It was an ordinary Church Council meeting here at San Ramon Valley UMC. And then someone asked two question: "Why does church matter? Why does this church matter?"

These questions are at the center of a year-long program that Pastor Mantu and I, along with several church leaders are participating in. San Ramon Valley UMC has been chosen to participate in the Healthy Church Initiative. Our Conference is confident that our church, along with several others, will do more than survive the current pandemic. We will thrive. And the Conference is supporting us with workshops and leadership coaches for the year ahead. We will update you regu-

larly, and ask for you input and participation.

Our assignments, which you will help us complete, include to create a clear pathway to following the Way of Jesus; and to develop a bold post-pandemic vision for reaching new people. To do that, we will examine our own church environment and ask: what among are practices are healthy, what are traditions, what are accidents, and what are toxic? How can we cultivate community in a pandemic? How can we maximize online generosity and giving?

The global pandemic of COVID-19 coupled with our nation's crisis as it comes face-to-face with racism expressed in structural racism has changed the landscape of our future work and ministry in profound ways. We are in a liminal time. Liminal and liminality are not only fun words to say—they describe our situation. Both words are derived from the Latin limen, meaning threshold. This is a time when we are no longer doing business as usual. We are on a threshold between the familiar and the completely unknown.

No doubt about it, liminal periods are disorienting. New identities are explored, and new possibilities are considered. That's the work ahead of us, and God is with us on this journey. Let's keep our eyes on God's Presence with us. The natural human response is to resist liminality, to yearn to go back to the familiar, even if the familiar no longer exists. Exhibit A: Our ancestors in the faith, the Israelites, were not on their wilderness journey long before they began longing for the life in

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Egypt they had left behind. The Israelites endured a long liminal era during which they struggled to leave behind their identity as slaves. They began to know themselves as God's people, and it took time. A new national identity emerged.

Throughout the journey in the wilderness, the Israelites experienced palpable, breathtaking, divine encounters. God showed up visibly and powerfully in the transition. There was nothing subtle about God's leadership in this season. They had what they needed at the moment they needed it.



And that will be our story as well. We are embarking on an adventure with God. I'm grateful to be on this journey with you!




Fall Kickoff! Nurturing Our Faith Adult Education: What's Happening?

3. "Dialogue for Change" meets by Zoom each Sunday, 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., through August and into the fall (no meeting on September 6, Labor Day Weekend). The "Dialogue for Change" discussion series gives participants a safe place to explore racial issues and our own feelings. and to show our own personal compassionate engagement against racial insensitivity and injustice through self-reflection and education. Pastor Mantu will be hosting many of the discussions. A Ted Talk video sets the theme of the day, followed by a facilitated discussion. Action takeaways to end racism:

- Learn—use available print and media resources.
- Notice—who is included or excluded in your daily activities; how are people shown or treated?
- Pray—this is the spiritual work of overcoming racism. Support activities defusing racial injustice.
- **Show up**—stay engaged, even when you want to shrink away. Defuse racially insensitive speech or action; stand with a person suffering abuse; don't keep silent. Advocate for a better, more diverse, more equitable way.


Autumn Is a Season of Change

Dialogue for Change Continues This Fall

This Sunday morning adult education series launched last July, and it has been so positively received that it will continue this fall in the same format. We watch short videos and have facilitated discussions about them in various formats (small groups, large group, chat boxes) to help us learn and understand more about the racial issues confronting us. The goal is compassionate engagement against racial insensitivity and injustice through continued self-reflection and education. Toward that goal, we have created a resource for making small and big changes in our thinking and behavior.


Things we learned about this summer included the phenomenon of white Americans calling the police on Black Americans who have committed the crimes of eating, walking or generally "living while Black," and the "dental hygiene model of antiracism"—you keep working on it daily, talking about it, and facing it because prejudice is all around us in media and social stimuli, and it builds up in us like plaque on our teeth! We learned about the power of our unconscious bias to influence our decisions, and counterintuitively, at times when it's important to us to be fair. But by far the most significant learning was what we received from the personal stories shared on August 2 by members of our own church family.

We hope you will plan to join us this fall for more exciting and challenging sessions of Dialogue for Change. Topics will explore mass incarceration, white privilege, implicit bias, the book *White Fragility* by Robin DiAngelo, and more. The Speaking Out Study Group is a program of the Speaking Out Committee that focuses on education and growth in racial awareness and authentic Christian discipleship. Group members come together to learn, reflect, hold one another accountable, and encourage action that gives life to our intentions to be allies to persons of color. We study white privilege, systemic racism, racial equity, and other topics related to racial injustice and white normativity. We eagerly welcome new members who share this commitment!

