Our Church History, The Very Beginning (1958 to 1961) By Carole Johnson

A March 2007 Valley Messenger article was written as a year-long preparation for the celebration of our Alamo/San Ramon Valley founding as a church. That article described the original campus plan, and its details offer a sense of how the church campus as changed over the decades.

The first worship service in the new building was on January 5, 1958. That first unit, in the northwest corner of present complex, consisted of a chapel and social hall (our present Justice Building Fireside Room, kitchen and storage areas), basement, minister's office, church office, kitchen, three classrooms (now church offices and conference room), and two restrooms. The church office is now a library, along with a former hallway. The kitchen is now the open breezeway and senior pastor's office.

The new church community grew rapidly, and the second unit was built the summer of 1958 with a multipurpose room (now Lamm Hall), three classrooms (now Calvin, Wycliffe Rooms and two storage areas) and two restrooms. The Sanctuary was dedicated in 1961.

Alamo Today & Danville Today News published "Valley Vignette: Alamo Grammar Schools Over the Years" by Beverly Lane in March 2023. Lane tells us: "From 1958-59 Alamo School had so many students that rooms were rented at the Methodist Church to accommodate the growth." Our own San Ramon Valley United Methodist Church was that church. Those were the Calvin and Wycliffe Rooms, now used by our Methodist Preschool. Alice Reynolds, an early church member, was the teacher, and daughter Nancy Reynolds was one of the students. The San Ramon Valley Unified School District was founded in 1964 and now has 36 school sites.

In the Pew: Carole Johnson

Carole Johnson is an encyclopedia of knowledge about church history. If you are new here and have a chance to say hello, then definitely introduce yourself. Five minutes talking to Carole means learning something about SRVUMC for at least four of them...although no one talks with Carole for just five minutes. She has written some other tidbits of church history for the newsletter over the years, too, so there is more where the above article came from. Carole Johnson, Jerry Ricker, and John

Green have helped me check the Celebrations page for years, too—help I begged from them years ago when I was too new to know most of our congregation.

On a personal note, Carole Johnson and her husband, Don, were among the first people to welcome me to San Ramon Valley UMC and make me feel like I could fit in here. Years later, people like Carole who made SRVUMC a soft place to land for me are still special to me. —Editor

New Monument Signs


The Trustees are pleased to report that we're getting new signs for the front of the church! This project started in November 2022, when Johnny and Donna Johnston's daughter and son-in-law, Cecily and Vic Karpenko, made a very significant financial commitment to replace our old, out-of-date signs with fresh, welcoming ones. We received additional funding from the church council to make this possible. Construction starts May 22. We expect it will take one to two weeks.

The entire board of trustees supported the project with extra involvement from Anita Weir-Ball. Additional special thanks to Rob Rudow, who joined our sign team as a consultant. Rob spent several years as owner and manager of a major sign products company. Many thanks to Bob Baker, who helped us secure approval from the county.

Our new monument signs do a much better job of communicating that we are a Reconciling Church that welcomes all. When completed, they will replace our two old monument signs, the temporary Korean church sign and the preschool sign. Additional temporary banner frames are being fabricated to support two key announcements at a time, such as Vacation Bible School and Trunk or Treat.

Dear Friends and Members of California-Nevada Conference,

Greetings from Chicago. I'm writing to you having gathered for the first in-person Council of Bishops since 2019.

During this time, an update in relation to Bishop Minerva Carcaño of the San Francisco Episcopal Area of The United Methodist Church was made available. I want to make you aware of this latest development.

The Committee on Investigation of the Western Jurisdiction has completed its work regarding complaints related to Bishop Carcaño. They have identified five charges per Paragraph 2702.1, and have assigned a bill of charges for trial. As the process moves ahead, her suspension from episcopal responsibilities will remain in effect. I encourage you to read the official full statement on our website.

In recent days and weeks, many open letters have been circulated, expressing a diversity of perspectives and feelings about the process. This announcement will also elicit a diversity of perspectives and feelings that can result in further division and hurt. I would encourage all of us to pull together as the body of Christ in the California-Nevada Annual Conference. If you can, talk to each other, pray for each other (especially those whose understanding and perspective is different from yours), and love one another (the commandment that Jesus gave us to love was not just for those who see things our way).

Let me say that it has been my honor to serve as your interim bishop. The Western Jurisdiction College of Bishops has asked me to continue in this role until a final resolution (just resolution or trial) has been reached. This is not a task I take lightly. I promise to continue to prayerfully and faithfully serve the California-Nevada Conference during this time.

As we navigate this difficult season, draw strength in knowing that the United Methodist community is praying for you. Likewise, your continued prayers are appreciated for all involved including the California-Nevada Annual Conference and Western Jurisdiction members, the complainants and Bishop Carcaño. I'll be in touch as updates are available. For now, please know that I'm praying for and with you.

Let me leave you with Paul's benediction to the church in Rome:


May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that you may abound in hope by the power of the Holy Spirit. (Romans 15:13, NRSVUE)



To Walk the Walk, Ten Years Later

Still Finding Peace at the Labyrinth Dedicated to Will Schramm

Labyrinths have been constructed around the world in all cultures, and have long been used as tools for meditation, centering, and healing. Some see the labyrinth as a metaphor for life's journey. Some people walk with a question on their mind. Some walk in celebration of a life event. Others walk just to slow down and take time out from a busy life. Some come to find strength to take the next step. Many come during times of grief and loss. Instead of worrying about past and future, you may find yourself immersed in the peaceful present.

