Pastor's Pulse ~ Church Under Construction: Discernment

Even when the construction on our sanctuary is complete—most likely by the middle of October—we're still going to be a church under construction. Christianity has been under construction since Jesus rose, and I can't conceive that we will ever be finished with it. Maybe it's more accurate to say it will never be finished with us. We are the ones who are constantly being rebuilt, re-formed, born all over again. Creation is ongoing.

The Church will always be under construction because, like creation, history is ongoing. It doesn't stop. We may be the agents of history, but at the same time we're always trying to catch up to it. Some of this is surely due to the fact that more often than not our immediate responses to the forces of history pay no heed to how God is calling us to respond. A good example of this is our government's response to the failures of our immigration policy. We need a sound policy to manage the social costs of the influx of non-citizens. Obviously. It is safe to say that an appeal to God's desire for us to love the foreigner (for we were once foreigners in Egypt; **Deut 10:19, Ex 22:21,** et al.) would not include separating children from their mothers. It will always be the task of faithfulness to seek first the kingdom of God.

how many small groups we have and how varied they are, surely they'd sign up. Or if they came to the ARC. It occurs to me that one step we need to take in discerning where God is calling us is to step back and spend a moment admitting that we don't know what to do. Let us ask if our own spiritual needs are being met. Let us ask ourselves and one another why we want our church to grow. Let us have a frank look in the mirror to see if we have been setting our own spiritual longings aside for the sake of increasing numbers.

It occurs to me that for a time we may need to ask not what God needs us to do, but who God is calling us to be. A people spiritually fed will have food available for all who are hungry.

Church Council Meeting Takeaways

September 18, 2018

CPR/AED training for ushers and staff · August income 78% of budgeted · Preparing for Charge Conference November 4

Finance Committee (Bob Dominici): Results from August still shows a Total Income surplus as a lingering effect, but income for August was actually 78% of budgeted. Preschool income contributes again beginning in September at \$2.2K per month. Total Expenses for August were \$51.7K favorable to plan, largely owing to staffing considerations. Apportionments are slightly under plan for YTD to match Pledges and Gifts income. Office and Property expense is \$9.4K over the YTD budget. The most significant variable is above budget was the \$13.7K payment to PG&E prior to the September true -up for solar power generated by the campus' panels. The latest PG&E bill, received in September, provides a \$3.2K credit or a net electrical billing of \$10.5K YTD. The electrical cost level remains problematic against an annual electrical budget of \$5K. Other problematic expenses are Technical Maintenance, Utilities-Fire Inspection and Janitorial Expenses, which combined fall \$5.4K over budget YTD. Under Programs, most

activities are under budget, possibly resulting from delayed billing or assumed timing of the budgeted activities.

Of note, the management of Communion Offerings from month to month has been codified into more formal rules. Monies designated for a month's organization will be pooled over a two-week period before provided to the selected organization. The goal of this policy is to better allow late offerings to reach the designated group for the Communion gift, rather than occasionally being pooled into a general fund.

Staff Parish Relations (Don Field): California minimum wage rises to \$12/hour for non-exempt employees and \$49,920/year for exempt employees as of January 1, 2019. Raises for non-appointed staff will be based on performance. Motion: To increase wages for non-appointed staff in keeping with the California minimum wage as needed. Also move to budget for pay increases for non-appointed staff. Payroll budget depends on the giving level of the congregation. Motion PASSED.

Fred Shriver will replace **Don Field** at the Church Council meetings representing SPRC next month. The Council wishes to thank Don for his four years of service in this capacity and looks forward to Fred's efforts at coming meetings.

Board of Trustees (Mark Miller): A large tree branch fell in the northwest parking lot area, damaging the fence. The tree has been removed, and estimates are being taken to trim other trees, particularly those behind Wesley Center and the preschool.

A leak discovered outside the Fireside Room has been fixed. It was traced to an original pipe from the parsonage. The Sanctuary and Narthex roofing is on schedule. The BoT is still evaluating practical use of Children's Ministry rooms during the week. CPR/AED training of ushers and staff is tentatively scheduled for October 13.

