## **A Common Thread**

Many wonderful experiences have come my way since joining our church a couple of handfuls of years ago, and I would like to share one of my most inspirational.

It began quietly enough while Linda and I attended the first Disciple I class in 1997. During this particular period of study, we were to perform some type of outreach. There were several choices available, and I chose to visit with a charter member of our congregation. I had my mind on a particular individual, but when I spoke with John Corson, he suggested another. God spoke to me through John, as I discovered a week later when I introduced myself to Lorraine Jacoby.

I visited with Lorraine at her Diablo Lodge residence several times. I was drawn back after our first visit because so much of my history had been following in her footsteps, and I hadn't even known her. As we began talking, both of us a little nervous, we discovered these common life events:

- Each growing up in Oakland and living on Fruitvale Avenue in our youth
- Each moving to Manila Avenue and attending Oakland Tech high school
- Each working on the Scribe, the high school newspaper
- Each running to Fenton's Creamery for shakes whenever we could

So, while I was soaking up shakes as a teenager in the mid-1950s, Lorraine and Wilbur Jacoby joined with 31 other adults in the Walnut Creek and San Ramon Valley area to build our church, here, where we sit and pray today.

I admired this woman as she told me about this endeavor. She told me that with only 33 adults, and so many arrangements, plans, grunt work, and on and on to make this happen, the adults could not be too selective in their involvement. They had to accept assignments even if not familiar with them. They learned; they worked together; they accomplished. These 33 folks gave an abundance of all three—time, talent, and treasure.

Forty years after the church was built, here I followed again with my angel, Linda, placing my feet where Lorraine's and Wilbur's were; where Daphne and Dale Kimbell's are.

So, I think of the efforts supplied by these 33 adults and how they worked for God. I hope that in another fifty years, the congregation might look back on our work during our First 50 Years, and admire


## Sam Hawk on Volunteering in the AV Loft

Many of you already know Sam Hawk, our facilities manager and AV director. The Hawk family joined SRVUMC in 2007, and members may know Sam's sister, Katie, and his mother, Teri Hawk.

Sam's interest in audiovisual equipment, particularly sound equipment, goes as far back as his teens, when he assisted with youth services. Much of his experience since then has been informed by use of other gear outside of the church setting, but he learned the most about the church's updated system by working with Jeff Lang. Sam responds here to some common reasons people might not volunteer.

"I can't learn to use all that!" – There's not a lot to learn to be helpful. For one thing, volunteers aren't expected to operate all—or even most!—of what looks like NASA mission control at first glance. Learn more if you like. Besides, Sam points out, he is still learning, too, every time he has to trouble-shoot a problem.

"What if I get stuck up there myself?" – "You will not," says Sam, emphatically. Often both Sam and Jeff Lang are present, but at least one experienced person will always be in the loft. Plus, volunteers generally work in groups of two with Sam or Jeff nearby.

"What if I mess up?" - Sam points out that goofs happen all the time, and that they are made by experienced people. Videos don't launch. Hymn subtitles aren't in time. Microphones reverberate. It's not

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a big deal, and perhaps you and even the team will learn something from the incident.

Among the most notable mistakes Sam can remember was during a Chorale concert when he dimmed the house lights as an alert for the audience to take their seats...and the show started immediately!

"What if I break/delete something?" – Sam assures any potential volunteer that they won't be put in a position to do that. He laughed and added, "You can't delete the Bible; anything else is fine."

Sam brings his good nature with him into the loft. Together, he and Jeff create a mood that is relaxed but not careless. Overall, the goal with SRVUMC's audiovisual team is to make sure everyone can see and hear what the worship service has to offer, no matter where they are—in the Sanctuary or online.

Ideally, a Sunday team would consist of two volunteers with Sam or Jeff nearby, and these teams of two would rotate about monthly. If you can't find a partner, volunteer anyway, and solo volunteers can be paired.



