Living With Hope

Several years ago, I was a part of a nonprofit called Partners for Change. We offered a two-year program to individuals and families motivated to find financial stability and permanent housing. The key ingredients included a twelve-week class that covered financial and personal issues, a weekly meal together that helped us become a community, and a strong mentoring program that lasted eighteen months.

Once I asked graduates what they valued most about the program. The common theme in their answers was: *hope*. One woman said, "I feel safe enough to feel hope." I wasn't expecting that answer; I thought they'd say the mentors, or curriculum or the community was what they valued most. The emphasis on hope was a game changer for me. Because community members experienced hope, they changed how they went about their daily lives and decisions. Since then, I've been more aware of the power of hope. What a difference it can make to live with hope, rather than hopelessness.

The most powerful way to live our faith is to live with hope.

Hope is distinct from thinking good thoughts or optimism. Rabbi Jonathan Sacks put it this way: "Optimism is the belief that things will get better. Hope is the belief that, together, we can make things better. Optimism is a passive virtue, hope an active one. It takes no courage to be an optimist, but it takes a great deal of courage to have hope."

Our sermon series in September is called "Living with Hope." We'll be exploring what hope looks like and how to cultivate the courage that feeds hope. Hope is an active belief that we can make things better, and hope is cultivated when we look around and notice the kindness, goodness, and generosity of others. Let's notice, and then write a note of thanks. As part of practicing hope, I'm inviting us all to be on the lookout for ways to notice and appreciate the goodness of others. And then, write at least one thank-you note a week in the month of September. Texts, emails, handwritten notes—all count. Your kids can join in and draw a picture to send to someone. Let me

When we have the courage to live with hope, when we have eyes to see the good that is happening, we are connecting to the Power that comes from God's Presence, right here with us. May it be so for us!

Sister Helen Prejean Book Event September 6, 7 to 9 p.m. Danville Congregational Church





September Communion Offering ALS CURE Project

ALS is a horrendous disease attacking the neuromuscular system of the body, slowly and systematically rendering the person paralyzed and unable to breathe.

Locally, ALS CURE Project is a not-for-profit organization which Mike Piscotty started after the passing of his wife, Gretchen, in May of 2018 from ALS. ALS CURE's mission is to research towards a laser-focused goal of coming up with a cure for ALS. With the support from The Silicon Valley Community Foundation, Mike is able to operate this effort without



any ALS CURE employees. Mike works for ALS CURE gratis and expects to continue in that manner such that all funding raised will go directly towards ALS CURE's one goal of curing ALS from humanity. As awful as this disease is and with the extraordinary medical advances giving us unprecedented views into the human body, a new drug for ALS hasn't made it to market since 1995, leaving those with ALS and their families with little hope.

ALS CURE has two objectives:

- 1. Leveraging the profit motive and research funding portfolios of biotech and pharma companies, we are creating a business model which will award a large cash grand prize to the company producing the cure for ALS. The grand prize will be funded through philanthropy. The prize will be awarded when the ALS cure is confirmed and the philanthropist accepts an anticipated Nobel Prize.
- 2. To accelerate the timeframe associated with producing the ALS cure, the ALS CURE project will raise funding and conduct project scope-oriented research targeted at establishing ALS biomarkers which will be made public to aid the biotech and pharma companies in producing the ALS cure.

Some Facts About ALS

Per the ALS Association website, <u>www.alsa.org</u> (not affiliated with the ALS Project)

- ALS stands for "atrophic lateral sclerosis."
- About 90% of ALS cases occur without family history. It is not contagious.
- An estimated 5000 people per year are diagnosed with ALS in the US. It is thought that 16,000 people have the disease at any given time.
- The estimated cost to develop a drug is between \$2 billion and \$3 billion.

Mission Memories...

Wildfire Recovery in Mendocino County

The last few years have been the worst in California history for wildfires—acres burned, homes lost, and cost. Among the recent large fires, two devastated Mendocino County in Northern California. The focus of our July 2019 mission trip was to assist with rebuilding from the 2017 and 2018 fires in the Redwood Valley and Potter Valley communities near Ukiah.

Our team of eight was blessed to help two families, Bill's and Sharon's. Bill is a retired Navy veteran. Sharon is a special needs teacher, and her husband, Randy, is the custodian at a local school. Bill and his wife have been living in a FEMA trailer since his house burned down. Sharon and her family (five kids) moved in with one of her daughters.

What we found most amazing is how upbeat and resilient these survivors are. The human spirit is an amazing thing. They lost everything, but their faith carries and comforts them. We are grateful for the opportunity to meet and work for these wonderful people.



This trip was hosted by UMCOR and Hope City, the faith-based nonprofit we worked with in Lake County. We are so impressed by the organization and dedication Hope City brings to their purpose. The Mendocino recovery is scheduled to take two years with local coordination funded by an UMCOR grant and construction delivered by Hope City and volunteers.

The goal of our week included finishing the final few tasks so that Bill could move into his home. It was special to be there the day he and his wife started moving in. Our main project was to finish two decks and build a ramp for Sharon's new home. Despite some very hot days, the team successfully completed our goal.

Our mission workdays were characterized by just the right blend of hard work, Christian comradery, great meals and getting to know a new place and people. As is our tradition, we presented both Bill and Sharon a homemade quilt from the Quilting Group at Asbury United Methodist Church. It is always a touching moment for us and our clients—a moment of reflecting on challenges overcome and anticipation of better things to come.





Divakaruni, Chitra Banerjee, Oleander Girl. In this novel which begins in India, Korobi (Bengali for Oleander) travels to the US shortly after 9/11 on a personal search. This has been called an "Indian Jane Austen novel" and was Danville-San Ramon's 2016 City Read's choice.



Evans, Lissa, *Crooked Heart*. The Blitz is on in London, and children are being evacuated to safer places. It means that ten-year-old Noel is shipped to St. Albans, where he has the misfortune of ending up in the care of Vera Sedge. Vera is no prize—she's usually on the wrong side of the law as she tries to eke out a miserable

living, and she's a nervous wreck as a result. But Noel has issues as well. He's mourning the loss of his free-spirited god-mother, he has a huge vocabulary peppered with Latin phrases, and when he sees what Vera is up to, he's on board. This odd couple will win your heart, and you'll never get a clearer picture of London during WWII.



Lanier, Laura Lewis, *All Things Bright and Beautiful*. This slim volume with its glowing watercolor illustrations, Scripture excerpts, beloved hymns, and inspirational narrative is a source of great beauty. It provides reassurance that in all seasons we are supported by the love

and the grace of God.




Flagg, Fannie, *Can't Wait to Get to Heaven*. Have you ever wondered what heaven is like? Elner certainly felt like she found out. Although she had been told many times not to climb a ladder, she did it in order to pick a few figs. However, she did take a tumble and fell unconscious. After being rushed to the hospital and

never regaining consciousness, she was declared dead!

Now the next part of her life begins. As you read, you become aware of what a significant effect Elner had in her neighborhood. Therefore, when she is declared dead, her loved ones realize how much she added and gave to them and the community. This is certainly a delightful, thought-provoking read.

The interaction of a complex group of characters, including world leaders, US government officials, and public servants as well as villains, makes this a fast-moving story about the terrible vulnerability of our overwhelming dependence on computers and the necessity to guard the internet with all resources possible to avoid a far-reaching disaster.
