Expansion and Excitement in SRVUMC's Social Media and Online Worship By Sarah Stribling



It is summer but social media is not taking a vacation! There has been increased activity on Facebook, YouTube, and the online church campus. Now, we are also expanding our online presence into Instagram. Over the past 90 days, our Facebook reach has increased 106%, and we have seen followers increase 433%, a gain of 16 total followers. Page Likes are up 233%, and our page is seeing twice the number of visitors. In the same time period, the number of Facebook posts has decreased by 20%. This drop is attributable to the

change in season (summer typically offers fewer church activities than other times of year) and also signals an intentional shift in social media strategy from quantity (a new post every day) to quality (a few well-thought-out posts) going forward. In the past 90 days, the top five social media posts have included photos of staff as we said goodbye to Pastor Kim and Pastor Andrew and welcomed Pastor Sam. In terms of reach, a post promoting our preschool was our most successful. It used a stock photo and was seen by 573 people. Success here underlines the important role photos play in increasing online engagement. Going forward, your Director of Social Media and Online Ministries will be more intentional about incorporating photos from recent church activities (celebrating Vacation Bible School volunteers, Grill and Chill, etc.) along with inspirational and informative posts.



Our YouTube channel is also seeing increased activity. Over the past 90 days, our channel has gained 25 new subscribers, an increase of 150%. We currently have 152 subscribers. Videos have received 54% more views, and our watch time has increased 48%. Top videos during this time include Nadia's rendition of "Precious Lord, Take My Hand", a highlight reel from one of Pastor Sam's sermons, a reel from this writer's on-demand video class on spiritual practices, and two worship services. These top videos are comprised of long-form videos, song-length musical excerpts from worship, and short-form reels/shorts. Employing such diverse video forms ensures we are creating content that reaches returning viewers as well as new viewers. Returning viewers are more likely to watch our long-form videos while new viewers are more likely to watch reels and musical excerpts. For example, of all the people who watched the short-from Pastor Sam's sermon on "God's Vision for Community", 89%

were not channel subscribers. Instead, 83% of the views derived from YouTube's Shorts feed. This contrasts with the worship video "God's Vision for Community" in which 22% of viewers subscribe to our channel. Thirty-five percent of views came via the church website and 21% came from exploring our channel. Our worship videos retain viewers better than shorts and musical excerpts.

Church Center has seen more activity lately because people are able to sign up online for various upcoming events. There were three Grill and Chills this year, and the first and last Grill and Chill sold out. There were 60 and 70 online signups, respectively. This writer worked with the person in charge of Grill and Chill to ensure the registration process went as smoothly as possible. People also have had

the opportunity to sign up to volunteer at the food bank. All fifteen slots for that event are currently filled.

This writer is excited to announce that SRVUMC's online presence is expanding into Instagram! Pastor Sam is working to link the church Facebook account with the church Instagram account. This platform expands our reach into a slightly younger demographic than Facebook and emphasizes graphics and short form videos (reels). Follow us @sanramonvalleyumc!

Hello September!...Welcome fall! Here are a few new books that readers will welcome.




Hammer, Heather Leslie. Shetland Mist: A Shetland Family in the Methodist Movement. The author pastored here at SRVUMC between 2006 and 2009. Her fictionalized account of the lives of her forebearers in the Shetland Islands during the 1800s centers on Ann Leslie. With her husband and their family of nine children, Leslie ekes out a living from the rocky land and the often treacherous sea. Life is precarious and sometimes tragic, but Hammer does not shy away from its grave difficulties. However, she shows Ann as a resilient and steadfast wife, mother and friend who is grateful for her

faith community and for the joys she can share with family and friends. Numerous heartfelt prayers allow the reader to share in the depths of her faith.



Benedict, Marie. *The Personal Librarian*. Infamous financier J.P. Morgan is constructing a library next to his home in New York City. He needs a librarian who can catalog his priceless collection of artwork, manuscripts, books and artifacts. His nephew suggests Belle da Costa Greene because he knows of her work at Princeton University and the New York Public Library. After her interview with the boisterous Morgan, she is hired. She promises to make his Pierpoint Morgan Library incomparable and to acquire Caxton's *Le Morte d'Arthur*, printed in 1485. However, her dilemma is that she isn't as

white as she pretends to be: she is a Black woman, claiming that her grandmother is Portuguese. She also goes by the name her mother has chosen for her to work in a white man's world.



Grisham, John. Sparring Partners. Discover this well-known author's first collection of novellas. In one, a young lawyer is trying desperately to get his teenage client exonerated for a murder he didn't commit. This boy is sentenced to die, and the reader anxiously awaits the outcome of the attorney's efforts. In the next novella, two brothers are sparring partners in their father's law firm. They have been competitive all of their lives, including college. Although they occupy the same building, they have completely divided the space in half. This novella is a people's story, as are the other two. You de-

cide which is the best one: "The Homecoming" (reprisal of the character Jake Brigance), "Strawberry Moon" (about the young convict), or "Sparring Partners."

Here are some other great titles we haven't mentioned in a while: The Aloha Quilt, Strawberry Short-cake Mystery, The Tortilla Curtain, The Power of One, Whistling Past the Graveyard, Joy for Beginners

ARC Volunteer Treasurer, keeps the books, sends out monthly invoices, and prepares the monthly financial reports. **Lyn Arscott** coordinates the volunteers who monitor the public sessions on week-day mornings for pickleball and badminton.

Community Impact

There is a high demand for recreational space in our community, so our Activity and Recreation Center (ARC) provides an excellent opportunity to reach out to the community and provide a safe and hospitable place for exercise and fellowship for adults and youth. After school hours, the ARC is alive every day with dozens of excited boys and girls playing basketball, volleyball or indoor soccer. The local youth organizations that use our gym have more than 500 youth involved in their sports. Adults play pickleball and badminton in the mornings during school hours, and we have more than 500 names on our email list of members of the community who have used the ARC. We make an impact in our community by our presence and our deeds.

Rise Against Hunger

This month's Communion offering supports the materials for the upcoming Rise Against Hunger packing event.

Rise Against Hunger began in 1998 as Stop Hunger Now! and is based in Raleigh, N.C. Since its original initiatives in distributing nutritious meals to the starving, this organization has broadened its efforts to improve food security for people worldwide. Rise Against Hunger trains farmers and families in agricultural methods and business skills. Many of these small-scale, local farmers provide the vegetables that are dehydrated for the Rise Against Hunger meals. Furthermore, the organization also works with in-country partners in the wake of disaster to provide crisis relief. Since 2005, volunteers have packaged over 540 million meals.

The Rise Against Hunger <u>website</u> reports distributing over 67.6 million meals in 2022 in 38 countries. Volunteers packed 44.5 million meals last year, according to the group's <u>2022 Impact Report</u>.

At San Ramon Valley UMC, we love these annual meal-packing events. This short mission opportunity of a few hours is great for entire families to do together. Our September communion offering funds dehydrated rice or soy meal, dehydrated vegetables, and spices along with 23 essential vitamins and minerals. As our volunteers know, a group of 40 to 50 volunteers can pack 10,000 meals in about two hours!
