#### **Fireside Room**

What are the great global policy decisions facing the US and how should Christians respond? Our church will hold a series of six weekly discussions on critical global issues using a guide prepared by the Foreign Policy Association (FPA). This program is part of an annual, nationwide program, whereby groups of concerned citizens throughout the U.S. will discuss why the issues are important and why we should be concerned.

March 5—China and the US. For the past ten years, the United States and China have been locked in a competition for who has the greatest global influence. One major point of contention is the status of Taiwanese sovereignty, which has become even more relevant recently with the possibility that Russia's invasion of Ukraine may prompt China to take similar action regarding Taiwan. How will the United States engage a China which is increasingly seeking to expand its sphere of influence? By David Lampton

March 12—Economic Warfare. Waging economic warfare consists of a variety of measures from implementing sanctions to fomenting labor strikes. Such tools are utilized by states to hinder their enemies, and in the case of the United States have been used as far back as the early 19th century. Since Russia invaded Ukraine in February 2022, economic warfare has been the main means for the west to challenge Russia. How effective will these sanctions be at convincing Russia to cease its war? By Jonathan Chanis

March 19—Global Famine. Fears of global food shortages have followed Russia's invasion of Ukraine, which has disrupted grain shipments from the major grain producer. But what about countries and regions that were suffering before this impending shortage? How is famine defined, and how is it different from simple food shortages? What if any remedies are there? By Daniel Maxwell

March 26—Climate Migration. As climate change accelerates and drought and rising sea levels become more common, millions of people in affected regions must uproot themselves and seek safety elsewhere. Who are these affected individuals, and how might the United States aid them, and be affected by the migration? By Karen Jacobsen




## Walk to Emmaus Men's Retreat April 27 to 30 Women's Retreat May 4 to 7


#### **Did You Know?**




## Between the Bookends




Richard Hough, *Captain James Cook*. James Cook, born in 1728, was the second son of a farm laborer living in Northern England. At an early age, James showed great ability and promise, so the lord of the manor financed James' education. Before he was seventeen, James Cook was apprenticed to a shop owner along the coast at Staiths. Cook fell in love with the sea and learned seafaring ways. He made his mark by doing an amazingly accurate job of surveying Newfoundland. Captain James Cook did three circumnavigations of the world for England. He was an expert navigator, firm but fair captain

and was respected by his crew. This book uses authentic excerpts from Cook's ships' log and journal along with journals from other ship members. Maps and illustrations of his voyages also appear. Most of his maps are still quite accurate because he was that good. Cook's name appears mainly in areas of New Zealand, South Sea islands and Hawaii.



Van Pelt, Shelby, Remarkably Bright Creatures. This is a story of friendship, of living with loss, of mystery and of problem solving. The small town of Sowell Bay, a fictional town on Puget Sound, provides the backdrop for a plethora of interesting characters who add immeasurably to the reader's pleasure. However, the stars of this table of Marcellus, an aging Pacific octopus, and Tova, a 70-year-old widow who works as a night cleaner at the aquarium where Marcellus in an exhibit. In what seems a completely natural sequence, the two become friends and over time are able to make life better for each oth-


er by solving mysteries and easing long-held sadnesses that have been part of their lives. Despite dealing with issues of loss, aging and loneliness, this book is uplifting and full of hope.



Hamilton, Adam. The Walk: Five Essential Practices of the Christian Life. Methodist minister Hamilton from Kansas City, MO, illustrates that we believers are meant to be "a living hallelujah." Our praise is not merely in words but from the heart and with every part of our being. He advocates that we worship and pray daily, individually and in community; that we study the Scriptures; and that we listen to Jesus' revelations by paying attention. Jesus not only read the Scriptures, He memorized them, prayed them, and lived them. Serve the Lord. Be open to divine interruptions. Give. We were created for gener-

osity and sharing. These are the essential practices for Christian living.

#### **UMCOR Response to Earthquakes in Turkey and Syria**

**ATLANTA (February 9, 2023)** – A 7.8 magnitude earthquake struck southern Turkey at 4:17 a.m. on Monday, Feb. 6, 2023, the most powerful earthquake recorded since 1939. In the hours that followed, at least 78 aftershocks were reported, followed by a second earthquake of 7.5 magnitude.

The earthquake and aftershocks also impacted northwest Syria, where 4.1 million people depend on humanitarian assistance. Syrian communities, many of them women and children, are simultaneously facing an ongoing cholera outbreak and extreme winter weather, including heavy rain and snow.

Thousands have been killed in both countries, and deaths continue to rise as rescue crews seek survivors in collapsed buildings. The humanitarian response is struggling to ramp up to meet the need among the devastation and winter weather.

