# **Church Council Takeaways**

June 12, 2018

- Staff changes in place for the summer
- First Mega Sports and Faith Camp a success
- Watch for fall tutoring program through Peace & Justice Committee

Board of Trustees: Sodbusters are examining options for plant replacement in the courtyard. Their suggestions will come to the Board of Trustees for approval. Narthex/Sanctuary work continues according to expectations. Currently awaiting estimates for air conditioning and fresh paint in the Children's Ministry rooms. The pastor's office is also to be painted before our new pastor moves into the space. Observe that Wesley Center fellowship hall is locked during the week for protection of equipment.

Preschool: Classes for the 2017-2018 school year were dismissed on June 1. A parent survey indicates great satisfaction with teachers and staff, curriculum and the range of programs offered. Parent demand also compelled the addition of a second Extended Care classroom. We welcome experienced early childhood professional Laurie Jackson to the role of Teacher Assistant. She will fill the post vacated by Manelle Merrill, who will take the post of Office Administrator/

**Bookkeeper.** Manelle holds a B.S. in Accounting from Boston University. She replaces **Patsy Kyles**, who has taken an **Office Administrator** position in the church office.

Children and Family: Laura Roy reports 25 regular Sunday School attendees on their roster, with about 12 to 15 average attendance. The summer months are seeing the typical dropoff in weekly attendance. Beth McClelland led 12 children in the choir this year, and they have taken a break for the summer. The May 20 movie night featuring *Coco* saw 30 attendees, including several families from the preschool. The Mega Sports and Faith Camp held June 4 to 7 saw 30 children (20 not from SRVUMC). *See page 12 for photos from this camp.* Vacation Bible School (themed "Rolling River Rampage, Experience the Ride of a Lifetime with God") had 55 children signed up, ages three through fifth grade, the maximum possible with schedule and staff. The Children's Committee will meet in July and will do a curriculum evaluation.

Peace and Justice Committee: Partnerships continue with outside organizations Moms Demand Action for Gun Sense; Housing/Shelter Task Force of the Multi-Faith ACTION Coalition of Contra Costa County; and Beth Chaim congregation, the last of these leading a meeting to address hate, bullying and gun violence among San Ramon Valley youth. Watch for upcoming efforts, including Summer Sunday Sermon events planned for the Fireside Room and a fall tutoring program led by Judi Bauerlein.

Finance Committee: May total income was favorable to plan; however, Pledge/Giving was \$20K under budget. Giving will have to track at about \$80K/month to stay on or above budget. Total expenses for May were favorable to plan

despite some health insurance costs running slightly above plan. Technical maintenance is 54% over budget: the committee has asked Jeff Lang to implement Technical Maintenance billing. Through May the General Fund has a YTD net surplus of \$72.8K to budget. This favorable variance can be attributed to strong giving during January through May. The impact of the new pastors on the remaining 2018 Appointed Staff budget is forecasted to be about \$17K under budget or a positive variance.

The Men's Faith Sharing Group made a Men's Retreat to Villa del Mar in Santa Cruz from May 18 to 20 this year. The leader, **Reverend Dan Studivant**, our new Associate Pastor, led them on a faith journey entitled "Leaving a Legacy."







# Pastor Kim Wants to Know: What You Think About Glide?



<u>Glide Memorial United Methodist Church</u> is a famous landmark in San Francisco. Glide is known for its generous and needed programs in helping those who are hungry and poor.

It is a beacon of social justice. And, recent news reports have described the growing tension between Glide Foundation (a separate non-profit associated with the church) and the United Methodist Church. While Pastor Cecil retired some time ago, he and his wife remain active in the Glide Foundation. Pastors appointed to Glide have been told by the Foundation not to mention Jesus Christ in worship and are not to use terms like "Father, Son, and Holy Spirit" when baptizing anyone. In fact, pastors do not even get keys to the buildings! In addition, the Foundation, where donations to the church go, has not been transparent about finances. Our Bishop and the Cabinet have been working steadfastly to address these issues and have met with angry reactions.

Because some news reports have been very critical of the United Methodist church, I thought it was important for us to know that it is a complicated issue. I feel Bishop Carcaño has bravely addressed topics that need attention, and at the same time the services provided by the Foundation are vital. What are your thoughts around this controversy? I welcome hearing from you.

Need a little help with some work and want an easy way to help a homeless person? If so, please read on:

One of the things that I enjoy doing during my retirement is to find and coordinate day work for some of the local homeless individuals. I do this to help some of the homeless have some work and thus earn a bit of money from time to time.

Should you wish to have a homeless person come pull weeds, rake, blow, trim, clean house, paint, water, weed whack,

help with moves, or other work just contact me. I currently have about eight individuals that do good work and need work. Some have vehicles or bicycles, while others bus or BART. I drive some to and from work sites and others walk. I ask users to pay them \$15.00/hour, cash, and if they are on site around lunchtime to provide them lunch (Subway, Taco Bell, etc. or sandwiches and soft drinks or water).

