A Parsonal Point of View ~

Under Reconstruction

“Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?”

—Isaiah 43:19

As you are well aware, we are currently undergoing a period of reconstruction. For the next several months, our worship location will be shifted to Wesley Center as our Sanctuary gets a “facelift” that will include an expanded chancel area, a new organ, a new roof, and facing for the front of the church. Also included in this reconstructive effort will be a retrofit of the Sanctuary to help ensure earthquake safety. It is, as you can appreciate, quite an undertaking!

At the same time, we as a congregation are likewise, undergoing a period of reconstruction in which our leadership be changing. With Shannon’s recent retirement party, that process has already begun. Next on the list will be our own retirement celebrations that will happen on June 10 (Pastor Lorraine) and June 24 (Pastor Ron), respectively.

With the arrival of our new conference year on July 1, **Rev. Kim Risedorff** and our new Associate Pastor (at the time of this writing, not officially named) will become the new ministry team that will join our new office manager, **Katrina Combs**, in the task of ushering in a new chapter in the life of our congregation. This transition will, without question, provide an exciting new opportunity to re-envision and, in time, reconstruct the future of the San Ramon Valley United Methodist Church. That is, of course, the way it has always been, and the way it will always be. One chapter gives way to the next as the baton of leadership is passed.

This, we think, is in keeping with the biblical understanding that our God is a God who is always in the process of “doing a new thing.” This understanding is, of course, critical to any church that is determined to have a vital future. While we are both grateful for the role that we have been able to play in the unfolding story of our congregation, we are also hopeful for what the next chapter will hold for you.

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At this point, we would like to share our individual thoughts with you.

Pastor Lorraine:

Several years ago, I contemplated selling the family home. One of the many things the contractor did was to install flooring to give the kitchen a fresh look.

Four years later, the flooring had lost its glow and needed to be replaced. I secured another contractor, and then chose the paint and the flooring. On the day the contractors were to arrive, I realized I also needed to move the contents of the laundry closet, as well as everything moveable from the kitchen. By the end of the first day, all these things as well as the refrigerator, washer and dryer found their new home in the living room.

I couldn't use the kitchen and had to become creative with meal planning—thank God for PF Changs! And I had to accept the disorientation that comes with things being out of place.

Three days later, the floor was installed, and it was time to put things back in place. It took longer than I anticipated. All manner of things had found their way into that closet. It was time to sort, discard, or give away all the things that weren't being used.

One week and three days later, the house and the closet are in order, the kitchen floor is beautiful and the living room no longer looks like a storage shed. Throughout this process, I had to remind myself of the goal—to replace the floor, and the disruption it caused was temporary and a part of the process.

You, as a community, are experiencing the process as well: a Sanctuary remodel, two new pastors, and new staff members. Creativity in handling the new reality is necessary. Making decisions regarding what stays and where it's placed have to be made. And, I found it helpful to remember, something beautiful is in the process of being created. Something more beautiful than you can imagine. The challenge is to be faithful in the task of living with the disruption and being patient with yourself and others as you wait for the beauty to be revealed.

I won't experience the fuller measure of this time with you. I am entering the reconstructing time of retirement. I have experienced the beauty and the joy of serving and being in ministry with you this year, and thank you for the opportunity. It has been an honor and privilege to be with you during this time in your life.

I wish you God's peace, fresh joy, and new beauty in the days to come.

By the way, I've started looking for paint—now the house needs painting.

One of the things that I am also looking forward to is the opportunity of redefining myself outside the role of being pastor. While I suspect that it will not necessarily be easy, I am inclined to believe that it is the very thing that I need to do if I am to continue to grow in my understanding of myself and the relationships that I share with family, friends and with God. It should be interesting!

In closing, let me say, once again, how grateful I am for the time that we have spent together. What a deep and profound joy it has been. I have been challenged and changed, I have been nurtured and nudged, and I have experienced, through it all, the grace of God at work in ways that have enabled me to become a better pastor and, more importantly, a better person. June Communion Offering Trinity Center

Trinity Center, providing basic services for the homeless and working poor, has just moved to its new temporary location at the corner of S. California Blvd. and Botehlo Avenue in Walnut Creek. Volunteers from our church provide Friday lunch for over 60 people, and many church members volunteer at Trinity Center.

