If you've been married for any length of time, you will understand what my grandpa meant when, after sixty-five or so years of marriage, he said to me, "Big D, being married ain't for sissies." You fall in love. Then you get married. Even in the most ideal marriage, you may love your spouse, but the in-love-ness comes and goes. Mostly goes, seems like.

You will be frustrated with and disappointed by your spouse. You will feel alienated and misunderstood when your spouse is disappointed in you. There will be times when your spouse brings out the worst in you. And vice versa. She or he will bear only surface resemblance to the one you fell in love with. You will wonder if this is not your spouse's monstrous evil twin.

This is why we have the marriage covenant. If we didn't, most of us wouldn't stick it out.

Easter Services


Some worship times have changed from previous years.







Walking to Jerusalem

Our theme for Lent is The Journey to Jerusalem: Faith, Fitness and Fellowship.

There are 7416 miles from Alamo to Jerusalem. And we are going to keep track of all our physical activities, record the miles, and journey to Jerusalem together. Ready? Here's how it will work: every time you walk, run, bike, hike, play golf, play tennis, play pickleball, do yoga, sing in a choir, play ukulele or work out in any way, you will earn "miles" on the journey towards Jerusalem. For example, when you play pickleball for half an hour, you earn three miles.

That's not all! If you talk about your faith with someone else while 'working out' you can *double* your miles. We'll provide conversation starters for these. You earn miles when you work out and talk about your faith with anyone, not just participants at our church. And, if you talk about your faith with someone you have never really talked with before, you can *quadruple* your miles. We will celebrate our Journey to Jerusalem on the Sunday after Easter, April 28.

- 1 hour of golf = 3 miles
- 1 hour of tennis = 3 miles
- 1 hour of yoga = 3 miles
- 1 hour of singing = 3 miles
- 1 hour of ukulele playing = 3 miles



Bringing Hope to Puerto Rico

"Today is a beautiful, happy day...it is a pleasure to have people like you in our lives...God bless you forever and ever." — Samuel Cruz

And with that greeting on our first day in Puerto Rico, we launched into a remarkably fulfilling week of mission work.

Now chronicled as one of the worst hurricanes in history, Maria left Puerto Rico devastated. This U.S. territory will be in recovery for many years.

This year's mission brought us to the region of Arecibo on the Atlantic Coast. Our team of seventeen, from seven different Northern California churches, fanned out across the rebuilding of three homes. Each home suffered the wind and water damage only a major storm can bring.

In addition to meaningful work that was much appreciated, getting to know the people we served and worked with made this mission trip special. All of the families we served were gracious, heartwarming people. They were so welcoming to complete strangers coming into their homes. They trusted that we had their best interests at heart. They offered hospitality beyond their means.

Among our families were Glorianne, Agustin and baby Abigail Milagro (Miracle in Spanish). They are a young family trying to restore their home where Glorianne grew up. Despite so many family challenges in the past year—post-partum depression, the passing of Glorianne's mother, limited economic means, not to mention the loss of the second floor of their home—they are upbeat about the future.

Elizabeth, her husband and four-year old daughter had not yet lived in their newly built home when the hurricane hit. But, beaming from ear to ear, they were gleefully preparing to move in after we finished the last touches.

At our third house, the team thoroughly enjoyed working with Luis and Christian, the construction workers provided to guide the team. Even with our language differences, they were always positive and joyful as they guided us in the work.

As with all mission trips, one of the blessings is the team camaraderie we shared for a week. It is amazing, how after a day or two, we bonded around a common purpose. We shared



meals, bunk beds inches apart, dribbling showers and touching devotional moments. Each day started with 6 a.m. cell phone alarms and ended with group time at dusk. We rallied around minor injuries, laughed at our own idiosyncrasies and shed a tear or two at tender reflections about living our faith in mission.

And on the final day of work, as is our tradition, we presented each family with a homemade quilt as a sign of hope and friendship, each with prayer knots tied by us and our home churches.

As we transition back to life in California, each of us brings back fond memories. We ended our second mission to assist with the recovery even more determined to keep coming back until the work is done. We are already anticipating our return in 2020.

Supporting Youth Mission Trips and Local Organizations

Contra Costa Interfaith Housing (CCIH) provides permanent, affordable housing and vital support services to homeless and at-risk families and individuals in Contra Costa



County. CCIH forms strategic partnerships with affordable housing developers and public/county entities to achieve its ends. Their support services are vital in assisting families with a myriad of challenges that range from mental health intervention to academic and employment assistance. Furthermore, their program models also provide sobriety support, conflict resolution, and parenting skills.

