"Social distancing" is one of those euphemisms that obscures the cost of the measures it refers to. It's a sugar-coating to help the medicine go down. In a crisis the better angels of our nature draw us together. In this one we're being held apart.

The news of my new appointment to Tice Valley UMC is a change for all of us as well. Understanding the following things might be helpful. I'm an ordained minister in the United Methodist Church, I will go-and want to go-where my pastoral gifts best serve the whole people of God. After talking with our DS, Shinya Goto, and Tice Valley's, Schuyler Rhodes, I remembered how long I've known a majority of the cabinet members (Debra Brady among them) and how well they know me. Of course they pored over this change prayerfully and thoroughly. Of course they knew that moving a pastor after only two years is less than ideal. Yet, given who I am and what I do as a minister, the match was too obvious to ignore. Even so, the well-being of SRVUMC is a high-priority item to the Cabinet; if they didn't have a well-suited replacement in mind, they would never have pulled the trigger. (By the time you read this, you'll know who the new associate is. I already know. Y'all are in business!)

If observing the shelter in place order is a foretaste of what it will be like for us to be apart, I can't say I'm enjoying it. Still, I'm keeping my distance not for my sake but for everyone's. In

Easter Offering Hope Solutions and GRIP



Greater Richmond Interfaith Project (GRIP) is

an interfaith and multiracial organization dedicated to serving the region's homeless, hungry and disenfranchised. Begun in 1966, modern services range from the Souper Center for nutritious, hot meals daily and the GRIP Resource Center for showers and toiletries, mail and telephone, and emergency clothing for clients. The Family Housing Program provides emergency shelter for families with children with its 75 beds. Finally, its Families in Transition program partners with the West Contra Costa County Unified School District to assist with transport, school uniforms and school supplies for homeless, runaway, unaccompanied or foster youth. In 1997, San Ramon Valley United Methodist Church joined with fourteen other faith community partners, forming Contra Costa Interfaith Housing (CCIH) to address homelessness in our community.

Since that time, we have partnered with CCIH to create Garden Park Apartments and many other effective solutions to ending homelessness for our most vulnerable neighbors. Our own Pastor Kim Risedorph has just joined the board, and many members of our congregation have been integral to growing the impact of this organization in our community.

As part of its five-year strategic plan, CCIH now has a new name and identity: **Hope Solutions**.

Hope Solutions envisions a future in which everyone has a place to call home and the support of a strong community to live with dignity and reach their full potential. The organization's mission is to heal the effects of poverty and homelessness by providing permanent housing and vital support services to highly vulnerable families and individuals.

In just the first year, they have

- Increased the number of households housed and served from 127 to 418
- Added a new program model to house an additional 125 homeless families and launched a program for 40 homeless transition-age youth
- Grown revenue from \$4.4M to \$7.2M, comprised of a 78% increase in public funding, and a 20% increase in private funding
- Added eleven program staff positions to ensure quality support of clients
- Increased the Resident Empowerment Program (REP) leaders involvement in program oversight and governance
- Selected a new name that better conveys their mission and values and supports growth goals

The new name, Hope Solutions, reflects the essence of how the organization supports its residents and how it will grow its impact in the future. For six months, the rebranding team had rich conversations about the organization's values, identity and future goals. Hundreds of possible names were considered, and this name reflected the hope that we all hold for the organization's clients until they can hold it for themselves. Hope Solutions continually invites their clients to dare to hope while offering concrete solutions and support to heal and thrive.

Please note that our Rise Against Hunger event originally scheduled for April 25 has been postponed by the central organization for now. We will set a new date and keep you informed.

Winter Nights Rescheduled: Starts April 27

Dear Meal Leaders and Church Leaders:

Well, things have changed. The Winter Nights leadership is working to adapt to current events and to assure that volunteers are not exposed to coronavirus. Here is the current status:

Winter Nights is still coming to SRVUMC, but a week early on April 27. We still will host for two weeks. Clients are expected to be present in the building 24/7 (Winter Nights staff will be present at all times).



At this point (things could change), the only thing our volunteers need to do is deliver food to a point outside Wesley Center. We will not need to enter Wesley Center. We may need to load/unload. Stay tuned on that.

The meal assignment now works as follows.

- Choose a local restaurant (e.g. Kentucky Fried Chicken). Coordinate with me in advance so the clients don't get pizza
 every day.
- 2. Order food for 22 people...say six adults and sixteen children, (we are only feeding clients and Winter Night staff).
- 3. Pick up and pay for the food.
- 4. **Deliver the food to the rear entrance of the kitchen behind Wesley Center at 6 p.m.** Two or three people will be plenty to do this. I can help subsidize the cost if needed: if you wish financial help, I will need receipts. Plan on contributing at least the amount you would have spent on a home-prepared meal the way we used to do it.
- 5. The clients will take care of distribution and clean up. We will use paper plates and disposable utensils. We have the paper plates, but please get plastic utensils if you can.

Also, we will periodically deliver milk, juice, cereal, bread, sandwich makings, snacks, etc. for client prepared breakfasts and lunches to the rear entrance of the kitchen. A Winter Nights staff member will pick up the food and put it away in the kitchen. We have one volunteer who will do most of this.

