A Reflection on the Meaning of Christmas and the Winter Solstice

Pastor's Pulse ~

Have you ever felt like *Peanuts'* Linus at Christmastime, wondering what it is really all about? This Christmas, many of us might feel off-balance with all that is happening in the nation and world. We might be clinging to our emotional blankets trying to make sense of a season that with all the changes to traditions from the pandemic might feel like it is falling away from us in 2020. This is OK, because Christmas is really supposed to catch the falling stars of disappointments, fears and uneasiness. Christmas is about a light that comes in our darkest moments.

Christmas shows up close to the winter solstice, which is not a coincidence. Almost all cultures have celebrations during the darkest times of the year when we are leaning away from the sun, at least in the Northern Hemisphere. Most of these celebrations are about the light coming back into our lives. For example, Diwali, well-known in Indian circles and in several faith traditions, is a celebration of light. Growing up, my dad would leave the Christmas lights up all year around in our windows

with the plug attached to a light switch. Every few weeks, he would flip the switch and say, "Merry Christmas!", or turn them on with a grin and say, "Happy Diwali!" If there was a Jewish friend, he would proclaim again "Happy Hanukkah!" for the Jewish festival that also revolves around this concept of light in the darkness.

Advent, the season before Christmas, was originally a preparation before the light would return during Epiphany, that time we often celebrate the Magi coming to meet and warn the Christ child. It was a time of discipleship and readying for baptism which would happen at Epiphany, much like Lent is a preparation for Easter.

What is the light that you need in your life right now? Do you feel like you have lost your way? Does it feel the aftermath of the elections and the unrest in our communities have you in a dark rabbit hole of endless despairing?

Take heart. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it **(John 1:5)**. This is the promise behind Christmas, the deep-down, from-your-mind-through-your-body-into-your-spine assurance that nothing can separate you from the light.

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Many of us have lived through a dark night of the soul experience. Losing someone close to us—so close that we feel they have been surgically removed from our own bodies. A breakage of trust. The death of a marriage. A loss of ourselves into the folds of depression.

Take heart. The light shines more than over the hill in Bethlehem. It shines across the globe and, if necessary, even underground, with silent persistence through the dark holes of our numbed pain. The light exposes our faults and failures, and like the shepherds, we have reason to at first fear it. But in the end, the light holds over the place where we, too, must lay. We reckon, and after being exposed by the light, we cannot help but follow it. These are not fairytale promises, just the blessed assur-

ance that the worst measures of our "Silent Night"-ness cannot block us from the light. It always comes back as we again lean into it, and the days finally stretch forward into hope. We may not be able to pass the light from candle to candle in the pews this year, but the light will still come to every silent night.

As Linus said in the beloved holiday special, "Lights please." And he continued...

"And there were in the same country shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. And lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them: and they were sore afraid. And the angel said unto them, 'Fear not:"

The California-Nevada Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church and GLIDE Joint Statement on Reaching Successful Agreement

The following is issued on behalf of Bishop Minerva G. Carcaño, California-Nevada Conference of The United Methodist Church and Karen Hanrahan, President and CEO of GLIDE.

The California-Nevada Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church (CNAC) and Board of Trustees of the Glide Foundation (GLIDE) have reached an agreement that provides for each entity to pursue different aspects of Lizzie Glide's Trust as wholly separate and autonomous organizations.

San Francisco philanthropist Lizzie Glide established the Trust in 1929 in memory of her late husband, J.H. Glide, to advance Christian Protestant religion, education and charity in San Francisco. To fulfill her wishes, she installed GLIDE as trustee of property located at 330 Ellis Street, which she wanted used to benefit all the people of San Francisco, and to support the creation of an evangelistic training center for preaching and teaching in conformity with the doctrines of the Methodist Church.

Over time, as San Francisco changed, so too did the relationship between GLIDE and CNAC, along with their respective understanding of their roles on how best to bring Lizzie Glide's wishes to life. GLIDE and CNAC entered into discussions in 2018 to determine a new path forward. The agreement reached embodies their efforts to realize the goals of the Trust in the 21st Century and beyond.

Pursuant to the parties' agreement, GLIDE has filed paperwork with the probate court requesting approval for modifications to the Trust which will further Lizzie Glide's desires, while also providing both GLIDE and CNAC with full financial and legal autonomy.

GLIDE will transfer Trustee responsibility to CNAC for the Trust and will also transfer responsibility for a restricted fund that was established last century in large part to advance Methodist teachings. Combined, these accounts now contain \$4.5 million in invested restricted funds that grew out of Lizzie Glide's original contributions. The Trust will be renamed the "J.H. Glide United Methodist Trust" and used to carry out the mission of The United Methodist Church—making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world, sending persons into the world to live lovingly and justly as servants of Christ healing the sick, feeding the hungry, caring for the stranger and freeing the oppressed. In addition, CNAC, if it chooses to do so, may incorporate a church in San Francisco under the name "J.H. Glide Memorial United Methodist Church" to advance United Methodist teachings.

In recognition of the long-term and unique relationship between GLIDE and The United Methodist Church, GLIDE will also provide \$1.5 million to CNAC, drawing from a separate account for investment returns. No donor funds given to GLIDE will be used for any payment under this agreement.



The agreement further provides that GLIDE will retain title to the facility at 330 Ellis Street so it may be used, as it has been for decades, to benefit all San Franciscans through GLIDE's expansive, transformative programs and community of unconditional love, hope and inclusion. GLIDE will also maintain its church and spiritual community at 330 Ellis Street, welcome to all people and unaffiliated with The United Methodist Church.



