Nearly 50 church members and friends attended the Women's Retreat February 2 – 4 at Villa del Mar in Santa Cruz, a beautiful venue perched on the cliffs overlooking the ocean. Our facilitator this year was Pastor Dan Sturdivant on the topic "Joy through the Back Door." Dan's premise was that the most profound and enduring joy any of us are likely to find arrives through failures, losses, and disappointments; in short, through grief.












Delaney, Sarah, Delaney, Elizabeth, Having Our Say. This book contains the actual words of two sisters who lived together all their lives and ived to be centenarians. Sadie was the older of the two while Bessie was two years younger. The story begins with their father who was born into slavery and was freed as a child. As a house slave, he was taught to read and write. After emancipation, he made his way to the big city, Raleigh, North Carolina. He was recruited as an Episcopalian minister where he served on a university campus. Both sisters were raised in good standing in their community. After Jim Crow laws passed, the whole family moved to Harlem in New York City. The sisters attended Columbia University. Bessie became a dentist and served her community for many years and Sadie taught high school science in NYC public schools. These professions were unheard of for women at the time, nevermind women of color. This story is filled with many anecdotes from their 100 years of life experience. A fascinating read.



Olson, Lynne, The Empress of the Nile. The 'Empress' of this book is French woman Christiane Desroches-Noblecourt who became enchanted with Egypt, its temples, pyramids, and artifacts as a child and who eventually became the driving force behind saving the temples of Abu Simbel for Egypt and for the world during the construction of the Aswan Dam. In between, she studied architecture, worked in the antiquities department of the Louvre, and became part of the World War II French Resistance. During her long career, she lectured, led digs, and wrote numerous books and articles about her work and studies. This book not only celebrates her many accomplishments as an Egyptologist but offers much of the historical background of the time in which she lived and worked. This is a fascinating, well written, and well researched book.



Benedict, Marie and Murray, Victoria, The First Ladies. When the authors chose The First Ladies as the title for their book, it could not have been more appropriate. Eleanor Roosevelt began her journey as the First Lady of New York when Franklin was governor. At that time, Mrs. Mary Bethune had already founded Bethune-Cookman College, the first college for Black students, and was appointed by President Hoover to work on the Commission on Child Welfare. Both ladies soon learned that part of the struggle to make change is to get the right change makers in place.

Mrs. Roosevelt soon experienced segregation laws when she invited Mrs. Bethune to have tea with her in the dining room of a prestigious hotel. That experience and other similar ones drew these two together to fight for equality for all.

When Franklin Roosevelt was running for president, Eleanor tried to convince Mary Bethune to help in his campaign, and in so doing he would then, in turn, attempt to change some of the absurd segregation laws. Mary deliberated because the Black population had always followed Lincoln's Republican Party. But since Hoover had <u>not</u> given any role of authority to the people of color he appointed, she accepted. Here again is another first for Mary as she, a Black woman, campaigned for Democrat Roosevelt. When Eleanor hosted the National Council for Negro Women, she and Mary stood together before the group and joined their gloved hands in a tight clasp. That was another first! At Franklin's second inaugural address, Eleanor saw more Black reporters and soldiers and felt she was seeing progress. She decided to visit Tuskegee, Alabama, and to have a tour of the Institute and training sites. Eleanor asked to meet the Chief Flight Instructor who had trained such outstanding pilots. It was Eleanor's influence that put the Tuskegee pilots in the air and into battle during WWII. The reader will find what outstanding accomplishments were made by her and other First Ladies.




Time to Review...

Results of Social Media Advertisement Astound

Over a period of 9 days from December 15th through December 24th 2023, our church ran a Facebook advertisement for our 3 Christmas Eve services. To this writer's knowledge, this was the church's first foray into the world of social media advertising. The budget for this ad was \$200. The actual cost of the ad ended up being \$169, finishing slightly under budget. Carefully targeting a local audience, parameters of the ad mandated that it only be shown to Facebook and Instagram users within a 5-mile radius of our church. This writer chose a 5-mile radius to include the population of San Ramon. The ad was shown to 26,427 people. Of the 54 who clicked the ad, 44 clicked the link and visited the church homepage.

The graph above shows the age and gender distribution results for the advertisement. It is remarkable because it defies expectations regarding gender and age demographics for our church in general. It is no secret that most of our church is over 65 years old. Yet the graph shows a regular bell curve in terms of age distribution, peaking at the 35–44-year-olds. The ad proved least effective among those over 65 (Facebook did not show the ad to those under 18). Moreover, our church is majority women at a ratio of roughly 4:3. The ad consistently proved most popular with males in nearly every age group. This writer looks forward to running another Facebook ad this Easter.

At the Church Council retreat in January, this writer presented a communications strategy plan along with quarterly goals. These quarterly goals included assembling a group that would regularly Like/Share our social media posts. Thus far this writer has recruited 6 people for this task. Another task has been to assemble a group that would host the livestream chat (continued on page 11)



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during Sunday worship each week. Ideally this writer would like to recruit 4 people to accomplish this so that no one would need to host more than once a month. So far, this writer has recruited 2 people. The facile nature of this task has been emphasized in Friday Memo announcements, Opportunities to Serve announcements during worship, phone calls to "regulars" who attend online worship, and congregants who enjoy reaching out to others. This writer has obtained copies of recent MissionInsite reports and looks forward to analyzing the data for clues to our target audience along with Pastor Sam and Director of Communications for the General Board of Church and Society, James Kang.