We take turns leading by selecting something for the group

to read, view or listen to during the week which we then discuss during our meeting. The person who made the selection provides discussion questions, determines the for-



mat for our discussion, and leads the discussion. Another volunteer opens with prayer or a devotional reading.



The History of Christianity From the Reformation to the Modern Megachurch


Sundays, September 6 through November 22 10 to 11 a.m. via Zoom

Getting Ready for Courtyard Services

Reminder: Joining in live stream worship on Facebook or downloading services from YouTube are still the safest way to worship.

Thank you to Boyd Hasik, Brian Roberts, Jeff Lang, Marilyn Clarke and Susan Dowling for their recent efforts to set up the courtyard for up to forty worshipers each Sunday for outdoor services. The next scheduled worship service on the church campus is September 13.

As a reminder, if you attend a courtyard service, you should not move furniture yourself: please ask a monitor to assist you with your seating if you want an adjustment. The volunteers who set up the area have given careful consideration to the amount of sun a particular area gets during the scheduled worship time and have tried to place seating to optimize shade as well as social distancing. If appropriate social distancing can't be maintained while giving you some shade, then you may be reseated for everyone's safety.

It is not clear how many Sundays services will be available outside. The weather must be cooperative, and public health policies for the county and state must continue to permit them.

Remember, we will continue to live stream services at 9 a.m., and worshipping at home is the safest way to worship.

September Communion Offering

The September Communion offering will be going to the **Discovery Counseling Center of the San Ramon Valley**. Established in 1971, community-based, nonprofit Discovery Counseling Center offers affordable and high-quality mental health services for individuals and families in the greater San Ramon Valley community. Some of the services offered include individual therapy for children through seniors, couples, family and group counseling; school counseling intervention programs; alcohol and drug recovery; counseling for LGBTQ individuals, and more.

This venerable, local organization works in schools and other community outlets to reach people in all stages of life and facing a variety of struggles, from divorce to substance abuse. The Discovery Center has two counseling centers, one located in Danville (Town and Country Shopping Center, near McCaulou's) and a satellite center located in San Ramon.

Together with San Ramon Valley Unified School District, The Discovery Counseling Center offers anti-bullying programs EmpowHer and Guy'd to Greatness, which has operated in ten of the district's elementary schools to reach its fourth- and fifth-graders. Discovery Counseling Center also provides the school district with a program

for students receiving a first-time alcohol, tobacco or marijuana suspension to offer counseling as a means to reduce suspension days.

Furthermore, its mental health services create a training environment for a few students completing their post-masters or third-year doctoral education under the supervision of licensed Psy.D., MSW and MFT staff.

The **Thrift Station** opened in 1973 to support the Discovery Center's efforts and has become a fixture of downtown Danville. Give to the Center by donating quality household items and clothing for the Thrift Station to sell at their 486 San Ramon Valley Boulevard location in Danville, at the Crossroads shopping center. Bring your gently used clothes, shoes and household items to the back door of the store to drop them off. You can also shop there yourself, Monday through Friday, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Finally, you could opt to volunteer at the Thrift Station. Over one hundred volunteers manage sales, take in donations, sort, price and display donated items available for sale in the shop. *Contact thriftsta-tion@discoveryctr.net or call the Thrift Station at (925) 820-1988*.

Winter Nights in 2020-21

Winter Nights is trying to adapt to current regulations and circumstances in their planning for the 2020-21 homeless housing season. They have circulated a plan that has each church hosting for four weeks. They anticipate food delivery to be partly from restaurants and partly from the congregations. There will be a reduced number of homeless guests. They emphasize the need for the guests to have freedom to leave the facility for recreation and exercise.

I have discussed this plan with Pastor Kim and our partners, St. Isidore's and Danville Congregational. We all reluctantly agree: There is no way we can participate in Winter Nights under these circumstances. We have become very knowledgeable with the regulations and constraints in the process of working to initiate an outdoor service. This plan simply will not work for us.

I have so informed Winter Nights, expressed our regret, and offered fundraising and meal delivery for up to a week to an outside drop location. Our partners will probably assist with that.

Winter Nights may come back with another plan. However, I think they are under some serious constraints, as are we.

For now, at least, it looks like we will not be hosting Winter Nights in Wesley Center this coming season. In fact, I wonder how many churches will find that they can do what is being asked. It is with a heavy heart that I convey this disappointing news to you.



"Your faithful support—in so many ways—makes all the difference in the lives of our vulnerable neighbors!"




