Dialogue for Change. What Is It? What's Next?

"Dialogue," according to Webster, is "an exchange of ideas and opinions." It can be both a noun and a verb. Dialogue for Change is the name of our adult education forum that capitalizes on both of these aspects: We learn about and exchange ideas and opinions regarding contemporary issues, with the emphasis on exchange because we grow in our faith when challenged to consider viewpoints different from our own. Dialogue for Change has the purpose of changing us to be wiser as God's servants in the world. And Dialogue for Change is the process by which we are seeking to accomplish this change of mind

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and heart. We do not come together to listen only to those who agree with us or to be made comfortable by reinforcing our existing opinions. Nor do we seek to learn without the vulnerability to be changed because of it. Therefore, we need folks who have different points of view to participate fully. That's what it means to be the body of Christ.

Dialogue for Change started as a way to respond to the racial upheaval surrounding the murder of George Floyd in May 2020. Several members of the congregation felt compelled as Christians to do something about racial injustice and our complicity in it—to learn more about history, diverse viewpoints, and alternative responses to racism. We have learned and exchanged—and changed—a lot, but we have by no means completed the work of becoming antiracist in the fullest meaning of that term. We will not simply “move on” from that reckoning.

Next Steps for Dialogue for Change

We now take a broader look at many issues that intersect with racism and influence our Christian love for and treatment of our neighbors. In fact, I'd encourage you to take a look at the argument that racism, while not the “worst” oppression in a sort of hierarchy of oppressions, is a fundamental factor in all systemic disparities in our nation. Explore current cultural issues like gun violence, abortion law, education curriculum, gender inclusivity, voting and elections, climate change, and other topics as an extension of our work on issues related to race.

Have you ever thought about how your faith has changed throughout your life? Come to this hour-long class ready to map turning points in your life of faith and share what changed you and why.

James Fowler's *Stages of Faith* is available for your review [here](#) as an optional exercise. How might breaking one's journey of faith into stages be helpful?

Consider these possible discussion questions or exercises:

1. Take out a piece of paper and draw a line across the page. At one end, write "Birth" and at the other end write "Present." Now, draw a cross on your timeline for every milestone of your faith (going to Sunday school, Confirmation, mission trips, going to college, finding a new church, marriage, life-altering events that affected your faith in some way, etc.).
2. Look at your timeline. Can you find any common thread to these events? What impact did these events have on you? How did they change you?
3. As a group, ask if anyone would like to share an event that changed them.
4. Have you honored the little and great deaths that you have endured along the way? How did these events change you?
5. Someone once said that only two things have the power to change us: Great suffering and great love. Have you found this to be true in your life?
6. What next step/action is God calling you to make in your journey of faith?
7. Close with a gratitude prayer.

The Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano provides ongoing nutritional support throughout the region through partner agencies and programs. Out Into the World

The Oak Fire—"I Have Never Asked for Help Before"

It seems so overwhelming when you lose your home. Traumatizing in so many ways. And for the Oak Fire, a widespread extended power cutoff expanded the damage footprint to hundreds more households that struggle to make ends meet anyway.

Our Cal-Nev Conference response was to participate for three days at the Local Assistance Center setup at the High School in Mariposa, California. Our ministry of presence offered a willing ear to listen to stories of escape, fear and now, hope for recovery. We gave out over \$20,000 in gift cards, hygiene kits, cleaning supplies and other survivor assistance.

We were one of many government and nonprofit organizations offering a broad array of services and support. Our participation was staffed by the Conference-wide Early Response Team and local Mariposa UMC volunteers. Our team included volunteers from seven churches across the Conference. We assisted 200 households that came to our table.

Our assistance was funded by the Conference Disaster Response Fund and supplies donated by Conference churches. Thank you, California-Nevada for your generosity!

Among the Many Stories...

Zack. "Zack" had come by our table late the second day when we were out of gift cards. We talked with him. He had "turned his life around." Heard about his many challenges and now, opportunities in life. I spoke with his boss at the Pioneer Market. She said he has really changed a lot while working there. Tons of progress, she said. Lives in "a shed" and lost all his possessions in the fire. During one of my many trips to the Market to buy more gift cards, "Zack" was there. He works as a bagger. I spoke with him, and he said he would come back on his lunch break at 5 p.m. Which he did. I had saved a gift card for him after we ran out again. He gave me a big hug and said thank you. This is what we are doing is all about.—*Steve Elliott*

Teapots. A neatly appearing 60s-ish woman...asked about tools that could be used for sifting through the ashes of her home. While we could send a team to do the sifting for her, she said she wanted to take look through the ruins herself. She was confident, calm, and clearly prepared mentally for what she faced. When we offered what she needed—a sifting box, shovel, rake, protective clothing, gloves, masks, and hand tools, she beamed with confidence. Amid her losses was an antique teapot collection. She wanted to see if she could find just one teapot in the rubble. She believed she would. We helped her out with tools of hope.—*Susan Hunn*

Rise Against Hunger began in 1998 as Stop Hunger Now! and is based in Raleigh, N.C. Since its original initiatives in distributing nutritious meals to the starving, this organization has broadened its efforts to improve food security for people worldwide. Rise Against Hunger trains farmers and families in agricultural methods and business skills. Many of these small-scale, local farmers provide the vegetables that are dehydrated for the Rise Against Hunger meals. Furthermore, the organization also works with in-country partners in the wake of disaster to provide crisis relief. Since 2005, volunteers have packaged over 540 million meals.

The Rise Against Hunger [website](#) reports distributing over 27.3 million meals in 2021 throughout 29 countries, including the United States. In the U.S., 17 million meals were packaged to 703,015 individuals. Seventy percent of the Americans served were children. The organization also provides millions of dollars of in-kind gifts. Much of the food included in the meals was raised in the U.S.

At San Ramon Valley UMC, we have sponsored meal-packing events, short mission opportunities great for entire families to do together. Our September communion offering funds dehydrated rice or soy meal, dehydrated vegetables, and spices along with 23 essential vitamins and minerals. As our volunteers know, a group of 40 to 50 volunteers can pack 10,000 meals in about two hours! This year's goal is to pack 14,488 and collect funds of \$5,505.