Our schedules will change. I am not going to put out a schedule until we are closer to the event. We need many fewer people, so I assume we can work out new dates. Just subtract seven days from your current scheduled date for a starting point. The number of clients may go down.

Stay tuned for information. Please share this information with your teams.

Puerto Rico Mission 2020 Faith in Action

Our third year assisting with the recovery from Hurricane Maria brought our mission team to a better healed Puerto Rico. We were pleased to see recovery progress, but the region has years still to go. Now chronicled as one of the worst hurricanes in history, the 2017 storm left the island devastated.

This year's mission saw a return to the south coast. Stationed at a former Methodist Retreat Center, we served clients in the nearby towns of Guayama, Arroyo and Maunabo.

We worked on six different homes this year, doing everything from roofing to painting to stucco to tiling. In addition to meaningful work that was much appreciated, our presence was also about bringing hope and showing we care. We enjoyed getting to know the people we served. All of the families were gracious, heartwarming people.

Among our clients were Amaryllis and her young baby. There was Tony, a spunky 80-year-old. Guadalupe has lived in her storm-ravaged house for 40 years. Sonja and her family of ten hosted our efforts. And lastly, we served Hector and Nydia. Hector is 100% disabled from his Vietnam War duty. All welcomed complete strangers coming into their homes.

We enjoyed teaming with the construction workers assigned to each home. We benefited greatly from their patient guidance and familiarity with the tasks to be done.

As with all mission trips, one of the blessings is the team comradery of our week. It was amazing how we bonded around a common purpose. We shared meals, bunk beds inches apart, dribbling showers and meaningful reflection time each evening.

Trips like this are always full of special moments. We attended worship at Iglesia Methodista Puerta Del Cielo. What a warm

reception we received! We admired the dedication of the local Methodist staff supporting our work. Their commitment was remarkable.

Looking back on this trip, we feel blessed to have the time, talent and means to make a difference in the lives of the people of Puerto Rico. We are determined to keep coming back until the recovery is complete.



Baseball season is starting! Why not pick out a good book and get in the mood for some ball playing. Here are some titles: *Where Nobody Knows Your Name: Life in the Minor Leagues* by John Feinstein; *One Last Strike* by Tony La Russa; and *Calico Joe* by John Grisham.





Alexander, Elizabeth, *The Light of the World*. She was born in Harlem, he in Eritrea. She becomes a poet and an educator, he an artist and a chef. They meet and marry in Connecticut and live a joyous life full of meaningful work and love for each other, their two sons, their extended family, and their community. At 50, he dies suddenly and

unexpectedly, and she is bereft. This memoir is her response to this loss. It is a beautifully written celebration of a life full of kindness and grace, generosity and humor. Both the profound loss and the grateful joy for the life they shared are fully shared with us and the result is truly uplifting.



Fellowes, Jessica, Bright Young Dead: A Mitford Murders Mystery. (2nd in series) The setting is 1925 at the estate of Lord Redesdale, outside of London, celebrating daughter Pam Mitford's 18th birthday. The lively, flapper friends of Pam's older and more worldly sister, Nancy are also in attendance. This celebration ends when a guest, Adrian


Curtis, is found dead at the base of the bell tower. The police quickly blame the maid who discovered him because she has some stolen items from the estate in her bag. However, the Mitford sisters and their companion, Louisa, can't believe the maid is guilty. They agree to set out and find the real culprit. Thus begins the murder mystery.



Borneman, Walter R., American Spring: Lexington, Concord, and the Road to Revolution. This is a step by step account of the very beginning of the American Revolution, which covers the first six months of 1775. Tensions are mounting, missteps are made by British soldiers as well as the colonial rebels. Who fired the first shot at Lexington—red

coats or rebels? Opinions vary, and both sides give their testi-

mony. This is a great book for those who enjoy reading indepth descriptions of famous battles. In particular, it is fascinating to get *both* sides of the story. It is extremely well researched.



Benedict, Marie, *Carnegie's Maid*. During the time of the Irish famine, a family in Ireland decides to send their middle daughter to America to obtain work and, hopefully, be able to send money to them. As she leaves the overly crowded ship, she hears a man calling her name, Miss Clara Kelley. Could anyone know her name, she wonders.

She answers the man who is paging her name and begins her journey to Pittsburgh. It is there she learns that the other Miss Kelley, who unfortunately died while on board ship, has the position of being lady's maid to Mrs. Margaret Carnegie, Andrew Carnegie's mother. Throughout her days of being with her mistress, she begins to learn of Andrew's aspirations. As she becomes more at ease conversing with Andrew, she reveals to him some of her thoughts for the industry he is building. He ponders her ideas, and thereby the story evolves. This novel suggests a possible reason for Carnegie's philanthropic ways.

We have replaced the following two books which somehow disappeared from our collection: *Dreams from My Father* by Barack Obama, a memoir by our former president, and *Half a Heart* by Karen McQuestion, an especially touching story of a young boy seeking love and safety.
