Stephen Ministry: Your Hurting Can Be Heard By Lisa Jancarik

Stephen Ministry is the one-to-one ministry of trained lay men and women who offer confidential, Christ-centered care to people who are hurting. In the four years since I finished my training as a Stephen minister, I've built some very meaningful relationships with women who needed me to listen with genuine interest. Often, we prayed together. Sometimes the tissues came out, but a surprising number of good laughs came out, too. The point of a weekly meeting with a Stephen minister isn't necessarily to cry for a solid hour unless that's what a care receiver needs to do for that visit. Our weekly hour together offers the relief of being heard, of having her struggle noticed and validated.

Please note, I'm referring to time spent with women because Stephen ministers are matched with care receivers who identify as the same gender. Because I am female, I've never had a male care receiver. My male counterparts in Stephen Ministry have men as care receivers.

Sometimes, well-meaning family or friends try too hard to "fix" a situation. A person might tell a Stephen minister something that might be provocative at the dinner table just to get it off his or her chest. Stephen ministers are trained not to try to find a solution because our care receivers don't need us to pile onto the avalanche of advice they may have already gotten. Our training materials say it best: We are the *care*-givers, but Christ is the *cure*-giver.

Tell your Stephen minister all about the worry that has you staring at the ceiling when you lie awake at night. People have told me lots of things, and all I'll say about any of it is that hurting—sometimes hurting badly—is not a unique experience, and Stephen ministers listen without judgment. That said, the confidentiality of our visits is crucial, and we take serious measures to honor it.

Ask about a Stephen minister if you are thinking you could benefit from someone to walk with you as you adapt to a long-term illness, grief, divorce, or a new (un)employment situation.

Talk with Pastor Sam or Stephen Ministry leader Al Banich about finding a Stephen minister.




The library cart will be available for choosing books, but no new books will be on offer. The committee is taking the summer to organize shelves and decide on new selections.



Paradise: Rebuilding From the Camp Fire By Steve Elliott

The most striking thing about this mission trip to Paradise was how extensive the recovery is. There is home construction everywhere and new businesses open. The recovery is clearly accelerating with much optimism in the air. It is so encouraging to see.

The Camp Fire, November 2018, was the deadliest and most destructive wildfire in California history. Tragically, 85 people died. The fire burned over 150,000 acres and more than 15,000 homes. The towns of Paradise, Concow and Magalia were largely destroyed.

After a massive two-year cleanup and debris removal, rebuilding began in earnest in early 2021. Volunteer organizations were permitted to scale up efforts to assist low-income survivors with construction of new homes. One such organization is Hope Crisis Response Network (HCRN). At present, HCRN has ten homes under construction. We have been working with HCRN on wildfire recoveries for over five years.

Our June 2023 Mission Team was the second United Methodist Team this year. Glenwood Springs UMC from Colorado, Community UMC and Huntington Beach and Santa Rosa UMC will follow up our efforts. Our team included Asbury UMC in Livermore, San Ramon Valley UMC in Alamo, Lynnewood UMC in Pleasanton, El Dorado County Federated Church in Placerville, and Los Altos UMC.

We worked on three homes, doing interior and exterior painting and installing flooring, baseboard, trim, and doors.

Our clients, Fred, Don and Eddy were all fire survivors. Fred and Don live in trailers on their property as their home is being built. Eddy has been staying in a modest motel since the fire. They are so ready to have a new home!

Each day was collectively rewarding work. We enjoyed the shared comradery and sense of purpose in helping wildfire survivors. We also enjoyed evenings back at the dorm. We reflected on each day, shared devotional moments, and laughed at stories told.

Mission trips like this one are a unique blend of Christian love in action and a week-long small group experience. Tired by the end of the trip, we nonetheless came back savoring what it means to live a ministry of presence in helping survivors of a horrific wildfire.

Pajaro Flooding Recovery

The first part of 2023 was one of the wettest periods on record in California. The result was wide-spread flooding in many parts of Northern California. The California-Nevada Conference responded with relief volunteers and financial assistance to survivors in several areas, one of which was the town of Pajaro, in Monterey County. Pajaro is home to many low-income farmworkers.

We are now gearing up to return to assist with repairs to flooded homes. This effort will take several months of focused effort. The Cal-Nev Conference is one of several non-profits planning to participate in this recovery.

The remaining dates for the summer include:

- August 24 to 27
- September 7 to 10
- September 21 to 24

There is work available for everyone. Each weekend team will be no more than six participants. We have arranged a place to stay and have set up meal arrangements, tools and related details. Travel is on Thursday night, returning by Sunday evening.

Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano

Started in 1975 as an emergency food service, the Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano provides ongoing nutritional support throughout the region together with partner agencies and programs like <u>Feeding America</u> and <u>California Association of Food Banks</u>. Not only do they favor whole-



some items like whole-grain, high-protein or low-sodium alternatives, but they also offer budget-friendly recipes as suggestions for using the available ingredients in nutritious and tasty ways. A Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano <u>press release</u> dated March 17, 2021, reviewed the organization's swift response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The number of clients served ballooned from 176,000 per month to 260,000 per month during this worldwide crisis. To serve this enormous spike in clients, the organization reimagined its model to include drive-through and even home delivery. It quadrupled its food purchasing, logged volunteer hours equivalent to 52 full-time staff and, in the early days of sheltering place, brought in the National Guard to pack and sort boxes of produce and other foodstuffs.

According to its website, the Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano feeds one in six area residents. In its inaugural year of 1975, the food bank was a network of fifteen local food pantries. Together, they distributed 36,000 pounds of food. Today, the Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano distributes more than that in a single day of operation.

Ninety-seven cents of every dollar donated to the food bank directly supports food programs. Through Feeding America, the organization conducts grocery recovery programs with over one hundred retailers, including Target, Costco and Safeway. The remarkable sourcing ability means that the Food Bank is able to provide two meals for \$1. Food Bank of Contra Costa and Solano is rated as a four-star charity for its transparency and accountability by charitynavigator.org.
