gender issues, tolerance of differing opinions and how to remain in one Church
- Resolutions on public education and transgender justice
- Resolution in support of the election of Bishop Karen Oliveto, an openly gay individual
- Resolution on welcoming the migrant
- Retirement of Revs. Dawn Boyd and Heather Hammer

The Bishop Awards saw four recipients this year, and four other awards were given. Ordination services were held for nine elders in full connections and two deacons, six provisional elders and one provisional deacon were commissioned. A memorial service honored thirty clergy, spouses and one certified lay minister. Powerful and inspirational speakers preached to over one thousand attendees.

I love being a voting laity for our Church at the conference. Participating in the legislative process; meeting new people; catching up with friends and previous pastors; receiving communion with hundreds of people; and hearing God's Word in so many different and inspiring ways are uplifting and growing experiences that Holy Conferencing provides.

The conference will be in Modesto next year.

As a first-time Lay member to the Annual Conference, I did not know what to expect from my four days in Burlingame. My only experience with Church business was at our own Church Council or Charge Conference meetings, and I certainly couldn't imagine four days of that!

Fortunately, the Annual Conference was so much more than committee reports and motions. I found it to be an interesting and moving look into the inner workings of our larger UMC community. For me, these were some of the highlights.

The Speakers

Not surprisingly, the UMC is blessed with a number of gifted speakers. During the conference, this talent was on full display. Greg Bergquist, Associate General Secretary of GBHEM, delivered a beautiful and moving Memorial Service for the clergy and spouses that have passed in the last year. Conference Lay Leader, Michael Pope, spoke eloquently of the vital role of laity in our Church. Our own Kathi McShane and Debra Brady gave interesting updates on the Core Team and Conference District changes respectively.

But unquestionably, Erin Hawkins, the General Secretary of GCORR and the Conference Keynote Speaker, gave the most inspiring and rousing talks of the Conference. She reminded us of our role within the Church and our larger communities. She emphasized the importance of understanding and sharing our faith stories and brought the assembly to their feet more than once. If you ever have a chance to hear this amazing person speak, please go. You will be rewarded!

Way Forward

As many of you are aware, the divide within the UMC over human sexuality and the resulting questions about the unity of the church led to the creation of the Commission on a Way Forward. Brian Adkins, the pastor of Open Door UMC in Richmond, CA and a member of this Commission, reported on the progress he sees to date. As an openly gay pastor, he brings an important perspective to the Commission. Fortunately, he is encouraged by the relationships he has built within the group and the progress he believes they have made. August Communion Offering

Our August communion offering will support the Wheelchair Foundation Mission trip. We will be returning to Guatemala on January 27 to February 3, 2018. We will again be delivering 100 wheelchairs in Antigua and Guatemala City, but we need your support. Each wheelchair costs \$150 delivered to each respective location, where we will personally present them to each deserving individual. We will combine with Asbury UMC in Livermore and Lynnewood UMC in Pleasanton on this mission trip. Changing Lives in Guatemala

"Serving the World" Imagine, if you will, never having walked due to a birth deformity; losing a leg to diabetes or other health challenge; or being disabled in a tragic accident...and suddenly the gift of mobility comes into your life. That was the blessing we offered to many during our wheelchair mission to Guatemala in January 2017.

Through the generous donations of the **Asbury, Lynnewood and the San Ramon Valley United Methodist churches**, a team from those churches traveled to Guatemala to distribute 100 wheelchairs in partnership with the Wheelchair Foundation and the Rotary Club of Guatemala City.

This was a remarkable opportunity to engage with families that had no means to purchase a wheelchair. They carried, carted or hobble-walked a family member everywhere. Our recipients included disabled and mobility challenged children, adults and seniors.

Our first delivery was to Virgen Del Socorro in Antigua. This long-term care facility, run by the Franciscan Order of the Catholic Church, is for children and adults with permanent disabilities, who will never go home. Many of these are children and young adults who suffer from Cerebral Paralysis. Their care is provided free of charge.



While in Antigua, we also visited the Hospital of Santo Hermano Pedro, a charity hospital that turns no one away, and only charges what a person can afford. This Franciscan hospital provides medical services by local staff and travelling physicians from around the world. We were blessed to meet a doctor from the U.S., who was there for two weeks performing orthopedic surgeries. We were particularly touched by how children with cleft palates, club feet and other congenital deformities received help and hope.

Our second donation was to a senior community, Hogar Margarita Cruz Ruiz, in Guatemala City. Established by three sisters, this home, a lovely converted hacienda, provides

compassionate care to elderly women who have no place else to go. It was amazing to see mobility limited women slip into their new wheelchair for the first time. Previously, the staff would physically carry these patients to meals, chapel and open space. Our hearts leapt with joy as we experienced this moment. It is a level of dignity they so deserve.

Our largest distribution was at an event in Guatemala City sponsored by the Rotary Club. It was overwhelming to walk into an outdoor pavilion filled with anxious families selected to receive a wheelchair. One by one, each family was called to the front to accept the wheelchair. One by one, we collectively celebrated the grateful, beaming recipient and their family. It was one of the most heartwarming moments you can imagine and one of the most humbling.

We delivered what seemed like an endless stream of wheelchairs. To see a very young boy experience mobility for the first time in his life, brought tears to our eyes. This little boy had only known life as his loving and patient mother carried him, on her back. Adults who had lost a leg, or seniors who could no longer walk on their own, were simply grateful beyond words. As our host, Alejandro, said, "You changed many lives today." My goodness, we did, with great love, in the name of Jesus Christ. Amen.







ahead of their time. And yes, when they needed to, they all learned to handle a gun!


