








Anne Tyler, Redhead by the Side of the Road. Micah Mortimer joins Tyler's list of memorable characters. He seems content with the quiet and highly regimented life he chooses to live, but he is suddenly faced with startling change when his longtime "woman friend" suddenly leaves him. Just as suddenly, he is thrown into the unsettled life of a college student. We meet his large, extroverted family (no wonder he enjoys the quiet time!) and appreciate his client interactions as The Tech Hermit, who solves their computer problems. Along the way, we laugh out loud at numerous turns of phrase, smile quietly as we recognize universality in scenes, and are grateful for Tyler's ability to conjure up yet another character in her beloved Baltimore.



Bowen, Rhys, Above the Bay of Angels. Set in the age of Queen Victoria and taking place in London and Nice, France, this is both a mystery and a historical novel. Isabella Waverly is born into the aristocratic class, but due to the failures of her father, she ends up as a servant, first in the household of a mean-spirited woman and then, by taking advantage of a chance happening, a cook in the kitchen of Queen Victoria. Here she develops her bent for cooking, and in traveling with the Queen's household to Nice, she has a chance to expand her cooking skills and develop an appreciation for the French culture. But her experience is not without dangers from some unsavory characters. Read this fast-moving tale for a satisfying adventure.



Kim Michelle Richardson, The Book Woman's Daughter. Although the author did not intend Book Woman's Daughter to be a sequel to The Book Woman of Troublesome Creek, it turned out to be just that. The story begins with the life of Honey, Cussy Mary's daughter, as she is fighting to stay free or face prison until the age of twenty-one for being a blue-skinned person. Her birth parents and her present parents had the gene disorder that caused the skin on parts of the body to turn blue. Honey experienced this phenomenon if she became scared or anxious. When that happened, she would wear gloves that her mother made for her. She is saved from prison temporarily by going to live with Retta, her grandmother, who was granted guardianship.


However, her desire to be independent never wavered, and she applied for the outreach librarian position that her mother had held. When she did face a judge who would determine her life of inde-



















Did You Know?



Our Time in Paradise: Rebuilding From the Camp Fire

The Camp Fire, November 2018, was the deadliest and most destructive wildfire in California history. Tragically, 85 people died. The fire burned over 150,000 acres and more than 15,000 homes. The towns of Paradise, Concow and Magalia were largely destroyed. After a massive two-year cleanup and debris removal, rebuilding began in earnest in early 2021. Volunteer organizations began to scale up efforts to assist low-income survivors with construction of new homes. One such organization is Hope Crisis Response Network (HCRN).



HCRN came to California a few years ago to help survivors of the Valley Fire in Lake County and have been rebuilding for wildfire survivors of modest means ever since. At present, HCRN has four-teen homes under construction or in the pipeline.

Our September 2022 Mission Team was our second one this year. We were also there in June. There are four more UMC teams in October: The Retired Pastors Group, Eureka UMC, Santa Rosa UMC and Glendale UMC.

Our team included members of Asbury UMC in Livermore, San Ramon Valley UMC in Alamo, Berkeley UMC, and El Dorado County Federated Church in Placerville. We painted the interior, and we installed flooring, baseboards, trim, and doors in two homes. One of our clients was Deb. We got to know her in June and hear about her challenges recovering from the fire. She was so appreciative of our help.

Each day brought collectively rewarding work. We enjoyed the shared comradery and sense of purpose in helping two wildfire survivors. We also enjoyed evenings back at the dorm. We reflected on each day, shared devotional moments, and laughed at stories told. A particularly humorous moment was when we set off the fire alarm cooking dinner one evening.

Mission trips like this one are a unique blend of Christian love in action and a week-long small group experience. Tired by the end of the trip, we nonetheless came back savoring what it means to live a

ministry of presence in helping survivors of a horrific wildfire.

Wildfire Season—We Can Use Your Help

Thankfully, this year's wildfire season has not been as bad as last year. Nonetheless, over 365,000 acres have burned with almost 900 structures damaged or destroyed. Many hundreds of other homes impacted by smoke or power shutoff. Sadly, nine people have died.

Your Cal-Nev Conference has responded to five of the most significant fires. Our principal goal is to provide a "ministry of presence"—thoughtfully listening to survivor trauma, loss, and fears. Imagine the loss of everything you own—possessions yes, but loss of photos, family keepsakes and even pets bring the tears.

As one of our loyal volunteers, Mary Ellen Huey, said, "Our modest heartfelt survivor support is so gratefully appreciated."

Mark Buenafe, Pastor of Mariposa UMC, serves on the Oak Fire Long Term Recovery Group. Pastor Mark notes "the number of unmet needs is overwhelming."

At the six local assistance centers we have staffed; we have served over 750 households with about \$70,000 in immediate aid. Our year-to-date 2022 investment in seven long-term recoveries is approaching \$215,000. Before the year is out, our total disaster response expense will be \$375,000 to \$400,000.

We would appreciate your help in replenishing our Disaster Response Fund with our November Communion offering. Virtual Early Response Team Training (ERT) November 5 and 6, 1 to 5 p.m.

Training led by Leslie Carmichael occurs over two four-hour sessions via Zoom. Cost for participants is \$15 for the training manual, lanyard, T-shirt and ID badge that volunteers wear when serving in this capacity. As with all volunteer work, background check and abuse prevention training by Safe Gatherings is required, with that cost covered by SRVUMC. Your spiritual gifts will deliver the caring, Christian presence in the aftermath of disaster, when "first response" has already arrived.