The move was necessary to make room for construction of a new four-story facility to include 45 low-cost rental apartments, and Trinity Center's eventual permanent home.

Besides normal operating expenses, there have been many additional costs involved in making the temporary space available and effective for the clients, including retrofitting the former KFC and Baja Fresh restaurants. New County Health Department restrictions have also increased food costs.

The center is now up and running, providing clean restrooms, showers, laundry, dining space, meals, clothing, food pantry, counseling and referral services. Our June Communion offering will help to support this vital local mission in our community.

Did You Know?

According to the [Contra Costa Council on Homelessness' July 2017 report](#), 1607 people experience homelessness, 30% of whom are first-time homeless. One hundred sixty minors (160) number among the 84 families who are homeless on a given night in Contra Costa County.

Church Council Takeaways

Changing Roles in Church Council and Endowment Committee • Office Assistant Position Filled

Finance Committee: April total income was \$54K favorable to plan, including Pledge/Giving (\$13.5K for April). Monthly giving of at least \$76K will keep us at or above budget for the remainder of the year. Expenses were \$15.9K favorable to plan, despite a one-time expense of appointed staff pension prepayment. Office and property expenses are \$3.4K favorable to plan because utility bills have decreased.

Staff Parish Relations Committee: Patsy Kyles from the preschool has taken the full-time position of Administrative Assistant. She holds an associate degree in Computer Science, and many of us know her from her position with the preschool. Patsy begins June 4 in her new role.

Board of Trustees: The fence installed outside the Sanctuary has temporarily eliminated three handicapped spaces. These are temporarily replaced by spaces nearer to the ARC. Work on the Sanctuary is expected to end September 30, 2018.

Work is in progress to schedule a free or low-cost CPR/AED training session for Church members.

Nominations and Leadership Development: Debra Carter is nominated to the Church Council's open position. She will assume the role of vice chair on July 1, serving in six months. After that time, if nominated and approved, she will assume the role of chair. Debra will be vacating her current position of lay leader to assume this new role.

Steve Roath has assumed the open position in the Endowment Committee. The role had been previously held by Rich

Johannessen. The Church Council passed a motion to endorse Steve's new role with the Endowment Committee.

Strategic Planning: The stage area of the renovated Sanctuary has been discussed as possibly used on non-worship days for choirs and other performers to build faith among the artistic members of our community.

Children's Ministry: Sports camp (June 4-7) has 22 registered participants, and VBS has 45 registered participants. Movie night has drawn interest from outside the church from some area moms.

Youth Ministry: Nearly \$3,000 raised with the Youth Group's spaghetti night. Mission trip slots are essentially filled with 23 Youth signed up, ranging in age from rising sixth graders to seniors. Parent meetups have been drawing parents into more engagement with the Youth Ministry.

Youth Sunday is June 3.

Jamere reports fifteen seniors approaching graduation from the Youth Group. Middle school youth group attendance is about thirteen young people each Wednesday, up from a previous average of eight.

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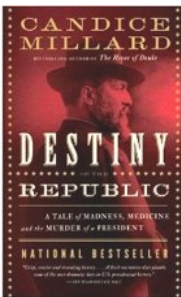


Between the Bookends

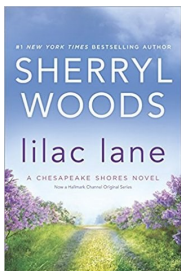

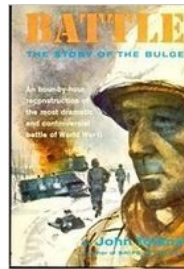

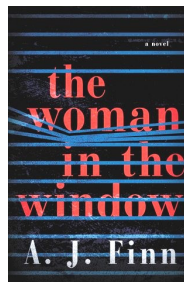
Millard, Candice, *Destiny of the Republic*. This book is a stirring account of American life and politics during the time of Garfield's presidency, not long after the end of the Civil War. Did you know Garfield's assassin's bullet did not kill the president, but the ensuing unsanitary medical treatment did? The author describes a key moment in American history in a lively way, without mind-numbing details. A very entertaining read! *(Editor's Note: This book is a personal favorite of mine. Millard has written some truly remarkable American history.)*



