We would love to know of any locally-owned places, as we love supporting the local economy where we can.

Once again, Trevor and I really look forward to meeting you and being in ministry with this community. We are very much looking forward to getting to know you all both at the church and in the community. We eagerly anticipate seeing you in person or online on July 3, and I look forward to connecting with you as we begin our ministry together.






Towles, Amor, A Gentleman in Moscow. The gentleman is Count Alexander Rostov, and the Bolshevik government in 1922 Moscow doesn't know quite what to do with him. They acknowledge he was an early supporter of Revolution, but now they're not so sure. The man is an intellectual, which is always dangerous. So they banish him to the hotel where he'd been living in luxury, but now he has been moved to a tiny attic room. He is safe there, but if he leaves the hotel for any reason, he'll be shot. The Count forges a new life as he freely roams the hotel, getting to know those who work there, and

guests as they come and go. Full of wise and witty repartee and sparkling humor, this is also on every bestseller list. Stylish and memorable.



Benedict, **Marie**, *Carnegie's Maid*. During the time of the Irish famine, a family in Ireland decides to send their middle daughter to America to obtain work and, hopefully, be able to send money to them. As she leaves the overly crowded ship, she hears a man calling her name, Miss Clara Kelley. Could anyone know her name, she wonders. She answers the man who is calling out her name and begins her journey to Pittsburgh. It is there she learns that the other Miss Kelley, who unfortunately died while on board ship, has the position of being lady's maid to Mrs. Margaret Carnegie, Andrew Carne-

gie's mother. Throughout her days of being with her mistress, she begins to learn of Andrew's aspirations. As she becomes more at ease conversing with Andrew, she reveals to him some of her thoughts for the industry he is building. He ponders her ideas, and thereby the story evolves. This novel suggests a possible reason for Carnegie's philanthropic ways.




Ng, Celeste, Little Fires Everywhere. In her novel, Ng takes us through Shaker Heights, Ohio, a quiet, well-planned community with winding streets and pristine lawns surrounding elegant homes. It is there the reader encounters the Richardsons, a well-thought-of family in the Shaker community. Elena Richardson, the mother of four, is a journalist for the local newspaper. Her innate inquisitiveness leads to the first little fire to start. She pries into the background of her housekeeper, Mia Warren, the single mother of a teenage daughter. 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fast friends with the Richardson clan. Suspicious of this small family new to the Heights, Elena Richardson begins to uncover Mia's past only to learn that her prying will reveal unexpected disasters. The reader will enjoy comparing the book to the Hulu miniseries.



Grisham, John, *Calico Joe*. Once in a while, the master of legal fiction surprises us when he does something entirely different (remember *Skipping Christmas*)? He's done it again in this memorable novel about baseball. Baseball is John Grisham's passion, and while this is a work of fiction, he has written about the game circa 1979, when Juan Marichal, Tony Kubek and Willie Mays were giants in the sport. He places Calico Joe Castle in the middle of the story, and Joe becomes so real that one has to check Google to learn he really wasn't.

Update on the ARC

It is summer, and attendees of the church campus will notice daytime activity in the ARC from summer sports clinics. The ARC is available twelve hours a day, Monday to Saturday, and Sunday afternoons. During school terms, numerous youth leagues rent the ARC after school hours, but the youth activity is extended to more hours when schools are on vacation.

When the youth are not using the ARC, pickleball sessions are organized for the public three mornings per week and supervised by church volunteers. Times are reserved for church youth and adults on Wednesday evenings and Sunday afternoons.

This past spring, we were privileged to host a Special Olympics group for some of their programs. The ARC is part of our church's recreation ministry which has the objective of providing recreational services to church members and the community. The ARC operates on a sound, sustainable financial basis. Any group renting the ARC must be a registered charitable organization (501c3), must carry adequate insurance, and must sign a waiver of liability to protect the church from claims or damage. *For more information contact Lyn Arscott at lynarscott@comcast.net*.

July Communion Offering

Our July Communion offering will be donated to the Monument Crisis Center (MCC), a community-based, nonprofit family resource center for Central and East Contra Costa County. Located in nearby Concord, SRVUMC has had a tradition of support in the form of efforts or funding for Monument. Most recently, five SRVUMC volunteers (*Greg and Debbie Koos, Brian Uitti, Katy Mannell and Boyd Hasik*) assembled food packages for 120 of MCC's clients, illustrating the remarkable impact a few can have upon the health and well-being of many.

Monument began in 2003 with a small group of concerned citizens. Startup funding came from Safeway Foundation, the Salvation Army, Soroptimist International of Pleasant Hill and independent donors, while enthusiasm came from area high school students. On their first day of operation, they distributed food to 84 families.

Although food distribution remains their primary objective—especially during COVID—they also have developed adult education, youth and senior programs to address the various needs of their clients. During prepandemic times, these programs have included after-school tutoring, health screening and wellness classes, computer and language classes, and