## Technology in Transition By Sarah Stribling

We are a church in transition in terms of staffing, technology, and branding. Here are some key updates about online tools and how we are using them at SRVUMC.

### Friday Memo Transitions to Sarah

Laura Roy, beloved director of family ministries becomes our office manager starting November 1. Among many other tasks, Laura has been in charge of the Friday Memo. With her transition, Pastor Sam and the communications team have decided that it makes sense to transfer responsibility for the Friday Memo to this writer. To further support and simplify the Memo's updated design, headlines in the Memo will include links to the church website instead of landing pages. This lessens the number of items a reader needs to click through to find the information they are seeking.

## **Keep the Photos Coming!**

The SRVUMC photo repository continues to grow, thanks to members of the congregation taking photos of church activities and events. Some of these photos now appear on the reorganized and revamped church website. The Music Ministry page is a prime example. A member of the church choir graciously took photos during choir rehearsal. These have been uploaded to a digital library shared across our media outlets, allowing a handful of these photos to appear in the Friday Memo,



Messenger, and church website. Claudia Artiga also took photos of the children's Music Makers recent performance during Sunday worship. One of her photos will appear in a social media post. ## **Church Center Workshops**

Michelle Cooke and this writer finished conducting two Church Center workshops earlier this month. Small group leaders and committee leaders gathered after worship to learn basic features of Church Center and how to put their group on Church Center. Fifteen people attended the workshops in total. In terms of adding relatively large numbers of members to a group on Church Center, it is easier and faster for group leaders to email their list of group members Sarah Stribling (<a href="mailto:stribling@srvumc.org">stribling@srvumc.org</a>)

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who can add them to their respective group(s). As a Church Center administrator, Sarah can simply add members. Once this has been done, and a group is open to accepting new members, interested individuals can find groups on Church Center and request to join. In terms of workshop follow up, attendees completed a survey so future workshops can be improved. Attendees have a handle on what Church Center does. Follow up continues.

Members of the congregation have been signing up for church events on the Registrations module of Planning Center. Signups have included an interfaith blood drive and an opportunity to serve at White Pony Express. [This] month, women will be able to sign up for the Women's Retreat (more about the Women's Retreat on Page 8).

### **Transitions in Branding**

SRVUMC may be ready for a rebranding in the coming months. The new year may be an excellent opportunity to clarify who we are as a church, what this church is about, what our discipleship process entails, and what we want to accomplish as a church. Previous discipleship pathway work that employed the metaphor of a trail to elucidate our relationship with God and each other has not borne fruit. Aside from a handful of people, most people sitting in the pews do not understand how the trail works. We seek to create something more effective.

## **Wesley Center**

## Carole Johnson Reflects on a Building Central to Church Activity

The present Wesley Center is sited where Wesley Hall, the previous building sat until its demolition in 2002. The center we have today spans 20,000 square feet and came at a cost of \$4 million. Its consecration as "Wesley Center"—named by congregational vote—was held November 23, 2003. That month's *Messenger* stated, "Think of all we can do with the new building." These facilities included:

- New fellowship hall, where coffee hour happens weekly after worship
- State-of-the-art kitchen (today known as the Lee and Mary Roush Kitchen), where fellowship meals are prepared, like the ones for UMeUs
- Large choir and bell choir rooms
- Youth meeting and recreation areas, including the small kitchen off the youth room
- Stephen Ministry/Adult education room
- Separate offices for the youth and music directors (today, Pastor Kim has his office upstairs)
- Sunday school room
- Nicely appointed restrooms with shower facilities

Marge Wood created textile art banners depicting the ministry areas of our congregation with the figure of Jesus as the center. The banners are no longer on display in Wesley Center, but they represent the four-fold focus of the "A Vision Worth Keeping" theme: Invitation, Welcome, Integration (Discipleship) and Sending to Serve.

The Vision Campaign had direction from Joel Jung, Finance Committee Chair; Craig Caldwell and Dale Kimbell, Co-Chairs of Capital Fundraising; and John Green, Chair of the Campaign Follow-up. Wesley Center opened the door to major lecture and discussion events and to community concerts.








