Reflecting on My Two Years With You

I remember my first Sunday at San Ramon Valley UMC. It was a lot like every pastor's worst nightmare. The church was empty! We were in the thick of the pandemic, and we were shut down other than the services we broadcast through the internet. Some Sundays, it was just

me, Pastor Kim, Nadia, Linda Green and Jeff Lang or another technical volunteer in those first days. I was told to preach to the exit sign. I remember my prayer was that somehow you all would still feel the grace of God and hear the message you needed to make it through the pandemic. I poured all the love I could muster into that exit sign. I'll never look at an exit the same again.



What astonished me most was the faithfulness of so many during one of the most challenging times in our lifetimes for faith communities. I think about Nancy Garnick and the number of times she patiently found liturgists, even in the pandemic. Ann Radick patiently kept us alive with her ushering team. I cannot tell you how many times I would come into a nearly empty church, and I would marvel at Wendy Cooper or Bob and Marla Schleicher, or Bob Tharalsen (and others!) faithfully ushering and welcoming even if we had just a few in-person worshippers. Sometimes, Skip George would squeeze my arm and offer encouragement that the church would come back to strength. What they did not know was how inspired I was just with their faithful presence. How, again and again, I would see people faithfully care for one another. I remember so many of you offered food and support (like Bob Baker) for Putnam House and for first-line workers. Again and again, you showed up and cared for more than yourselves.

On the small group front, leaders like Sandy Gsand, Bill Rust, Brad Stribling and Bill Van Bezey

grappled with how to take care of their groups while managing hybrid requirements and inconsistent mask mandates. I heard stories of these leaders reaching out to people in crises even at risk to themselves. I think of the Sunday after Sunday that people like Tom Roy showed up in case there was a family with youth ready to return to in-person Sunday School. How patiently he waited and prepared for the few or none to show up. Some families were just not ready to be more exposed to COVID or had lost their rhythm in going to church. But his spiritual maturity invited him to be ready, always, for these teens.

I wish I could mention you all, but that would require far too many pages. All of this volunteering, this faithful ministering, really blew me away because I knew I was getting to witness the heart of this congregation. That heart, which is never perfect, is always beating to circulate love, hope and sincere connection. It has been an honor to serve here.

What has surprised me most in these two years is how deeply I have fallen in love with the people of this congregation. I did not think that would happen, given that so many of us did not meet in person for a long time, and even so, rarely saw each other's faces for months at a time. Yet, like so many works of the spirit, unexpectedly this challenge is what helped me feel more bonded to you.

So, in May and June, I will say goodbye with gratitude and wish Rev. Andrew Davis my best as he follows me into the blessed community in July. How fortunate you will be to receive him, and how fortunate for him to experience you as well.



Great Decisions

Fireside Room (Zoom Available)



What are the great global policy decisions facing the U.S. and how should Christians respond? On April 24, our church started a series of eight weekly discussions on critical global issues using a guide prepared by the Foreign Policy Association (FPA). This program is part of an annual, nationwide program, whereby groups of concerned citizens throughout the U.S. will discuss why the issues are important and why we should be concerned.

The series will be facilitated by Lyn Arscott. A 20-minute

video prepared by the FPA, will be shown on each topic followed by a facilitated discussion. The discussion series guidebooks are available from the <u>FPA website</u> for \$32 plus postage.

- May 1, Climate Change—The ideological divide in the United States on the subject of climate change has impeded progress in curbing greenhouse emissions. But extreme weather events at both ends of the thermometer have focused attention on the consequences of inaction. What role will the United States play in future negotiations on climate?
- May 8. Russia and the US—Russia and the United States have many areas of conflict and some possible areas of mutual interest. Arms control, Russian interference in U.S. elections and support of cyberattacks, the status of Ukraine, the fate of opposition politicians in Russia, all continue to be concerning. How will the administration in Washington approach these issues?
- May 15, Myanmar and ASEAN—The situation in Myanmar, including the coup by the military in February 2021 and the ongoing human rights crises, coupled with civil resistance by those opposed to the regime, has led to the chaos in the Southeast Asian country. How are neighboring countries reacting, and what role will ASEAN play?
- May 23, Quad Alliance—As part of the U.S. pivot to Asia, the United States has been in dialogue
 with Japan, Australia, and India in an effort to contain China. Recently, the Quad countries held
 joint naval exercises in the South Pacific. How effective will the actions of this alliance be?
- May 29, Drug Policy in Latin America—The issue of migration to the United States from Latin America has overshadowed the war on drugs, which has been underway for decades with few signs of progress. What are the roots and the bureaucratic logic behind today's dominant drug policies in Latin America? Is it time to reconsider punitive drug policies that disrupt supply chains and punish drug possession?




It's Back!



Between the Bookends

Here are some books that were ready to be placed on the cart during the first three months of the pandemic. We hope you will enjoy them.