We typically work in Alamo, Concord, Danville, Lafayette, Martinez, Orinda, Pleasant Hill, San Ramon, and Walnut Creek

# **ARC Update**

# Based on Rick Dodge's Report to Church Council, June 12, 2018




The ARC will celebrate its first year of operation on June 26, 2018. It has truly been a very successful launch of our activity and recreation facility. By all who have seen it and used it, the one common statement has been "wow." It has served its objective of providing a recreational outlet for both church members and their families as well as members of the public who are not church members. We continue to be so grateful to the DeWalt Family for their vision and generosity.

- The success of the facility economically is clearly dependent upon the over 30 volunteers who staff the facility when it is being utilized, and the six to eight young people from our Church Youth Group who are employed when volunteers are unable to do so.
- To date, we have been virtually 100% occupied with participants from our Tri-Valley area in sports such as basketball, soccer and volleyball.
- A new manager, Joey Fuca, was hired and his sportsrelated background in basketball has enabled him to develop and maintain a smooth-running operation.
- Another accomplishment is that the ages of the ARC
  participants range from the very young six- to eight-yearold boys and girls who come to learn soccer skills, to the
  seniors who flock to the facility to play pickleball each
  day.
- Pickleball continues to be an extremely popular activity, and the ARC is open for this sport many hours each day of the week. Each day, ARC hosts approximately 20 to 30 players, and once each week an instructor introduces new players to the finer aspects of the game.
- Outside groups have brought their sports teams to the ARC for special occasions. The San Ramon Valley Fire Department held a challenge between Chief and firefighter graduates, and Dylan DeWalt's own college, Pacific Lutheran University used ARC for a basketball shoot-around workout to prepare for their a basketball tournament in Santa Cruz.
- In early June, a very successful **Mega Sports**and Faith Camp was held with 30 children (20



not from SRVUMC) in attendance. **Joey Fuca** was the basketball coach, **Lauren Nakaso** coached soccer, **John Green** was a huddle coach and **Laura Roy** ran the rallies.

VBS took place in late
June, themed "Rolling
River Rampage, Experience the Ride of a
Lifetime with God."
Fifty-five children, from three-years-old to rising
5th graders signed up.

# **July Communion Offering**

This month, our Communion offering supports two organizations serving the needs of local families for decades.

#### **STAND!** For Families Free of Violence

<u>STAND!</u> For Families Free of Violence is a Bay Area organization committed to eliminating family violence. They offer "a complete spectrum of prevention, intervention and treatment programs." Specifically, STAND!




provides children's therapy, childcare and children's educational programs to abused children and children impacted by domestic violence. The organization also trains legal and law enforcement personnel, human services professionals, educators and healthcare providers.

STAND! Against Domestic Violence began in the 1970s as a single telephone line in a utility closet in Contra Costa County. By the 1980s, the dedicated volunteers who staffed it had built their organization into one of the Bay Area's leading domestic violence community services. Meanwhile, another organization, Family Stress Center, was expanding its services to include parenting education, the Latino Family Program and Proud Fathers. The two nonprofit agencies cooperated to share effort and skills. In 2010, they unified as STAND! For Families Free of Domestic Violence, and today this organization is the sole provider of comprehensive services for those impacted by domestic violence in the region. # **Monument Crisis Center Celebrates 15 Years**

Based in Concord, <u>Monument Crisis Center</u> offers nutritious food and other resources to families in Central and Eastern Contra Costa County. Last year, Monument provided about one million meals to its clients.





International of Pleasant Hill and independent donors, while enthusiasm came from area high school students. Today, Monument serves over 4,000 different households per year, and each distribution serves between 80 and 120 families. The group purchases food from the food bank, but it also receives private food donations.

Monument's core effort is food distribution, but it is not its only program. Additionally, this organization:

- Provides a Youth Enrichment Program, offering after-school tutoring, a teen center and summer camp for school-age kids.
- Hosts a resource fair annually, acquainting visitors with opportunities for employment, health and wellness, and English language classes available locally. Their most recent resource fair occurred in May.
- Provides lunch and bingo through the Senior Moments program, as well as health screenings and some groceries with this opportunity to socialize for senior citizens.

## From your Endowment Committee: How To Maximize Your Investments

Do you own highly appreciated stock or other investments that, if sold, would result in a high tax bill? Are your CDs or other investments producing a lower return or less income than desired? If you are looking for ways to manage your investments, maximize their worth and minimize taxes there are a number of charitable strategies that can help you achieve your goals. Here are three options to consider.

- 1. <u>Outright Gift:</u> One of the easiest ways to lower taxes on an investment is to make a tax-deductible gift of the asset to your church.
- 2. <u>Charitable Gift Annuity:</u> CDs or other investments that produce little or no income can be exchanged for a "charitable gift annuity" that makes fixed payment for life.
- 3. <u>Charitable Remainder Trust:</u> Investments that have appreciated can be used to fund a "Charitable Remainder Trust" that will generate income and tax savings.




#### Calcaterra, Regina, Etched in Sand.

services and in our foster care system




threads evolve into a helpful guide at the end of the book to assist each reader to live a better and healthier life into the golden years.


