# Introducing "The Trail"

A New Creative Image That Will Guide Our Process of Discipleship

You've just won the Super Bowl. Where are you going to go next? I'm going to go to Disney World!

This is what the MVP of the game would often yell at the end of the game. What if they answered instead, I'm going to church! Or better yet, what if the church was more like Disney World?

I don't mean that church would be simply for amusement or to make money. Disney is a multibillion-dollar empire. I mean more the original dream of Disney. Where one person saw swampland and had a vision for taking that alligator paradise, filling it with ferry boats and theme-filled rides, even a monorail.

Well, over the last year of COVID, we took advantage of our forced hibernation as a church to find our own SRVUMC imagineers and see what dream we could build for the future of discipleship in the church. Much like Disney, we looked for a theme that would speak to our next years in a way that people could quickly understand. Of course, Pirates of the Caribbean would not work for us, but we went deep into Scripture and our Methodist roots. We tried to figure out which theme would come up.

After much prayer and months of deliberation, we had a meeting that we thought would take at least a couple of hours to come upon a theme. Instead, it took about fifteen minutes. The group quickly gained consensus that "The Trail", based upon the Iron Horse Trail that runs through our San Ramon Valley Area and beyond, would be our theme.




Dr. Amy-Jill Levine, professor at Vanderbilt University, will take us through the Old Testament in a way we have not experienced. Dr. Levine states that she thinks religion is the best undergraduate major in college, at least in terms of the humanities and the social sciences, because you have to have knowledge of a diversity of subjects: literary criticism, anthropology, economics, political science, history, art, mythology and cross-cultural studies. This will be an academic approach to the Old Testament, but as Dr. Levine writes, "The academic approach should give believers, agnostics, atheists, and those whose religions fall outside the biblical purview all a deeper understanding of the text."

#### 5 Tips for Better Listening From Stephen Ministry By Lisa Jancarik

Think about the last time you were really struggling. The people who made you feel most empowered were the ones who listened carefully to what you had to say about your circumstances, even if (maybe especially if!) they didn't try to fix it for you.

Stephen Ministry trains its lay ministers to listen to people who are struggling in a caring, nonjudgmental way. It doesn't take long for us to start finding these good practices useful in our own daily lives, though, which is why we are sharing these five tips with you.

Here are a few nuggets that are especially helpful:

Get ready to listen. Put away your phone. Don't look at your watch. No multitasking while the other person is talking. You can sit still for a few minutes, and five minutes of genuine interest in someone else makes a huge difference to them. In my family of scientific eggheads, we like data. That means someone might be using the phone to check facts on the internet relevant to our lunchtime discussion, but it still makes the fact checker seem less interested in what other people at the table are saying.

Open-ended questions are more revealing. You only think you
know what's going on with someone. Before you ask, consider whether you've phrased a yes-orno question. When I have rephrased questions to my teenager, I've learned all kinds of stuff I
wouldn't have thought to ask about directly. For example, watch out for "Did you...?" as a way to
start a question because a person could simply say yes or no without offering detail. Make "Did
you feel angry when that happened?" into "How do you feel about what happened?"

- **"Tell me more" is never the wrong thing to say.** An important corollary to the open-ended questions point is that not steering the conversation at all can sometimes yield a lot of surprising information.
- Silence really is golden. Get comfortable with not saying anything for a few beats, letting your partner in conversation fill the void. Maybe there is some natural little activity you can do for a moment, like prepare another cup of coffee, while they think of something to say. Just don't use the quiet as time to check those devices, or you'll imply that you've lost interest in talking.
- Watch body language. Does what a person says match with posture and facial expression? If not, then you might consider probing more gently. Also pay attention to your own body language. Leaning forward and making eye contact are commonly suggested ways to improve your connec-

tion in the conversation, and you should do those things *if they feel natural*. The key is not to force them: sometimes people will lean back if you lean forward because they want more personal space. Sometimes prolonged eye contact can be interpreted as a stare. For example, I have my best conversations with my teenager in the car, when I *can't* look her in the eye, because it feels less intimidating for her. If you're unsure about eye contact in a given situation, then glance over at someone and notice if they are looking back.

