- 1. The members treat each other well. If a congregation is full of backbiting, unresolved conflicts, and distrust, people coming in will "smell it in the air" and look elsewhere. The qualities of love, kindness, warmth, and welcome are not sufficient causes for lasting growth, but they are necessary conditions.
- 2. The members simply can't shut up about their church. They are so inspired on Sunday that they want to talk about it on Monday at the water cooler or on Facebook. Not only that, but they honestly feel, "My friends' lives would be better if they could be part of a community like ours," so they invite them out of generosity.
- 3. Visitors almost always come because of #2 a friend who welcomes them. But visitors only become members when existing members welcome them, include them, make space for them, and involve them. Churches that are warm to each other (#1) aren't necessarily warm to newcomers.

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There's a lot more we could say, but I think any list of reasons for growth would begin with those three.†

Thank you for being a community on a journey with God—mind, body and soul. Both Dan and I are so grateful to be in ministry with you, and we look forward to the year ahead.

Church Council Takeaways

Welcome statement approved by Church Council • Congregation vote on becoming reconciling by secret ballot August 11 through 25 • Voting process detailed

Notable from the June 11 Church Council meeting:

The Church Council approved the Welcoming Statement as it appears in the text box to the right. The statement meets the requirements of the Reconciling Ministry Network (RMN), but it expands the focus beyond the sexual orientation and gender identity issues. To join the RMN, a church must craft a welcoming statement, and then its members must vote to join the network by at least a 75% supermajority.

The congregational vote on the question of joining the RMN will take place over August 11 through August 25, a span including three Sundays. A secure ballot box will be available outside the Sanctuary on Sunday mornings; otherwise, it will be available in the office during the week. The ballot box will be attended any time it is available. During the week, office staff will attend the ballot box, and they will be trained on the guidelines for the voting process. On Sundays, volunteers will attend the box. One day each week, the ballot box will be available for extended hours for voters who can't come to the church office during regular office hours, and the box will be attended by volunteers for that time. If voters need to come during the extended hours, they will need to make arrangements to do so with Debra Carter or Kathleen Saghafi. The voting guidelines must be clear and detailed, and staff or volunteers must rigorously adhere to them with no exceptions to maintain the credibility of the voting process.

Voters will come to the church campus; however, absentee ballots will be available for those who cannot physically come (e.g., travel, disability, college attendance). Rebecca Bernstein has volunteered to post updates to the church's Instagram site about the issue and the voting process to inform our congregation's college students. Active participants in the church will be allowed to vote: the Book of Discipline defines an active participant as someone who has contributed to the church or been present at a church activity at least once in the past three years (does not include most ARC activities). A voter will be given a ballot and will sign a list indicating that he or she has voted, but the ballot itself will be anonymous. Each ballot will be numbered to

minimize the risk of duplication (e.g., mailed to absentees).

Pastor Kim noted at the June 11 meeting that 157 interviews had been conducted by the Core Team to discuss the question of reconciling, with 145 people indicating that they would vote "yes" on the issue, with four as a definite "no."

Finance (Bob Dominici): We are within our budget; however, monthly income has been dropping, and it was 50% below budget in May.

Pastoral Reports (Rebecca Bernstein, Dan Sturdivant, Kim Risedorph): Rebecca reported that the middle school youth group typically averages 12 to 14 attendees, and the high school group typically has three or four regulars. She is working to involve the youth more in services—serving Communion or as liturgists. Pastor Dan is developing small groups. He suggests a potential group for male caregivers; up to eight men are interested.

Family Ministry (Laura Roy): Four consistent volunteers help with classes once or twice monthly, but more are needed to cover the "two in a room" policy. Sunday mornings are averaging 20 children, although attendance commonly drops during the summer months. July and August will focus on fall staffing, curriculum preparation and classroom cleanup. A parent BBQ is planned for July 14 (see Page 9 for more information).

UM Missionary Katherine Parker Presents Gift From Nepal to Pastor Kim Risedorph

Katherine Parker is currently on itineration (a six-month period) in her home CA-NV Annual Conference and in other conferences across the nation which include her supporting churches. On May 22 she was hosted by Grace UMC in San Ramon and shared the theme of "Sangsangai: Hand in Hand for Mission in Nepal."

During the afternoon of May 22, Katherine toured the SRVUMC campus, meeting staff members and volunteers. During her visit, she gave a special gift to Pastor Kim and to the church for our support in her work as a UMC Missionary. She serves as a Health and Community Transformation Advisor with the United Mission to Nepal (UMN), which has a vision of a "fullness of life for all in a transformed Nepali society."

She is next scheduled to be in the Tri-Valley area on Sunday, June 23, at 7 p.m. at Livermore (Asbury), on Sunday, July 28, at 3 p.m. at Walnut Creek, and at 7 p.m. at Lafayette.