The labyrinth dedicated to Will Schramm sits behind the Magee House in a quiet and peaceful corner of Hap Magee Park. An oak tree canopy provides the labyrinth with dappled shade, and the creek nearby brings the calming sounds of water. The idea for this labyrinth began after the death of 24-year-old Will Schramm. Shortly before his death in an automobile accident, Will had begun walking a labyrinth and shared this ancient practice with his friends. This labyrinth is a gift from the family and friends of Will Schramm and the San Ramon Valley United Methodist Church.

The Beginning

The labyrinth is the result of two years of preparation, presentations to and approvals from the Danville Parks and Leisure Commission, the Danville Arts Commission, the Alamo Municipal Advisory Council (MAC), The San Ramon Valley United Methodist Church Administrative Board and the Danville Town Council. Substantial funds had been received from memorial gifts. Under the direction of the Hap Magee Labyrinth Committee, a series of fundraisers were held during July and August of 2014: the yoga on the labyrinth class, the candlelight labyrinth walk, and the Will Schramm Memorial Golf Tournament and Auction.

In late January 2014, the site was excavated and a concrete ring was poured. Base rock was installed

within the concrete ring. On Sunday, February 8, 2015, the groundbreaking ceremony was held. As part of this ceremony, participants were invited to write a special message, prayer or name of a loved one on a river rock. These rocks were placed in the base and became a part of the labyrinth's foundation.

The labyrinth officially opened on May 31, 2015, with a dedication and opening ceremony as family, friends, church members and the community gathered around the labyrinth. The ceremony opened with words from Tom and Dory Schramm. Pastor Ron Dunn led everyone in a responsive reading.

Rev. Kathi McShane invited guests to write—on special dissolving paper—a blessing, a hope, or a prayer for the well-being of those who walk the stones of the labyrinth. These paper strips were placed in a bowl of water. The messages written on the paper dissolved into the water along with the paper. The water and these symbolic blessings were poured onto the center rosette of the labyrinth. Read more about the **Dedication and Opening Ceremony**.

Walking the Labyrinth Today

The labyrinth is open during park hours, and you can find some time to introduce yourself to this ancient, meditative practice.

- There is no right or wrong way to walk a labyrinth. Use the labyrinth in any way that meets your needs while being respectful of others also walking.
- More than one person can walk the labyrinth at a time. Those going in will meet those coming
 out. Pass others, or allow others to pass you, simply by moving aside. Do what feels natural.
- The labyrinth is not a maze. There is only one path, so there are no tricks to it and no dead ends. It is not designed for you to get lost. If you lose your way in, you will end up back at the entrance. If you lose your way out, you will end up back at the center. Simply start over.
- When you reach the center, stay as long as you like. Then, return following the same path out of the center.
- Children enjoy the labyrinth. If others are walking, it's appreciated if parents supervise their young

- children so all may enjoy the meditative aspects of the walk.
- Labyrinth walks can be used to celebrate rites of passage, mark joyful or solemn occasions, or simply to find a moment of peace. Found in many cultures, the labyrinth is a meditative tool that invites each of us to turn our walking and wandering into pilgrimage.


Between the Bookends

In March, women who contributed to the history of our country were honored. The library committee has included another woman, not from America, but whose influence helped women here.






When there was a dire need for gas masks, she designed a campaign enlisting housewives to make them with equal breaks for men and women. When more men needed for battle, she encouraged Winston to appeal to women to work in factories, farms, offices, etc. She

herself would go atop buildings to watch where bombs were landing. She truly was a forerunner for all women's rights and opportunities in many areas. Other books by Marie Benedict which tell about the accomplishments of women are: The Other Einstein, Carnegie's Maid, and The Only Woman in the Room. Churches Helping Churches: SRVUMC Completes Pittsburg Parsonage Renovation

The Cal-Nev Conference has a tradition of providing mission teams to fellow churches that need help to complete repairs or maintenance. One such project, renovating the Pittsburg UMC parsonage, was just completed by our church, teamed with Asbury UMC in Livermore.

The current pastor, Adi Nabou, has been commuting from Santa Rosa to serve this church, an ugly commute on the best of days. She will now be able to live in the parsonage adjacent to the church. Our church and Asbury combined forces to fund and complete this work.

As Oneda Turner, a key leader at Pittsburg UMC, said "Your willingness to give your time, talents and financial resources to this project is a testament to the strength of our United Methodist connection and spirit of service that we embody as a Christian community." This renovation included the repairs and updates to make the house functional—a new kitchen, new flooring, bathroom repairs, painting the entire interior and other improvements. The total project required about 1200 hours at a cost of about \$14,500. It was a rewarding mission experience!

June Communion Offering: Helping Disaster Survivors

Our June Communion Offering funds survivor assistance from the recent floods in the Central Valley. The Cal-Nev Conference has responded to five flooding disasters in 2023. The unprecedented rains of the first part of the year caused widespread flooding.

The Pajaro River levee break caused by winter storms flooded the nearby farmworker community. Disasters like these destroy homes, businesses and possessions, but they also contaminate water needed for drinking and hygiene. According to Bob Lee, the response team leader, one home had nearly seven feet of water inundating it. Early response teams from the Cal-Nev Conference were assisting the people adjacent to the Pajaro River by March, offering nearly 400 hours of volunteer time gutting destroyed residences and \$15,000 in immediate aid. The Disaster Response Ministry assists with other regional disasters, like wildfires and earthquakes.

Bob Lee, from Los Altos UMC, will lead weekend repair teams on these dates: June 22 to 25, July 20 to 23, July 27 to 30, August 10 to 13, August 24 to 27, September 7 to 10 and September 21 to 24. There is work available for everyone. Each weekend team will be no more than six participants. . However, anyone can give financial resources to support disaster survivors as they face the heart-breaking tasks ahead of them. **Contact Bob at RLEE@carmlee.net for more information.**