Motion: that when a Church activity or group rents a vehicle that the group pay for the collision coverage through the rental agency. **Motion PASSED.**

Strategic Plan (Jim McKnight): Next meeting scheduled for October 2.

<u>Nominations and Leadership (Fred Toney):</u> Charge Conference occurs November 4, and the Nomination and Leadership Committee is seeking names of people who can step into some of the roles that need filling.

Children's Ministry Report (Laura Roy): The Hap Magee BBQ saw 35 attendees, several from preschool. The big October event is Trunk or Treat (see Page 12 for details!). New groups are starting. About 12 children have signed up for Afternoons at the ARC, with typical attendance so far of four to six. Thanks to Peggy Crawford, Kristian Hansen and Judi Bauerlein for their homework help! Beth McKnight has also started the "Kids Give Back" service club (see Page 12 for details!). So far, ten children have signed up, and four projects are planned. Some kids are part of member families, but others attended VBS or Sports Camp who are not current church members. Also starting in October: "Mom, Pop and Tots" and small group "Parents of Young Children" (see the Family Ministries page for more info on each).

What Is Charge Conference?

At the annual charge conference, a Church council meets with its district superintendent, clergy and leadership. The Book of Discipline calls for annual meetings of this kind.

- **SPRC** makes its recommendations regarding compensation.
- Finance Committee prepares a budget.
- Nominations and Leadership Committee recommends members to fill key lay leadership roles, including some for the Church council itself.

The lay leader and the council work with the pastors to develop Church conference reports. Ultimately, the point of your local Church's charge conference is to examine its goals for the coming year and plan their implementation. See https://www.umcdiscipleship.org for more general explanation about this important Church function.

<u>Peace and Justice Report (Laura Sanchez):</u> The committee is planning a League of Women Voters presentation in October on California's November ballot propositions. The Peace and Justice Committee also observes that the United Methodist Church will decide in February on its recommendations to the 2020 General Conference regarding the official position of our denomination concerning ordination, performance of clergy of marriages, etc. of LGBTQ people. The committee recommends that we have discussion on this matter at SRVUMC.

Pastors' Issues (Pastor Dan): The 2020 General Conference for the United Methodist Church will address the topic of the Church's relationship with LGBTQ people. Historically, the Church doctrine has not allowed performance of same-sex marriages, for example. On February 23, 2019, the Charge Conference votes on the plan to support for the 2020 General Conference. Set an alarm for 2:23 to say a prayer for guidance to the Conference. Pastors of this circuit are concerned about the struggles facing our church around these issues and are considering ways to present being considered.

The new attendance cards have been rolled out, and returns are higher than usual. Response has been positive so far.

October Communion Offering



World Communion Sunday

Six churchwide special Sundays mark the United Methodist calendar, and each year, the United Methodist Church celebrates World Communion Sunday on the first Sunday of October. This year, October 7 will be the day our own church joins with other Christians from a range of denominations to celebrate our unity.

World Communion Sunday was first observed in 1933 at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, PA. Several years later, in 1940, the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America, including predecessor denominations for the modern United Methodist Church,

adopted the observance into its own calendar. Since that time, the celebration has been adopted by followers of Jesus worldwide, from a range of churches.

The offering collected on World Communion Sunday goes to fund scholarships with these agencies (per http://www.umcgiving.org/question-articles/world-communion-sunday-faq):

World Communion Scholarships: 50%, with at least half of the amount collected annually supporting students outside the U.S.; these scholarships fund students pursuing their master's or doctoral work at universities or seminaries. Candidates for these scholarships are deemed likely to offer at least five years of service to their churches or communities after graduation.

Ethnic Scholarship Program: 35%; The General Board of Higher Education and Ministry oversees applications for a host of scholarships supporting students from a variety of backgrounds.

Ethnic In-Service Training Program: 15%; Administered by the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry for Ethnic Leadership and Development, these funds support students seeking roles in lay leadership or clergy throughout the United Methodist Church. These one-time grants cover expenses related to recruitment, training and mentoring, or retention.