The Artwork Presented

Thangka is ancient religious art and is used as a teaching and meditation tool. This artwork was created for Katherine to share with her 27 supporting communities by artist Binode Ghising. Since becoming a Christian, he has used this traditional Buddhist representation to tell about the life of Christ. As a unique visual presentation, Katherine displayed a large framed picture that depicts the Biblical stories from birth of Jesus and culminates with the Ascension.

SRVUMC and Katherine

SRVUMC has a Covenant Relationship with Katherine and sends support through The Advance and UM Global Ministries (a portion of our Christmas Offering). The Advance is an accountable, designated giving arm of The United Methodist Church that ensures 100% of each gift is used for its intended mission or ministry.

This partnership is much more than a financial commitment. It is a dynamic relationship in which the church and missionary pray for one another and communicate regularly. When a church covenants with one missionary, it is supporting the entire United Methodist missionary community on their behalf and in their name. July Communion Offering

Based in Concord, Monument Crisis Center offers nutritious food and other resources to families in Central and Eastern Contra Costa County. Last year, Monument provided about one million meals to its clients.

Monument began in 2003 with a small group of concerned citizens. Startup funding came from Safeway Foundation, the Salvation Army, Soroptimist International of Pleasant Hill and independent donors, while enthusiasm came from area high school students. On their first day of operation, they distributed food to 84 families. Today, Monument distributes food to more than 15,000 households per year, and each distribution serves between 80 and 120 families. The group purchases food from the food bank, but it also receives private food donations, taking in 12,000 lbs. of food in donations every month.





Monument's core effort is food distribution, but it is not its only program. For example, its Youth Enrichment Program offers after-school tutoring, a teen center and summer camp for school-age kids. Monument also hosts a resource fair annually, acquainting visitors with employment, health and wellness, and English language classes available to them. Finally, Senior Moments provides lunch and bingo, as well as health screenings and some groceries with this opportunity to socialize.

Monument's core effort is food distribution, but it is not its only program. They help children a great start to their new school year so...we are helping with their Kindergarten through 5th grade Monument Crisis Center Back-2-School Backpack Drive 2019! July's Communion Offering will go toward purchasing school supplies in support of the backpack drive, but you can also give a backpack stocked with the supplies listed to the right.

We will have Monument Crisis Center barrels in Wesley Hall and the back of the Sanctuary from Sunday, June 23 through Sunday, July 14. We will have a Backpack Blessing on Sunday, July 21.




"All-Church Time" means you can bring your family and friends to play these games *at no charge* during these hours:



And there's always that wonderful historical fiction—a story based on actual events presented in a way that helps you imagine what people must have felt while living through them. Read our recommendations, take a look at the cart, or visit the library to find something that you will enjoy.



Paris. This is another novel showing the fierce determination and bravery of the WWII generation. Set in New York, London, France, and Germany, the story is told through the eyes of three women: Grace whose interest is aroused by the discovery of a packet of photographs she finds in Grand Central Station,

a group of British women to aid in

the French resistance, and Marie who is one of the female operatives who handles radio communications, message carrying, and even sabotage. This is an exciting book that will enlighten the reader on an aspect of WWII that is not generally well known.



A second book by Pam Jenoff that was lost has been replaced for us. The review originally appeared in the July 2017 Messenger.

Jenoff, Pam, The Kommandant's Girl. How brave would you be, and which compromises would you make, when the stakes are very high? Emma Gershmann had been married only six weeks and never believed she would deny her Jewish heritage, pass as a

Gentile, and become a German Kommandant's assistant—

With summer in front of you, why not try reading a genre you and much more to him. But she was desperately afraid for her parents confined in the Krakow ghetto, and her fervent young husband who had left to fight in the Resistance. How far would she go to protect them and perhaps learn information that might help them and save countless lives? Compromises were made. A page-turner.



Carreyrou, John, Bad Blood: Secrets and Lies in a Silicon Valley *Startup.* The premise was super: technology to make blood testing faster and easier. The leader was perfect: young, female, smart, charismatic. Money poured in, and big names sat on the board. Theranos, the startup led by Elizabeth Holmes, was up and running, promising to make medical history. Investigative reporter John Carreyrou

brings to light the appalling truth that the pinprick technology was not producing the desired results. Worse, Holmes denied this truth and aggressively marketed her product. While demanding total loyalty and secrecy in her workplace, she continued to dupe investors and endanger the lives of people depending upon accurate test readings. Bad Blood is the seminal case documenting excessive ambition and unrealistic expectations in the high tech industry. It makes for very good reading while also teaching us to look beyond glamour and hype to expect integrity in our businesses.