Both CNAC and GLIDE are hopeful for a timely and successful approval by the Court followed by a new chapter in fulfilling Lizzie Glide's wishes for future generations.

December Communion Offering Putnam Clubhouse

Have you heard the term "Serious Mental Illness?" (SMI) It's a term of the art. It refers to people with illnesses like bipolar disorder, schizophrenia-spectrum disorders, and severe major depression. Did you know that one out of 25 people in Contra Costa County have diagnosed SMI? This is a huge public health issue that doesn't get talked about very much.

<u>Putnam Clubhouse</u> is a nonprofit located in Concord that is doing something to help people with SMI. People with SMI tend to live lonely lives in inexpensive housing units around the county. Putnam Clubhouse is there to be a friend. Putnam helps folks with classes, resumés, job interviews, art projects, get-togethers, celebratory meals and much, much more.

SRVUMC has been helping out Putnam for several months. **Currently, we are fielding ten drivers a week to deliver food and information to Putnam "members."** We are participating in big deliveries of Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners. This has been pretty much different from anything any of us has ever done before.

Putnam is a terrific nonprofit. They really care and have a wonderful synergy going with their members. I highly recommend them for your support.

Trinity Center Named Nonprofit of the Year by Senator Steve Glazer

Senator Steve Glazer (D-Contra Costa) recently recognized Walnut Creek's Trinity Center, where SRVUMC volunteers have a longstanding partnership, as Nonprofit of the Year for his district. He presented the organization with this honor in a livestream presentation on November 18.

During the coronavirus pandemic, Trinity Center has offered 56,000 services to 970 homeless or low-income individuals according to *The Patch*. *The Patch's* online article also provides a quote from Senator Glazer:

"I am proud to honor Trinity Center for its vital work in keeping people safe and providing them with much needed services during this trying time of the coronavirus pandemic," said Senator Glazer. "Trinity Center's work is a lifeline for people who otherwise might not make it. Nonprofit organizations like Trinity are doing heroic work that cannot be undervalued."

As "Nonprofit of the Year", Trinity Center gains recognition for its support of struggling individuals in its community. The center is one in a diverse constellation of nonprofits recognized by state senators across California for a range of services.

Church Council Takeaways

November 17, 2020 Meeting

ARC Status During Pandemic • Stewardship Update • Healthy Church Initiative

Monthly Church Council meetings are conducted via Zoom during the pandemic, but any church member or constituent is welcome to attend. If you wish to join a church council meeting, then please contact **Church Council Chair Debra Carter** at <u>hermine2@icloud.com</u> for the Zoom meeting ID and password. If you ever wonder how decisions get made at SRVUMC, these monthly meetings are your chance to learn! Unfortunately, you will have to provide your own snacks while meetings are conducted virtually, but you can do it from your favorite chair at home. Here are a few takeaways from the November meeting.

Idea Discussion (Pastor Kim): This opening period of the church council meeting addresses ongoing concerns that don't neatly fit into a category like "Finance" or "Board of Trustees." In November, the headlines from this discussion time included:

1. Re-Opening Task Force: While the county remains in the purple tier ("Widespread", the worst category) for COVID-19 incidence, the church will conduct no indoor services. Consequently, Christmas Eve services will be live streamed via Facebook. Pastor Kim observed that some small groups have been meeting outside, but she emphasized that groups should not meet indoors.

2. ARC (Lyn Arscott): in accordance with the county, the facility is currently shut down and will likely remain so through year-end. Expenses for ARC exceed income for the year, but these will be paid from reserves.

3. Healthy Church Initiative: See Pastor Mantu's remarks in the Pastors' Reports below.

Finance (Jeff Stroin): A portion of the church's PPP loan is not eligible for forgiveness, so it will either be repaid or kept as a loan for up to five years at 1% interest. The Finance Committee will make a recommendation as to how to use these funds.

SPRC (Steve Roath): The Staff-Parish Relations Committee (SPRC) has conducted its evaluation of pastors' compensation. For the first six months of 2021, Pastor Kim has offered to take a \$1500/month pay cut to ease the financial burden on the church. Steve emphasized that Pastor Kim's generous offer in no way reflects her performance. Pastor Mantu, holding a three quarters-time position, maintains his current salary. SPRC is planning no raises for other church staff in 2021.

Stewardship (Pastor Kim): Pastor Kim observed that this will be a tough year for churches. Methodist churches across the nation anticipate about a 10% reduction in income for 2021. So far, we have pledges totaling \$485,000 from 82 pledge units, fewer than half our usual pledge units, but this level of response is similar to what we typically experience at about this time of year. Pastor Kim has begun contacting people. Some forgot; some have hardship issues.

Trustees (Steve Garnick): Trustees are working on an office rehab project to address pandemic safety for staff to work there, e.g., Plexiglass barriers. Currently, staff mainly works from home, as the campus remains closed. Trustees plan to share the plan with Church Council at the December meeting and have invited Office Manager Susan Dowling to present it.

Pastors' Reports: Pastor Mantu is working on the pathway to discipleship part of the Healthy Church Initiative. His team is wrestling with questions such as: What does discipleship look like? Once people are connected, how do we help them grow in their discipleship? Should small groups be open or closed to new membership, and why? His team is coached by Phil Maynard, who wrote the book on Healthy Church Initiatives.

Pastor Kim is working with SPRC to right-size our staff. Some employees will move from salaried to hourly, and some may see a reduction in hours, and pay. Nobody will lose his or her healthcare, and no changes will be made during the holidays.

- Next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, December 15, 2020 via Zoom.
- Pastor Kim reminds us that we have an upcoming Church Conference at 5 p.m. on Sunday, December 13 via Zoom.