Rise Against Hunger Meal Packing Event

November 4, 2018, After the Single (9 a.m.) Service

SRVUMC volunteers have participated in lively meal pack-outs before. On those dates, church members packed over 10,000 meals in a little over 90 minutes. On November 4, we aspire to pack even more. This satisfying project requires \$0.29 per meal to fund the raw materials such as dehydrated rice/soy meal, dehydrated vegetables and spices. To sponsor the pack-out, we have a goal of raising \$5800 for 20,000 meals. *The upcoming pack-out has space for eighty volunteers and is appropriate for families with children old enough to follow directions.*

These meal packets will be sent to partner schools in developing countries, who serve these hot meals to their students. A daily hot meal provided at school for each child serves as an important incentive for parents in these regions to send their children to school. Improved school attendance and nutrition assist in breaking the cycle of poverty for these families.

Rise Against Hunger began as Stop Hunger Now! in 1998 and is based in Raleigh, N.C. This organization and its volunteers has provided over 414 million meals in 74 countries around the world. 

MacLeod, Mary J., Call the Nurse.



Mary takes on the job as district nurse and makes her daily rounds to those who

need her help. She gets to know most of the inhabitants and forms a strong bond. Luxuries are nonexistent; a radio and telephone are the only ways of communication. Some of her stories are funny and thought-provoking, others tragic. Well worth your time!




Feinstein, John. Where Nobody
Knows Your Name: Life in the Minor Leagues of Baseball. Derek Jeter,
Tony La Russa, Dusty Baker—these and many other outstanding baseball players got their start in Triple-A teams. Most minor leaguers are not that lucky. Throughout the book you sense the desire, despair, hope and anger of minor league players and managers, all trying to make the jump to the spotlight

and the big payday. That and many other fascinating baseball facts are found in this book. Truly a baseball lover's delight!



Tyler, Anne, *Clock Dance*. As in most of her other books, the author writes about ordinary people. The story follows Willa Drake from age 11 to 61. As a pre-teen she lives in Pennsylvania with her dysfunctional family. Her mother "runs away from home" quite regularly, while Willa, her dad and her sister try to live a normal life. Years later, she goes to college and gets married, more out of

defiance to her parents than love. They have two sons with whom she does not have a close relationship. When her husband gets killed in an accident, Willa feels life is passing her by. Out of nowhere, she gets a confusing call from an oddball neighbor of her son's ex-girlfriend, Denise, asking for help raising her daughter. Suddenly Willa, desperate and lonely, feels she can be of use. If you are an Anne Tyler fan you will like this book.



Courtenay, Bryce, The Power of One.

The story tells of Peekay, a young English boy, born and raised in South Africa. The country is divided by racism and hatred. Peekay endures humiliation and bullying in an African school through World War II. Fortunately, he finds mentors who teach him valuable lessons for survival in boarding school and later in life. Among his mentors is a black, retired boxer who teaches him the finer

points of the sport. Peekay becomes a devoted pupil and sets his heart on becoming the welterweight champion of the world. He finally learns the power to transform lives, especially his own. This a grand, uplifting book for all underdogs!

Update on Arundo Eradication at SRVUMC

Arundo is a large, invasive reed that can grow up to 20 feet tall. It grows along creek banks in Contra Costa County and is particularly prevalent on our Church property. It is a fire hazard, it displaces native plants, destroys fish and wildlife habitat, and can create flooding problems.

Take advantage of the temporary missing section of fence at the back of our Church property to see the invader up close. Some members of our church have been actively engaged in developing safe procedures to remove the unwanted plant. We have been working with a Danville conservation group called *Friends of the Creek* who in turn are part of the Walnut

Creek Watershed Council, which includes nine local cities and

town and works closely with other County agencies to protect our environment.

The season for creek access runs from June 15 through October 15. During some Saturdays in the month of September, you might notice many young people working on the removal operation. Local Scout Troops and the SRV High School Environmental Club have volunteered to help haul the cut reeds from the stream banks. Our Church is grateful for the community spirit of these young people. They are the future stewards of our creeks. We are hoping that by taking the lead in this endeavor, our Church will inspire other property owners to remove the invader from their properties.