Additionally, resident leases allow for permanent housing, as long as the provisions of the lease are upheld. Permanent housing and on-site support services create self-reliant, dignified, and sustainable lives for residents. Greater Richmond Interfaith Project (GRIP) is an interfaith and multiracial organization dedicated to serving the region's homeless, hungry and disenfranchised. Begun in 1966, modern services range from the *Souper Center* for nutritious, hot meals daily and the GRIP Resource Center for showers and



toiletries, mail and telephone access, and emergency clothing for clients. The Family Housing Program provides emergency shelter for families with children with its 75 beds. Finally, its Families in Transition program partners with the West Contra Costa County Unified School District to assist with transport, school uniforms and school supplies for homeless, runaway, unaccompanied or foster youth. Interfaith Council of Contra Costa County

(ICCCC) consists of 108 congregations and organizations of various faiths, including Jewish, Buddhist, Islamic and Christian traditions. This group's work includes promoting immunization among the area's impoverished children through



Health and Faith In Action; the **Winter Nights Shelter** program (now in its 13th year) through the Social Justice Alliance; the Singing Messengers, who send musical teams into area nursing facilities; and outreach to youth, including incarcerated youth. In 2017, ICCC launched its Diffusing Hatred program in its congregations and community centers. This program seeks to equip citizens of Contra Costa County with nonviolent communication skills and the tools to diffuse tense situations or interrupt harassment. Habitat For Humanity Playhouse Build 2019

This month, your Communion Sunday offering supports The Habitat For Humanity Playhouse Build.

The Habitat Playhouse project is an aspect of Habitat for Humanity that invites groups to build and donate playhouses to charities or individual families. The money raised goes towards the building of homes by Habitat For Humanity. To sponsor a playhouse, a group raises \$2000 per playhouse, and then builds the playhouse themselves. The playhouses to be constructed are prefabricated, meaning most of the measuring and cutting has already been done. SRVUMC's effort will focus on painting the playhouse and final assembly.

Creative and artistic volunteers love this project. The theme of the playhouse is selected by the child or children that will be receiving the playhouse. Once a playhouse is designed, decorated, and assembled, it's donated to the local children who requested the house's theme. That moment—seeing children run in and out of their new, custom-designed playhouse—is the most memorable part of volunteering with the Playhouse program.

When completed, our playhouse will go to the <u>Blue Star</u> <u>Moms</u>. Working with Habitat, that group will designate the particular family who gets the playhouse. The recipient family will be Tri-Valley residents with a parent serving overseas.

Volunteering to Build the Playhouses on April 28

We will be building two Habitat Playhouses in the church courtyard. Unlike normal Habitat builds where they require participants to be 16 years or older, the Playhouse build does not have an age requirement, but a parent must be present. The build will begin following the first service at approximately 10:15 a.m. For those wishing to attend the 10:30 a.m service, that is not a problem; you can join us following the late service. We will be building two playhouses, which means we would need 30 to 40 volunteers to help in doing the final assembly (attaching trim and roofing shingles) and the most important part: painting the playhouse to the theme requested by the child or children receiving the playhouse! The build is usually completed by 2 p.m., and lunch and drinks will be provided. 

SRVUMC "Rises" to the Meal-packing Occasion in 2019

On Sunday, February 24, approximately 75 volunteers helped pack 20,000 meals to help the hungry around the world. Since SRVUMC began packing meals in 2014, we have packed 95,000 meals for *Rise Against Hunger*. We have been steadily increasing the number of meals packed at this event. This year was our first year of packing 20,000 meals—and we were still able to complete the packing in less than two hours. Congratulations and thank you to all!

Rise Against Hunger began in 1998 as *Stop Hunger Now!* and is based in Raleigh, N.C. Since its original initiatives in distributing nutritious meals to the starving, this organization has broadened its efforts to improve food security for people worldwide. Besides providing assistance following a natural disaster, Rise Against Hunger trains farmers and families in agricultural methods and business skills. The Philippines, Vietnam, Cambodia, Nicaragua, and Kenya are some of the countries where Rise Against Hunger has promoted ecological approaches to agriculture, as well as diversification. Many of these small-scale, local farmers provide the vegetables dehydrated for the Rise Against Hunger packed meals. Rise Against Hunger takes the view that ending world hunger can be achieved by 2030.








Do you ever wonder how the library team selects books for the Book Cart? Just because we get books donated does not mean we automatically accept them for our library. 








Now for our new selections:



This wonderful adventure story of finding her way home from Durango to Denver is filled with characters, both human and wild, touching moments and even terror for Bella. The entire story is told through the dog's eyes and mind. That alone makes the story unique and

engrossing. The unconditional love of a dog calms and comforts many people along the journey.



Ellis, Joseph J., First Family: Abigail and John Adams. This is a story of a marriage between a man and a woman with intelligence and strength who are devoted to each other, their family and to our young country. While Abigail contributes mostly in the domestic sphere, she powerfully supports John's political and governmental endeavors. This book gives

a good review of our early history, and it spotlights the strengths—as well as some of the faults and foibles—of our founding fathers. It also recounts certain conflicts between Adams and Hamilton and Adams and Jefferson, making the reader feel less oppressed by the machinations of our present set of politicians.