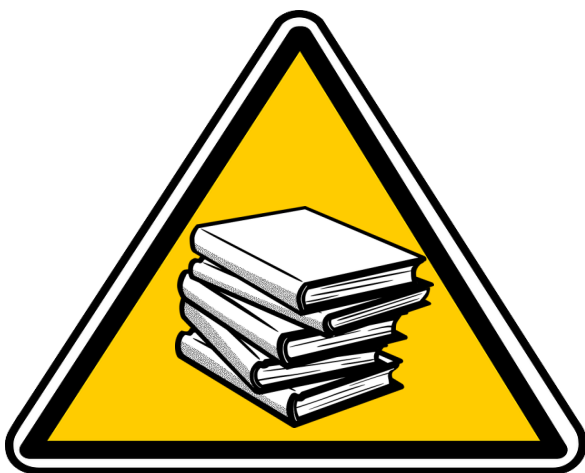
Woods, Sherryl, *Lilac Lane*. A Chesapeake Shores novel. After suffering a tragic loss, Kiera Malone, an Irishwoman, decides to visit her married daughter in Chesapeake Shores, an imaginary, quaint town in the U.S. Many twists and turns follow, with a happy and satisfying conclusion. It shows you can recover from a broken heart and learn to love and trust again. If you like Hallmark TV series, then you'll love this book.



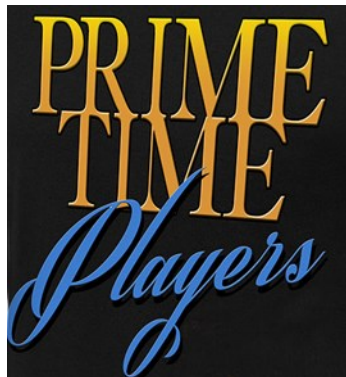
Toland, John, *Battle, The Story of The Bulge*. Hitler, in a desperate attempt to stave off the inevitability of his defeat, gathers most of his remaining men and equipment into this last, futile attempt on December 16, 1944. The battle lasted almost one month. This true story tells how close Hitler came to what would have been one of the world's most amazing turnabouts in military history. The author interviewed hundreds of soldiers and officers who participated in this battle, both American and German. These interviews have made this the story of its people, an exciting you-are-there account of World War II's most controversial battle. A fascinating narrative of great human interest.



Finn, A. J., *The Woman in the Window*. Dr. Anna Fox is a child psychologist in her forties who helps people online with their problems. She is also an alcoholic and on many medications for her agoraphobia, the intense fear of going outside. Her greatest thrill each day, besides drinking, is to peer through her camera from the window of her \$3,000,000 home into her neighbors' houses. When a new family moves in nearby, she sees what appears to be a murder. However, because she is drunk and over-medicated most of the time, outsiders believe she imagined the whole thing. What follows is a suspenseful, Hitchcock-like tale with eventually a slam-bang ending. A hard-to-put-down psychological thriller!

IRA Charitable Gift

The new income tax deduction limitation of \$10,000 for state and local taxes has made using your IRA Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) attractive as a source for contributions to your church. By direction, your IRA custodian can make a direct gift from your IRA RMD to your church, you can pay your annual pledge, and/or you can give an additional gift to support a favorite part of the church.

You will not receive an income tax deduction, but you will gain other benefits:

1. You will not have to pay income tax on the portion transferred to the church.
2. The gift will not be added to your annual income, hence less tax.
3. Your \$12,000 personal exemption will cover a large portion of your income taxes due.

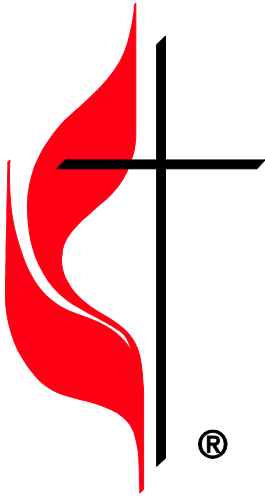
