Our California-Nevada United Methodist Conference knows we will change, and we will find ways to thrive! Our church has been chosen to be part of the Healthy Church Initiative, an 18-month project that has four goals:

1. Prepare us to take the next step in a post-coronavirus world.
2. Envision new ways of being a community of faith, doing new things in the community around us.
3. Enhance the health and vitality of our church. That involves changing the narrative from asking "how do we survive?" to "how do we grow?"

SRVUMC Applies for Payroll Protection Loan

As we navigate this new way of being church, our church leaders applied for the Payroll Protection Loan available to small businesses and churches. Our Finance Committee, thanks to the leadership of **Finance Chair Jeff Stroin**, worked hard to get all the necessary information together.

A special Charge Conference was held on Wednesday, April 8, so that the congregation could approve the loan application. We gathered on Zoom and considered if this was the right thing to do, and if we needed this loan. A strong majority voted to go ahead and apply, aware that this loan could aid our ministries at the ARC and in our Preschool. The loan was submitted on Thursday, April 9, and we are waiting to hear if it was granted.

The Payroll Protection Plan the federal loan intended to offer relief to organizations, including non-profits like SRVUMC, which employ fewer than 500 people. According to the U.S. Treasury's [fact sheet](#) on the subject, the loan will be forgiven if all monies are used to cover "payroll costs, and most mortgage interest, rent, and utility costs over the eight-week period after the loan is made."

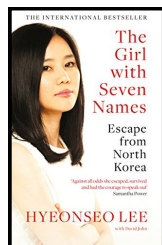

To that end, the organization provides shelter, food and supportive services to hundreds in the community of Richmond. Its Souper Center offers breakfast and dinner 365 days per year.

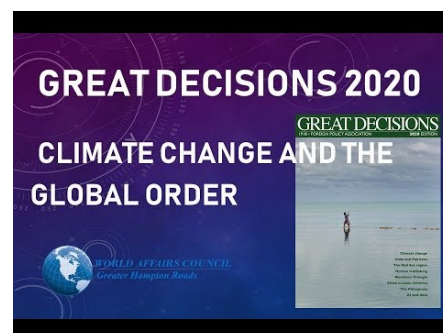

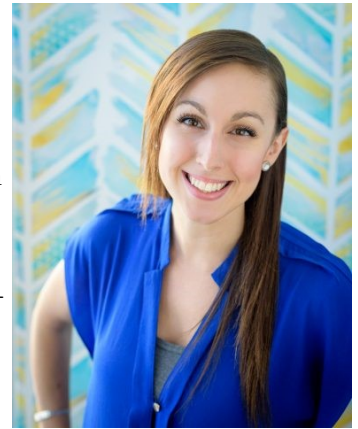

May Communion Offering MedShare

San Ramon Valley supports MedShare through its distribution center located in San Leandro, CA. MedShare sources and delivers surplus medical supplies for medically underserved areas in the United States and around the world. According the organization's [website](#), MedShare has diverted over 13.5 million pounds of unused, unexpired medical supplies from landfills. The supplies and equipment the organization has received from hospitals and corporations has been delivered to over 100 countries worldwide.



To accomplish its mission, MedShare relies on some 20,000 volunteers to sort and package 6000 tons of medical products. ***SRVUMC members join in the effort with sorting events in San Leandro a few times annually (these efforts are temporarily on hold until shelter-in-place orders are rescinded).***

According to MedShare's [website](#) as of March 2020, the organization has donated more than \$1.3 million in aid, including 2.8 million masks and nearly 200,000 isolation gowns to California hospitals and clinics in the wake of the COVID-19 outbreak.

Upcoming Mission Opportunities

Help With Wildfire Recovery in Lake County, California

Lake County has had several major wildfires in the last few years, including the Valley Fire which destroyed 1300 homes in the Middletown area. We will assist with the continued rebuilding homes for families that are challenged to do so on their own.

Winter Nights Update for 2020

The Winter Nights shelter is closing on May 4, and the three remaining families, eleven people total, will be housed in hotels going forward. SRVUMC will not be hosting this year; however, the organization still needs the monetary support.

The Winter Nights staff has been scrambling to keep up with the coronavirus pandemic, County Health Department restrictions, and concerns about volunteer health. They initially restricted new entries into the program and instituted a rigorous sanitation protocol including take out meals from restaurants. Two of the remaining families have housing vouchers but haven't been able to actually move into their assigned houses.

Housing the families is going to incur some additional expense and Winter Nights is asking for donations. You can give to Winter Nights on the SRVUMC website under the "Give" tab at the top of the home screen. Your donation will go into the church Winter Nights account and will be forwarded shortly to Winter Nights. You will get an email receipt.

Thank you to all the volunteers who were ready to go and to the staff who tried valiantly to make the shelter happen. Special thanks to **Sue Dowling** and **Marilyn Clarke**. God Bless the wonderful people at Winter Nights. They are truly amazing! May God be with our precious clients.

One way or another, Winter Nights will be back next year, count on it!

Electronic Giving Gains Popularity Among SRVUMC Members and Constituents

Last month, San Ramon Valley UMC launched two new ways for donors to support our various activities, a link for online giving and the GivePlus Church app for use on a mobile device. In past three weeks, 21 families have adopted the online donation method or the GivePlus Church app for their giving, and they have commented that they like how easy these options are to use.

The first of these two new electronic methods is a link on www.srvumc.org/give. It allows one-time donations or regularly scheduled giving through a checking account or credit card. Donors can direct their offering to the General Fund or to any of the other funds listed in a drop-down menu. The other new option is to use the GivePlus Church app via a mobile device, like a cell phone. Donors download the GivePlus Church app from either the Apple App Store or Google Play, depending on their type of cell phone, to set up their account within the app. Alternatively, donors can use the QR code on their mobile phone to reach the GivePlus Church app. Any method immediately acknowledges a gift with a text or email confirmation.