The confidential conversations between a Stephen minister and his or her care receiver let the person in pain explore feelings and contemplate choices available independently. Listening is foundational to practicing Stephen Ministry because it builds trust and fosters warm relationships. The hidden benefit to all that training is that we use those listening skills in all other parts of our lives, and you can, too.



Watch for more opportunities to explore race, racism and antiracism in this adult education forum. This committed group began plumbing the depths of this topic in 2020 with videos, reading of the book **White Fragility**, and self-reflection in the context of what participants have learned. Join with an open heart and open mind, ready to explore and, maybe, be surprised!

Fall 2021 activities are coming soon, so watch for ways to work into your calendar this opportunity to expand your understanding of race and racism!

# Mission Trip to Assist With Recovery From the Camp Fire

The Camp Fire, November, 2018 was **the deadliest and most destructive wildfire in California history.** Tragically, 85 people died. The fire burned over 150,000 acres and more than 18,000 structures. The towns of Paradise, Concow, Magalia and Butte Creek were largely destroyed.

Signup is now available for a mission trip, **October 10 through 15, 2021**, to help rebuild. We will be working in Paradise, teamed with Hope Crisis Response Network (HCRN). We will drive up on October 10, work the week of October 11, and return Friday afternoon, October 15.



We will be staying at housing provided by HCRN. Two people share a bedroom with a shared bath between rooms, plus gathering room and dining area. The limit on this trip is twelve people.

We will receive our work assignment about a week beforehand. HCRN is providing the tools.

The cost will be \$175. This includes the cost of carpooling, food and accommodations. *For questions or to register, contact Steve Elliott at* <u>sae612@msn.com</u> *or* 925-362-8697.

### **Responding to the Dixie Fire**

Now the largest such fire in California history, the Dixie Fire is a devastating moment in time. Small

towns, like Greenville, Crescent Mills, Canyon Dam and others have been virtually wiped off the map. No lives lost yet, but many lives changed.

The California Nevada Conference is responding. The UMC churches in Quincy, Portola, Greenville and Susanville are assisting evacuees. The Conference Early Response Team served for three days at the Local Assistance Center in Quincy this past weekend. We expect to return as the next assistance locations open. We will be responding over the coming weeks as survivors need help with housing, food, clothing and living expenses.

The most important part of our services is to be a ministry of presence—listening to survivors as they

grieve their loss, express their fears and ponder an uncertain future. The local pastors and the Early Response Team have a willing ear and open heart.

Most of the survivors are long-term hill country residents living a modest lifestyle in close-knit communities. They know and care for each other over generations. We are struck by how these proud people are reluctant to ask for the help they now need from the "outside" world.

In addition, our immediate support has included over \$10,000 worth of gift cards, emergency hygiene kits, wildfire buckets, cleaning supplies and local church assistance. We envision this support repeating, plus addressing other needs, as the next few weeks unfold. Even now, we anticipate the long -term recovery.

The most immediately useful way to help is to donate financially. You can donate to a fund we have set up here at SRVUMC. Steve Elliott, from our church, is directly involved in helping to lead the Conference Dixie Fire Response and will make sure our donations are used well. *Just note Dixie Fire on your donation in some fashion*. We are determined to see this tragic event through. Our prayers and support will help many survivors.



For fifty years, this nonprofit organization has been a leader in the community for mental wellness. It embraces goals of building mental health awareness in the community at large and underscoring the importance of mental wellness treatment, as well as training future mental health professionals.

Discovery Counseling Center has a range of tools to address all manner of mental wellness concerns, from play therapy and anti-bullying programs to stress management counseling for teens and programs geared to seniors. The center also supports the Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention Team (ADAPT), which focuses on prevention of substance abuse among minors.

The last eighteen months have presented mental health challenges for many youth and families. The start of the school year will present new challenges.
