A Way Forward

Dear Congregation-

The United Methodist Church has been struggling with how we understand our faith, sexual orientation and gender identity. People of faith see things differently, and we here at SRVUMC are not all of one mind.

The United Methodist Church is at a crossroads, and I want us to be informed as events unfold. My colleague, **Reverend Kathy LaPoint-Collup** has summarized the key legislative approaches that the United Methodist Church will vote on in February of 2019. She gave me permission to quote her summary here. Kathy will be speaking at **Lynnewood UMC on Sunday November 4, at 7 p.m.** Bring your questions and insights—I hope to see you there.

In 2016, the General Conference (Worldwide) of the United Methodist Church made the decision to establish a commission

on A Way Forward to deal with the denomination's impasse on issues related to human sexuality. The commission was appointed by our Bishops and developed three models for the special session of the General Conference to consider. The special session will be held **February 22 through 26 in St. Louis,** and the sole item is receiving and acting on the report of the **Commission on A Way Forward.** However, the United Methodist Judicial Council has ruled that the General Conference may receive reports from other agencies on this matter. So, there will be additional reports on this specific matter that will be considered.

Summary of the Three Plans Taken From UM News Website:

One Church Plan (recommended by the Council of Bishops): The one-church model would allow different United Methodists in different places to make different decisions regarding ministry with or by LGBTQ persons rather than maintaining a single standard that operates everywhere throughout the

worldwide church. This plan would remove restrictive language from the Book of Discipline and give conferences, churches and pastors the flexibility to "uniquely reach their missional context in relation to human sexuality without changing the connectional nature of The United Methodist Church."

United Methodists in central conferences in Africa, Asia and Europe would retain the authority to adapt the Book of Discipline and could continue to include their traditional language and values.

This plan would also protect the rights of United Methodists whose theological convictions will not allow them to perform same-sex weddings or ordain LGBTQ people.

This means Annual Conferences would decide on whether or not to ordain LGBTQ clergy. Local Churches would decide whether or not to allow same-sex weddings in their sanctuary. Pastors would decide whether or not to perform same-sex weddings.

Kim's comments: Prior to 1972, the United Methodist Church did not have any harmful language in our Discipline concerning the LGBTQ community so removing this language returns us to our roots and honors all of us as sacred creations of God.

Traditionalist Plan: This plan would affirm the current language about homosexuality in the Book of Discipline (BOD) and seek to strengthen enforcement for violations of church law. In the BOD, it is written, "The practice of homosexuality is incompatible with Christian teaching. Therefore, self-avowed practicing homosexuals are not to be certified as candidates, ordained as ministers, or appointed to serve in The United Methodist Church."

Kim's comments: I do not see this as being consistent with the mission and teachings of Jesus. Our current stance denies that all of God's people are a sacred creation of God.

Connectional-Conference Plan: This plan would create three connectional conferences based on theology or perspective, each having clearly defined values (accountability, contextualization and justice). The three connectional conferences would function throughout the worldwide church and the five existing U.S. jurisdictions would be abolished.


Adaptations to the Book of Discipline would be allowed by each connectional conference. Annual conferences would determine their affiliation with a connectional conference. Local churches who choose a branch other than the one chosen by their annual conference could vote to join another conference. This plan would require multiple amendments to the denomination's constitution.

Kim's comments: This approach is complex and would take much additional legislative action in order to be implemented.

There are seventeen denominations that are part of the Methodist/Wesleyan movement in the United States. Even within the United Methodist denomination, divisions and mergers are a part of our history, as the diagram on Page 3 illustrates.

As always, I look forward to hearing your thoughts on this, and any other topic. One day, one prayer, at a time,

November Communion Offering

Hope City is a volunteer rebuild camp partnering with Santa Rosa First United Methodist Church, as well as many other faith communities in the Lake County area. Our November Communion offering will focus on the fire recovery in Lake County and coincide with our upcoming mission trip November 11 through 17. All of the offering supports Hope City.

Hope City is a ministry of Hope Crisis Network. The network organizes volunteers from religious and secular groups alike, including colleges and universities, civic groups and companies into teams for rebuilding projects. They have been active in the region impacted by the Lake County fires, providing building materials, onsite management and tools for the past few years. They are able to provide comfortable housing and meals to their volunteers.