UMCOR's longstanding humanitarian partner, International Blue Crescent (IBC), has multiple offices and project sites in Turkey. In IBC offices, people fill the halls as they seek shelter, warmth, and a hot meal. With the devastating damage to roads, transport and infrastructure, IBC has received hundreds of families in its Kilis Community Center for shelter, warm items, and hot meals since the first hours Monday morning. Kilis is serving as a major hub for coordination and relief efforts, including for cross

-border response into Syria.

UMCOR has released initial solidarity grants to IBC and Forum for Development Culture and Dialogue (working in Syria) to help provide tents, heaters, blankets, warm clothes, ready to eat meals and first aid kits to those who have been displaced.

UMCOR staff members are also in touch with other partners in the region. Additional updates will be provided as more information becomes available.





The Crayon Initiative manufactures new crayons from discarded ones collected at events like ours. These new crayons have a triangle shape, so they are easy to hold and don't roll off hospital trays. Dear SRVUMC,

On behalf of the many disaster survivors who will benefit from your generous donation of fifty cleaning buckets, THANK YOU! They are a sorely needed investment in our future disaster response.



January was a challenging month. The California-Nevada Disaster Response Ministry has deployed Early Response Teams five times since Christmas to assist with survivor relief. We addressed the Humboldt Earthquake and flooding in the Central Valley. We also staffed three survivor local assistance centers.

During all this we ran out of cleaning buckets. The buckets, such as donated by SRVUMC, are part of a package of assistance we offer—cleaning supplies, gift cards for immediate needs, hygiene kits and teams to help with cleanup, debris removal and immediate repairs. We served 400 households in the month from late December through late January. The financial and gifted supplies totaled about \$45,000.

You should be quite proud to be a part of the California-Nevada Conference. During 2022, the Conference responded to five wildfires and the Humboldt Earthquake. We participated in six long-term recoveries—all wildfires from 2018, 2020, 2021 and 2022. We assisted 900 households as part of these recoveries with direct survivor aid of over \$400,000.

You made a difference in so many lives.

On behalf of the California-Nevada Conference Disaster Response Ministry, thank you for your church's donations to UMCOR in 2022. We are grateful for the support of UMCOR's domestic and international disaster response and recovery.

Last year was so challenging. Among the many disasters around the world, UMCOR responded to major needs in Tonga, Haiti, and the Ukraine. In the United States, aid went to help in Florida for Hurricane Ian, flooding and tornadoes in the South and to wildfires in the Western states.

Here in California, an UMCOR grant for the 2017 wildfires funded survivor recovery assistance for several years. UMCOR is a continuing partner for 2023, matching our Conference funds, towards the ongoing recovery from the 2018 Camp Fire in Paradise. And lastly, UMCOR grants are supplementing Conference monies for survivor assistance for the 2021 Caldor and Dixie Fires.

We are appreciative of UMCOR monies in that they extend the generous donations from our church-

UMCOR Sunday is an opportunity to celebrate and support the missions and outreach of the United Methodist Church. This special offering is how UMCOR funds their core operations. That way, when we give to a specific need, such as the earthquake in Turkey and Syria, 100% goes directly to that need. None of those donations go to operate UMCOR. (See Page 9 for more information on the Turkey and Syria relief effort.)

The United Methodist Committee on Relief, known as UMCOR, is the humanitarian aid and development arm of our denomination. It operates in four major areas:

- Relief, such as emergency food and supplies in times of famine, drought, and geopolitical crisis
- **Disaster Response**, immediate and long-term support for natural disasters
- **Sustainable Development**, programs focused on areas such as clean water, sanitation, food security, climate change and global migration
- And Global Health, education, and programs for priorities such as eliminating malaria.

Examples of UMCOR's impact this past year include:

- Relief work in the Ukraine
- Disaster responses in Tonga and Haiti
- Recovery from Hurricane Ian in Florida
- Tornado recoveries in the southern states
- Refugee resettlement

Please make your checks payable to SRVUMC, but put "Communion" in the memo line. This allows the church office to send a combined check to UMCOR and track donations.

Closer to home, we are grateful for UMCOR's commitment to addressing the legacy of California wildfires. Since 2017, UMCOR has provided \$1.7 million dollars for wildfire recovery. They just sent a \$10,000 grant in January to help Central Valley flooding survivors. Much of this funding is then matched by our Conference Disaster Response Fund.

Acknowledging the impact UMCOR has, California-Nevada churches donated \$628,000 to UMCOR in 2022. All of this went directly to U.S. and International programs. What an amazing commitment to the difference UMCOR has in our world!


