Connecting in Youth Ministry

"Do you wanna play inside or outside? Your choice." This was how each of my confirmation classes would end, right after some deep discussion on baptism or peace and justice issues. I always chose outside so that I could play nerf football with the other youth. Our pastor was almost always the quarterback and me a wide receiver. We often connected on long passes deep into the end zone, which were the trees at the back end of the parking lot. They also acted as extra defenders as the branches seemed to reach out and knock down most efforts.

I cannot say what was more important for me in those days, the learning about God, or the experience of connecting with the football thrown by my pastor. I suppose the line between the learning and the connecting was blurred. Youth ministry, when it is at its best, is about relationships as much as it is about learning about faith. Perhaps one cannot be understood without the other, especially at this stage of life. And when the whole congregation takes time to connect, that is when more and more youth make it to the end zone, that place where the grace of God in their lives gives them purpose and a deeper sense of belonging.

I have had the opportunity, along with **Steven Roath** and others, to listen to our families with youth and to dream about what would be lifegiving in the next chapter of youth ministry at SRVUMC. The sharing was heartfelt and sincere and still continues. Like me, some people shared their own experiences growing up and the deep love they had for the youth of this congregation. There were moments when our eyes were filled with tears as we learned how the current ministry was already absolutely vital to their child. Our thanks go to Rebecca Bernstein, our outgoing Director of Youth ministry for the ways she has connected with our youth over the last years. She will be missed.

SRVUMC Property Tax Update

We recently received good news from the Contra Costa County Assessor's Office with regard to the ad valorem property tax obligations of the church (taxes based on property value).

Over the years, we have made a priority of community service and outreach by allowing certain groups and activities on our campus. To do so can have tax consequences, so it became necessary to obtain a "welfare exemption." After three years of working with the Assessor's Office, we have been granted both the renewal of our religious exemption and a welfare exemption. For the 2018 and 2019 tax years, these are only partial exemptions due to several noncomplying uses during those years. We will have to pay a total of \$43,973 which is about 23% of what could have been assessed with no exemptions. For 2020 and beyond, we have a 100% welfare exemption, i.e., no ad valorem taxes at all. (Note: regardless of exemptions, the church is still obligated to pay special assessments, bonds, etc.)

Thanks to financial commitments over the years and careful stewardship by our congregation, we have the resources in the Council Reserve Fund to pay this expense, and Church Council has voted to approve it. We will fulfill our tax obligation and move forward to discover new ways to welcome community groups to our campus in mindful and strategic ways. New guidelines for campus use by outside groups will soon be available through the church office. 

Tips for SRVUMC Communications

(Even for Experienced Leadership)

What To Say: Your Facts Are Gold

Your facts are gold! Typos and fonts change with a couple of mouse clicks, but people only know the details you provide. If you need some help deciding what to say, here's the template newsletter announcements follow to get you started:

Name of Your Event Date, Time Location (even if it's Zoom)

Add a sentence or two if you have some other important details to share, but don't agonize over brilliant marketing copy. Last sentence has contact information. *Be deliberate about how much personal information you share here because the newsletter will be accessible via the website.*

How To Connect With the Most Readers: media@srvumc.org

Get your message out there to multiple sites most easily by sending your announcement to one email address, media@srvumc.org. Linda, Lisa, Shana and Patsy all access this account. Using one account lets us share clip art and other important details. Help us build the habit of using this account for better consistency in our messages.

How To Send Your Info: We're Flexible If You Are

Word documents are how Lisa edits and archives written content from newsletter contributors, so these are easiest for her. *Important: Please don't struggle to add an image or photo to your Word document.* Send images and photos as separate files and let us integrate them with software that is much easier to use for the task.

- You might also consider writing your announcement copy directly into your email.
- PDFs can be tricky. Please share a relevant PDF, but understand that it will not appear as-is in the
 newsletter or Friday Memo. Small fonts become hard to read, and images can become blurry. If
 the PDF is important for everyone to see, then please send it to media@srvumc.org with a request to have it posted to the church website.
- Remember that people get news from different sources. Facebook doesn't suit everyone. Maybe
 Friday Memo seems like a lot to absorb at the start of the weekend. Announce everywhere you can.




Dialogue For Change

For every church member and friend, we highly recommend an eleven-minute video, "Racism and the Church: Where Do We Go from Here?" It is the powerful testimony of five young Black adults speaking about their faith and experience. You won't regret taking a few moments to view this poignant testimony.

From Pain to Purpose

As disciples of Christ, we seek to become aware of and educated about issues in our community so that we might provide support to causes that touch our hearts. Dialogue for Change is a forum for sharing information about justice issues. It occasionally focuses on a particular current event as an avenue for living our faith through advocacy or protest.

This month, we are celebrating the state Assembly's unanimous passage of **The Miles Hall Lifeline Act: AB 988 Suicide and Mental Health Crisis**. God works to bring good out of tragedy, and that is what appears to have happened in the death of Miles Hall. Miles was a 23-year-old Black man with mental health issues who lived with his family in Walnut Creek. He was in the midst of a schizophrenic mental health crisis when his family reached for the only source of help available—calling 911. Despite having information about Miles' condition, officers resorted to lethal force within a minute of their arrival.

In April of this year, Craig Stevens, San Ramon's Chief of Police, reported at a Town Hall on Mental Health Awareness, "During 2020 our department experienced an **80%** increase in individual mental health crisis (911) calls. What is alarming is that **36%** of these individuals in crisis were juveniles." This could be one of our families.

As a hopeful response to critical situations like these, **The Miles Hall Lifeline Act: AB 988 Suicide and Mental Health Crisis Hotline** calls for a new three-digit phone number, 9-8-8, **Continued next page.**

for suicide prevention and immediate, localized emergency response for individuals in mental health crisis by trained mental health professionals. This bill will designate crisis hotline centers to provide intervention 24/7 through call, chat, and text. These call centers will be able to deploy crisis services like mobile crisis teams and crisis stabilization services as well as provide follow-up services.


Between The Bookends

Offering a Christian Presence After a Wildfire

It is so devastating for survivors to return to a home lost in a wildfire. But there is always hope that a keepsake or family heirloom made it. Our United Methodist Early Responders offer a caring presence and the protective clothing and tools to safely access the toxic ash and help search the dangerous site.

Thanks to the generosity of our SRVUMC congregation, we assembled 30 wildfire buckets and the related tools a couple of weeks ago. Ten volunteers filled the buckets and staged everything for delivery to our assigned stocking location—the United Methodist Church in Ukiah, California.

Our California-Nevada Conference is stockpiling nearly 500 wildfire buckets, 125 ash sifters, dozens of cleaning buckets, crates of emergency hygiene kits and hundreds of rakes and shovels. These supplies will be in storage at United Methodist Churches in Pinole, Sacramento, Stockton and Ukiah, plus one planned Sierra location. Our donation will launch the Ukiah site. This connectional wildfire ministry will also support the needs of the other UMC Conferences in the Western United States.

What a blessing you are! While we pray that wildfires will not be bad this year, we are ready to respond if they are.