According to the <u>Hope City website</u>, Lake County has been impacted by fire more than any other county in California, in terms of number of fires and acres burned. The group serves families whose homes were destroyed in the Rocky, Valley, Clayton, Sulfur, Pawnee and Mendicino Complex fires. According to <u>www.CA.gov</u>, the final number of acres consumed by the Mendicino Complex (Ranch) Fire alone was 410,203.

On behalf of Hope City, we would like to thank you for choosing to serve alongside us in Lake County, CA. We know that you have many options to choose from with disasters occurring more frequently and appreciate the time and energy your group is giving this community in need. Hope City is a volunteer rebuild camp partnering with Middletown Bible Church, The Bridge, Community Baptist Church, Santa Rosa Bible Church, Santa Rosa First United Methodist Church and the Hope Crisis Response Network as well as a building partner with Team Lake County.

The disaster you are responding to is known as the Valley Fire which began on September 12th, and was extinguished on October 6th, 2015. The incident DR-4240 started as a small fire of about 400 acres and grew to devastate over 10,000 acres within 12 hours. By the time the fire was extinguished it had injured four while taking the lives of four others and burned 76,000 acres destroying 2000 structures, 1300 of which were homes.

After such devastation, the community was left in a state of great loss and grieving. With the poverty rate resting at 25%, and a high unemployment rate, we are seeing close to 45% of the population as either not insured or underinsured. Needless to say, Hope City is grateful for your willingness to help achieve the goal to rebuild homes in a community were the need is great.

During your trip, Hope City will be working to ensure the team's success during the week and also making sure there is an appropriate amount of meaningful work and opportunity. We will also be praying that God works through the hearts of each individual involved and works through you to strengthen relationships with each other and families you will work alongside.

Dedicated Service

A Stephen Minister serves whole-heartedly. This isn't a casual ministry. It involves prayer, thought, consideration, study, and commitment. In return, the Stephen Minister receives grateful thanks from his or her care receiver, our Stephen Leaders, the congregation, and our Lord.

Accountability

A Stephen Minister is accountable to God, the congregation, the Stephen Leaders, the other Stephen Ministers, and the care receiver. In return, he or she receives support, encouragement, and guidance in Small Group Peer Supervision.

Continuous Learning

A Stephen Minister is open to adjusting and adapting his or her caregiving to fit the needs of the care receiver. He or she learns more about caregiving at each meeting with a care receiver and at each supervision session. Stephen Ministry is an experience of continuous learning, growth, and joy.

SRVUMC will be conducting a training class for new Stephen Ministers is starting **January 6**, **2019**. The Holy Spirit may be calling you to the joy, commitment, growth, meaning, training, service, and care of being a Stephen Minister. Pray for God's guidance as you consider this opportunity.




November brings with it a few holidays: Veteran's Day and, of course, Thanksgiving Day. Unless you have a lot of family over, these may be good times to curl up with a great book.



Feldman, Noah, Scorpions: The Battles and Triumphs of FDR's Great Supreme Court Justices. Supreme Court Justices
Felix Frankfurter, Hugo Black, Robert Jackson and William Douglas came to the court between 1937 and 1941. All were committed to FDR's New Deal principles. The author makes us privy to their rivalries and disa-

greements. He then shows us how their theories of constitutional law evolved during their time on the court as he analyzes a number of creative decisions rendered between the late 1930s and the mid 1950s including Brown v. Board of Education (1954). While focusing on these four indisputably important judges, Feldman offers a highly readable account of the Supreme Court's role from the Depression through the early Cold War years. A timely read! Thank you, Caroline Walsh. While on the subject of Supreme Court Justices, you may also enjoy Sonia Sottomayor's old favorite: *My Beloved World*.



How To Maximize Your Investments

- 2. <u>Charitable Gift Annuity:</u> CDs or other investments that produce little or no income can be exchanged for a "Charitable Gift Annuity" that makes fixed payment for life.
- 3. <u>Charitable Remainder Trust:</u> Investments that have appreciated can be used to fund a "Charitable Remainder Trust" that will generate income and tax savings.
