## Wesley's Convictions About the Body of Christ

What was so shocking about the results of February's Special General Conference (results that were largely affirmed in late April by the UM Judicial Council) was how un-Wesleyan they were. John Wesley was a man of unyielding opinions, but he would never have sat by while his people let their opinions about who belongs in the body of Christ cleave the body of Christ apart. He knew what opinions are worth. They are changeable, reflect personal preferences, predispositions and prejudices. When circumstances change, so do opinions. The convictions that arrive in our hearts by faith are not like this. They bind us to one another and to the gospel; they keep the body of Christ whole.

The One Church Plan was based on one of Wesley's fundamental convictions expressed in an often-quoted refrain from "A Catholic Spirit", one of his most celebrated sermons.<sup>1</sup> "Though we cannot think alike, may we not love alike? May we not be of one heart, though we are not of one opinion?" <sup>2</sup> 54% of General Conference delegates thought not. They threw out the One Church Plan on the first day of legislation. We got instead the Traditional Plan whereby the measure of one's faith in Jesus Christ and the validity of one's call to ministry—and indeed one's reception into the body of Christ—is predicated on one's opinion of homosexuality. It is the blade that splits the baby.

Hearts transformed by faith are forged in love. We are *convicted*, if you like, in love and come by the essential convictions we live and worship by. From these our opinions follow. In short, our opinions conform to our faith. When our faith conforms to our opinions, religion goes off the rails. It becomes dangerous and drives wedges into the heart of the church.

The question that finally matters in "A Catholic Spirit" is the one Jehu asks of Jehonadab in **2 Kings 10:15:** "Is thine heart right, as my heart is with thy heart? ... If it be, give me thine hand."

It all comes down to what moves our hearts. If our hearts are right, then our opinions might differ, but they can't unclench our essential unity. God's love in us will not let our hearts divide. Look at 1 Corinthians 13. Besides, pure and loving hearts are not compelled by beliefs, be they doctrinal, political or idiosyncratic. Jesus did not judge others based on their beliefs. Rather, his heart was moved by needs—each heart's need to be mended and understood and, above all, to belong to other hearts. The human heart needs to be needed.

A majority of our congregation cannot stand with the UMC's Traditional Plan, the principal aim of which is to mete out punishment to those who would be in full communion with our LGBTQ sisters and brothers. Others are not so sure; they are uneasy with what such a welcome would entail and what its results might be. A majority of our congregation appears to be ready to become a Reconciling Congregation...and soon. Others, while supporting in principle "open minds, open hearts, open doors", are suspicious of the Reconciling Ministries Network and any underlying agenda it might have.

Yet if our hearts are right, we will not be divided, our church family will not become unrecognizable to us. It might, however, reflect the new thing God is doing.

# Church Council Takeaways: Update on What It Would Mean To Be a Reconciling Church

At the May 21 Church Council Meeting, the Church Council considered the next step for SRVUMC as we explore what it means to be Reconciling.

We have had four Community Gatherings, and the most recent one was significant in that we were able to hear from folks who opposed being reconciling, were confused, or had questions.

#### Next Steps

Sunday June 23, 4:30 to 6 p.m., in the Sanctuary. A final Community Gathering will address these topics: What it is to be Reconciling; What it is not; Separating what is happening in the larger denomination, and what is happening at our local church. Be informed; Please get your questions answered!

Our Core Team continues to do one-one-one interviews to ask about your hopes for our church and explain what is involved in becoming a Reconciling Church. Core Team Members are available after worship on Sundays, or call the church office to have a Core Team Member contact you: 925/837-5243.

To be Reconciling, a church has to

- Explore the topic with members and provide information about Reconciling Ministry Network
- Write a welcoming statement that specifically includes a welcome to all sexual orientations and gender identities
- Hold a vote where 75% or more approve of becoming Reconciling

You can learn more at <a href="http://rmnetwork.org">http://rmnetwork.org</a>. Currently, Church members are writing a Welcome Statement that will be voted on by the Church Council. A congregational vote, open to all active participants at SRVUMC, will be held August 11 through 25. Details will be provided by late June. Absentee ballots can be requested by those who are traveling during that time.