Camino Island, John Grisham. A departure from the crime novels of lawyers, criminals and courtrooms, Grisham brings us the FBI investigation of the theft of F. Scott Fitzgerald's valuable first writing manuscripts. A young lady, an aspiring author, resides on Camino Island for the summer. The FBI approaches her to assist with the case. She enjoys going to the local bookstore, owned by a man suspected to have the manuscripts. FBI agents have had the store under surveillance and have noted her frequent visits. Will she become a sleuth for the FBI? Grisham gives us an interesting approach to solving crime.



Fever, Laurie Anderson. The author takes the reader back to the history of our country around the year 1793 to the bustling city of Philadelphia, where the yellow fever epidemic hit. The summer was an extremely hot, dry one, upon which mosquitoes, the carrier of the fever, thrive. The insects were vicious, biting everyone, everywhere. Lillian Boxfish Takes a Walk, Kathleen Rooney. It's New Year's Eve 1984 when 85-year-old Lillian Boxfish decides to walk to her friend's party in Manhattan. This is the story of her two-mile walk and her life in New York, from 1932 to her current walk. Lillian had been wildly successful writing jingle limericks for ads. Her marriage, child-rearing and writing career are all revealed in an enlightening way. Those of you who enjoy limericks will certainly find pleasure in this book.

## Introducing an Afghan Refugee Family By Lyn Arscott

Several members of our Church are helping an Afghan family settle in Danville. Amin and Laila Nayebi, their son, Basit (8), and their daughter, Yasna (4), escaped from Afghanistan after the Taliban took over in 2021. After a harrowing journey including five days' delay at the border, they finally entered Pakistan, where they spent the last two years waiting for visas to the U.S. Bill Small of Danville met them through a mutual friend and agreed to become their U.S. sponsor. He supported them during their time in Pakistan. They arrived here on September 22 and are now living with Bill indefinitely.

The Nayebi family waited for **two years** for visas to the United States. What have you wanted badly enough to wait two years for it?

Bill was aware that our church had previously sponsored refugee families, so he reached out to us. Already, Yasna has been enrolled in our Church's preschool and will start as soon has she receives the necessary medical clearances and vaccinations.

Laila and Amin speak English, and the children are learning it quickly. The family is anxious to make friends and become active in the greater East Bay community. Laila would love to meet other wom-

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en; learn how to use her new computer; and learn more about American family life. For ten years, Amin worked in Kabul for a Seattle-based NGO that ran the Afghan national Girls and Boys Scout programs. He is also an accomplished photographer. He would appreciate help in finding an appropriate job. And of course, Basit and Yasna would love playdates at Bill's house, a local park, or your place. Recently, Lyn Arscott was pleased to be able to take them to an Afghan market in Concord where Laila found familiar cooking ingredients.

## **Trinity Center**

This month's Communion offering supports the ongoing work of our partners in mission, Trinity Center of Walnut Creek. Trinity Center provides essential safety net services to vulnerable populations. This organization is non-residential, but it works to support people who need stable housing. Housing can be a significant hurdle to financial stability and wellness for people who have had nowhere to go. According to the <u>Trinity Center's website</u>, this local organization accomplished 82 housing placements in the past twelve months, with over 40,000 tracked services offered.

Historically, SRVUMC members have volunteered with the morning and lunchtime meals. However, Trinity Center also offers shower and laundry services and a volunteer-run clothing room. Clients can make use of a computer lab, a phone and a mail service.

During the months of December through April, 38 participants a warm evening meal and safe, dry shelter at the Walnut Creek National Guard Armory, a program heavily dependent on volunteer action.

Something you may not already know about Trinity Center: this organization offers a Transition Age Youth (TAY) program to support young adults aged 18 to 29 with their unique challenges in housing and food insecurity.

Member advocates at Trinity Center work to connect people with housing, employment, public benefits and wellness.