Bauermeister, Erica. House Lessons: Renovating a Life. Bauermeister and her husband buy a rundown Victorian house in Port Townsend, Washington because they feel magically drawn to it. Although the book has a lot of construction details, it also has gems about architecture and family life. The vivid writing gives one a feeling of being in the town of Port Townsend and experiencing the views and the charm as well as the muscle-wrenching work that the family does together. This biographical book is an interesting read dealing with the human feelings and transitions we all face as we grapple with the practicalities that life imposes upon us.



Bohnet, Jennifer. A *Riviera Retreat*. This engaging book has a plot inspired by the movie *Enchanted April*. In an effort to give back for her good fortune, the owner of an auberge near Cannes runs a contest to pick three women to enjoy a free ten-day vacation. The women chosen are of varied ages and backgrounds, but all are at crossroads in their lives. Their time at this auberge helps them come to terms with what they want to do in the years ahead. The lovely setting and the warm personalities of the various characters make this bit of comfort reading a good escape.



Goodwin, Daisy. Victoria. The author, Ms. Goodwin, a scholar from Cambridge with a degree in history also attended Columbia University's film school. With these credentials, she was the perfect person to create PBS's series, "Victoria." This book covers Queen Victoria's early years as a teenager and young queen. While the author was pursuing her history degree, she read Queen Victoria's youthful diaries! This enabled Ms. Goodwin to realistically reveal the young monarch's true feelings, rebelliousness, and strong will. Victoria's German mother and uncle, along with Prime Minister Melbourne serve as mentors and molders of her character. This book carries you into Victoria's

thoughts and decisions. The dialogue and events keep you turning the pages. An excellent book and realistic portrayal of the Queen.

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Richardson, Kim Michele, The Book Woman of Troublesome Creek. Young Cussy Mary is a librarian for the Pack Horse Library Project in Kentucky where she and her cantankerous mule deliver books to remote areas. Cussy, or Bluet as she is sometimes called, is descended from a French family with a gene that causes the skin to be blue because of a lack of oxygen in the blood. Much of the population that Cussy serves is poor, unhealthy, and uneducated. Cussy's life is difficult because her family is poor, and as a Blue, she is the target of prejudice. However, her ability to face obstacles and rise

above them is laudable. This interesting novel informs the reader about a library service that did exist in the 1930s and 40s and a genetic anomaly found in a real Kentucky family.

Out Into the World

Mission Trip to Assist in Camp Fire Recovery June 26 to July 1, 2022



From Camp Fire in 2018.

The Camp Fire, November, 2018 was the deadliest and most destructive wildfire in California history. Tragically, 85 people died. The fire burned over 150,000 acres and more than 18,000 structures. The towns of Paradise, Concow, Magalia and Butte Creek were largely destroyed.

Signup is now available for a mission trip to help rebuild. We will be working in Paradise teamed with Hope Crisis Response Network (HCRN). We will drive up on Sunday, June 26, work that week, and return Friday afternoon, July 1.

We will be staying at housing provided by HCRN. Two people per

bedroom with a shared bath between rooms, plus gathering room and dining area. The limit on this trip is twelve people. We will receive our work assignment about a week beforehand. HCRN is providing the tools.

Habitat for Humanity at Esperanza Place

This month's communion offering supports the ongoing volunteer efforts this church makes with Habitat for Humanity. San Ramon Valley UMC has a longstanding relationship with Habitat for Humanity East Bay/Silicon Valley, and June 25 will mark another day of faith and work on site at Habitat's Esperanza Place neighborhood.



The Neighborhood

The Esperanza Place development plans for eight buildings of townhomes surrounding a central community green space for common use by children and neighbors. The Las Juntas Way location situates the neighborhood along

Iron Horse Trail and close to BART and local bus routes to make public transportation a convenient option.

Each building consists of townhomes with one to four bedrooms. Overall, the planned capacity will house forty-two homeowners and their families. Qualifying families can apply for the Habitat home ownership program if they earn up to 120% of Contra Costa County's median income.

Zero Net Energy

Esperanza Place will be Habitat for Humanity's first Zero Net Energy development, finding ways to make green energy affordable. Solar panels and water-efficient landscaping not only makes these homes sustainable, but these features also produce more energy than the neighborhood consumes. However, best energy efficiency isn't just plopping some solar panels on a rooftop and calling it a day: If you're curious, check out what Habitat for Humanity in Sacramento lists as materials that go into an energy-efficient home design. Ultimately, Habitat plans to make energy more affordable for its residents.

Building new homes like these can be wonderfully satisfying for the volunteers who participate. Efforts here result in meaningful changes in standards of living for people who make their homes there. This month's offering will support the June 25 full day of work for twenty volunteers from SRVUMC. Participants must be age eighteen or older (Habitat will allow age sixteen with a waiver), but no experience is necessary.