Back in March, SRVUMC essentially did its own “beta testing” to make sure that the link on the church’s “Give” page and the GivePlus app each functioned. A team of about half a dozen members and staff at the church worked together to ensure that anyone who wishes to give to the church electronically can use either option smoothly.

Anyone can still support SRVUMC with a check or with the automated bill paying feature of a checking account. Alternatively, a person can arrange with **Susan Dowling** (sdowling@srvumc.org) to arrange scheduled payments from the credit card of choice.

How To Scan a QR Code (It's Easy)

A QR code is short for “quick response” code, and you have probably noticed them on boxes at the grocery store, on signs at the BART station and in lots of other places. While ads are certainly the most popular use for them currently, they are also appearing in greeting cards, museum information panels, and more.

First, do you have a QR code reader?

- If you have an iPhone, then your cell phone already has a QR reader automatically available through its camera.
- A Samsung phone with Bixby capabilities also has an automatic detector for QR codes (not all Samsung phones have the Bixby feature).
- If you have an Android phone, the Google Assistant can detect QR codes. Long-press the Home icon or say “OK, Google.” Then, press the Google Lens icon at the bottom right of your screen.

Whatever model your cell phone, you may prefer to download a separate QR reader.

Next, open the camera application on your cell phone. Probably, your phone’s QR reader will launch automatically as the default setting. If you downloaded a separate code-reading setting, you may have to open it first to launch it.

Now, position the QR code so you can see it fully in the phone’s screen. You will need to hold the phone steady and wait for it to scan the QR code. Probably, your phone will scan it automatically. Some readers may ask you to press a button to capture the image.

The app will provide you with a list of options you can take based on that QR code.

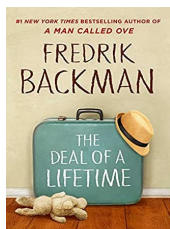

The Return of Library Books

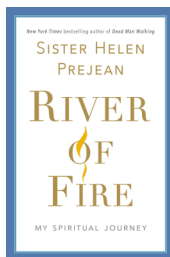

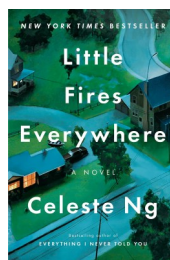
Backman, Fredrik, *The Deal of a Lifetime*.

This is a novella by the author of *A Man Called Ove*. For those who prefer short stories, this book is only 65 pages long! It is a thoughtful, compelling father/son story that "reminds us that life is a fleeting gift and our legacy rests in how we share that gift with those we love."



Prejean, Helen, *River of Fire: My Spiritual Journey*.

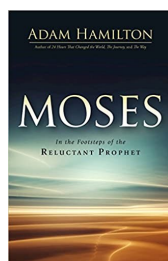
This memoir is laid out chronologically with some digressions, but it is a readable book written by a spunky, admirable woman. Sister Helen tells of her early life in a comfortable middle-class family in Baton Rouge, Louisiana as well as her life as a Sister of St. Joseph, both pre- and post-Vatican II. As the rigid discipline of nuns' lives is relaxed after Vatican II, Sister Helen's world expands as does her spiritual existence. She is able to form relationships with friends, to travel, and to broaden her education. She finally becomes involved in the social justice movement that results in her book *Dead Man Walking*.



Ng, Celeste, *Little Fires Everywhere*. In her novel, Ng takes us through Shaker Heights, Ohio, a quiet, well-planned community with winding streets and pristine lawns surrounding elegant homes. It is there the reader encounters the Richardsons, a well-thought-of family in the Shaker community.

Elena Richardson, the mother of four, is a journalist for the local newspaper. Her innate inquisitiveness leads to the first little fire to start. She pries into the background of her housekeeper Mia Warren, the single mother of a teenage daughter. The daughter, Pearl, has become fast friends with the Richardson clan. Suspicious of this small family new to the Heights, Elena Richardson begins to uncover Mia's past only

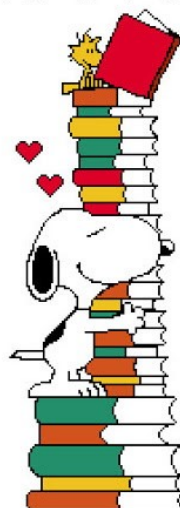
to learn that her prying will reveal unexpected disasters. The reader will enjoy comparing the book to the Hulu miniseries.



Hamilton, Adam, *Moses: In the Footsteps of the Reluctant Prophet*.

Author Adam Hamilton, a Methodist minister and prolific writer of Bible studies, takes a historic tour of Egypt, following in the path of Moses and the children of Israel. This book is packed with facts and archeologic explanations, and it presents the compelling story of Moses in a fresh "You Are There" way. Viewing parts of the video accompanying the book certainly enhances the reality of the journey from Egypt to the Promised Land. To view short excerpts of the video on the Internet, type Abingdon Press, go to author Adam Hamilton, scroll down to his Moses series, and click on DVD. The travel log is absolutely inspirational!

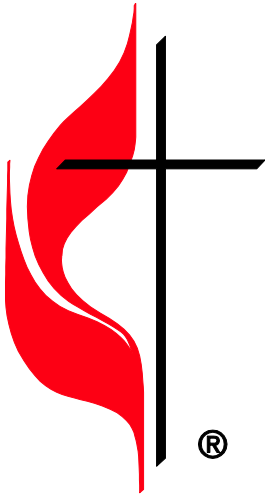