#### **Other Active Concerns**

To implement the newer, streamlined process for reviewing active issues, council members and staff submitted written reports in advance of the May 21 meeting. Not all issues presented in the reports were discussed during meeting time, and not all materials submitted in reports appear below. For example, the Finance Committee submitted a report not excerpted in this article.

**Family Ministries report**—Attendance on most Sundays averages 15 children TK to fifth grade with six in Tot Spot. Easter Sunday saw lots of visiting families. Rebecca Bernstein is planning a short mission trip for fifth and sixth graders in July.

Parent Connection barbecue planned for July or August.

**Youth Ministry report**—Sunday attendance averages consistently five to seven youth. With six confirmands this year, we transition now to an "every other Year" schedule until we have higher numbers.

**Board of Trustees report**—The Wesley Kitchen freezer has been repaired, replacing the freezer module and fixing a major internal dent. The Crawfords have generously donated a refrigerator/freezer to the Youth Room Kitchen. Outside, the Sodbusters remain in need of more volunteers to share the workload for two hours one day per month. One sprinkler has been repaired and Green Landscaping has been hired to repair the other. The board continues to investigate ways to better manage and conserve energy to reduce costs.

The above excerpts represent only a partial listing of issues considered at the most recent Church Council meeting. Church Council meetings are open to all members. The next Church Council meeting is Tuesday, June 11, 7 p.m.



# **June Communion Offering**

#### **Peace with Justice Sunday**

Peace with Justice Sunday is one of six churchwide special Sundays observed by the worldwide United Methodist Church. **This year, we celebrate it officially on June 16,** but we will collect our offering for it on Communion Sunday. Traditionally, the first Sunday after Pentecost marks this special Sunday in the UMC calendar.

Peace with Justice supports ministries at home and abroad to bring hope to people of all kinds. Mediation and conflict resolution training are two broad examples of the kind of programs supported by the Peace with Justice monies.

For example, in 2018, Goldendale UMC received a \$3500 grant from this program from the Pacific Northwest Conference's Board of Church and Society to support several Native American youth from their area to attend a United Nation Indian Trial Youth conference in San Diego. Another grant in the U.S. sponsored First United Methodist Church of Buffalo, WY, in their program to present each grade-schooler in the area with a story book at the end of the last school year. In Alaska, United Methodists there contributed to the Alaska Innocence Project, a nonprofit group seeking to exonerate individuals who have been wrongfully convicted.

Overseas, Peace with Justice ministries have a history that touches a variety of people and countries. United Methodists have advocated for peace in the Holy Land; interreligious dialogue through a grant to the Ecumenical Youth Council in Europe (EYCE); family unity and peace in South Korea during a 2013 Ecumenical Korea Peace Conference.

The annual conference treasurer remits 50% of the collection to the General Council on Finance and Administration (GFCA). The GFCA treasurer distributes the balance (after expenses) to the agency for Peace with Justice Ministries. The conference Board of Church and Society or an equivalent body administers the remaining 50% collected by the annual conference treasurer. The recipients of the playhouses request a theme for the volunteers to paint their playhouse. This time, the themes were "Dogs" (can't think of a better theme, personally) and "Castles." The families have been selected by Habitat through the Blue Star Moms organization. The playhouses are then picked up by the families and taken home.



#### Scalise, Steve, Back in the Game.

Every year, the Republican and Democratic congressmen get together for their annual Congressional Baseball Game. In the early morning hours of June 14, 2017, a heavily armed, enraged gunman, who hated the Republican Party, opened fire at a practice game, wounding five and nearly killing Steve Scalise, Republi-

can House Majority Whip. In his book, Scalise recounts those first crucial minutes when life hung by a thread and proper care was administered by knowledgeable, experienced people. Fortunately, 911 calls were made immediately by nearby citizens upon hearing gunfire, which alerted firemen, paramedics, police and special agents to rush to the stadium park. As Scalise put it, "the Calvary was coming!" The reader must keep in mind that Scalise is not a noted author; he is simply trying to acknowledge all the medical people who saved his life, and his family and friends who faithfully encouraged him to keep fighting. This book is a must-read for all who believe in the power of prayer and faith in God as he has!