The new freezer and refrigerator walls are being manufactured in San Pablo and will be delivered to the new location by the time this article goes to print in late March, 2024.

White Pony Express has been coordinating with a contractor to finish some construction work. Thanks to a generous donation from Chevron, White Pony Express has obtained necessary furniture.

The new location will be safer because the additional space allows people to be separate from equipment. Staff and volun-

teers are in the process of optimizing workflows to improve food rescue operations.

Trinity Center Then and Now

Eight different groups from SRVUMC recently provided Friday evening meals at Trinity Center's seasonal winter shelter. This program, besides providing the evening meal, transports participants to the Walnut Creek Armory where they spend a comfortable, safe, and warm night instead of spending it on the streets. This year, Trinity Center is providing this safe shelter to around 15-25participants nightly from December through April.

Trinity Center provides services to the unhoused in our communities. Our church has been involved with this program for several years and it has been exciting to see it evolve. We became involved around 2010 when it was known as Fresh Start, a 3-day a week lunch program in a small parsonage on St. Paul's Episcopal Church grounds. In 2012 it rebranded as Trinity Center with the support of St. Paul's and many other entities. We served the Friday lunch, known as Food for Thought for around 60 participants for several years until the pandemic hit. This lunchtime program was initiated by Horace Crawford, Pastor Ron Dunn, and Dick Lam. Pastor Ron Dunn, Pastor Kim Risedorph, and some lay volunteers led spiritual discussions following the meal, hence the name. Many of us advocate Kitty Maffee, and a volunteer pose in participated in this lunch ministry.

Trinity Center now has a beautiful complex on Trinity Avenue next to St. Paul's Episcopal Church. It is home to Trinity Center and on the site is St. Paul's Towers, a housing unit with 44 low-income apartments. Many Trinity Center participants have qualified for these apartments.

Trinity Center now provides meals (hosted by Loaves & Fishes), showers, laundry, mail, and computer access. Much of their present focus is on removing barriers to stable housing through compassionate services, education, shelter, and advocacy through professional support counseling. Their daily attendance averages 68 per day in the daily program. Here is a link to Trinity Center Annual Report. It has complete information on this amazing service.



United Methodist Preschool is Buggin' Out!

Now that we are finally seeing the sun shining rather than the rain falling, we are looking forward to offering our Preschool children the opportunity to learn about *ladybugs*, among other insects. Most young children love ladybugs and are so excited when they find them on flowers and leaves during the spring and summer months. They seem to be attracted by their small size, round spots and bright shiny colors. Exploring ladybugs gives us the opportunity to learn about colors and symmetry through math and science.

The is so much to explore in the "world" of ladybugs. Like other insects, the ladybug has an exoskeleton made of a protein like the one that forms our hair and fingernails. Its body has three parts: head, thorax, and abdomen. We convey this information to children in a way they can understand. For example, we sing, "Head, Thorax, Abdomen" to the tune of the well loved children's song, "Head Shoulders, Knees and Toes."

Here are some fun facts about ladybugs:

- Ladybugs are insects that belong to the beetle family.
- The spots on a ladybug help protect them from predators by making them look unappetizing.
- Ladybugs are found all over the world, except Antarctica.
- Ladybugs are omnivores, they eat plants and other insects, particularly aphids.
- Ladybugs can fly as fast as 30 miles per hour.
- Ladybugs hibernate during the winter months which helps them to survive in colder climates.
- A single female ladybug can lay up to 1,000 eggs in her lifetime.
- When ladybugs fly, they beat their wings about 85 times per second.





Next Generation Ministry Waits for the Lord

Who likes to wait for something that they want now?! Not me, but I know that waiting is a part of life. Thankfully, I know that we don't have to wait on our own. The Holy Spirit is always with us and reminds us that we are made in God's image, a God who patiently waits for us as we stumble and sin on our earthly journey to get closer to Him. This month, our children's ministry will be focused on patience: the power of it, how to build that muscle, and God's presence through it all. We'll focus on the passage from Psalm 27:14: "Wait for the Lord. Be strong and don't lose hope. Wait for the Lord," and will try to commit it to memory as this month's memory verse.

Across the hall, the SRVUMC youth in grades 5-12 will be embarking on a new series called Unstoppable Acts that reminds students that Easter isn't the end of the story. In fact, it's really just the beginning! Over the course of the month, we'll explore three timeless truths from Jesus' last moments with His disciples: we can trust God's promises, that the Holy Spirit has the power to transform, and that we have a responsibility to share our stories. Some questions to ask your teen or preteen include:

- How difficult is it for you to trust someone when they give you a promise? What can we
 do to continue to build trust among our family?
- In the Bible, we see numerous instances of the Holy Spirit transforming peoples' lives. Is there anything about your life that you think the Holy Spirit might want to transform?
- If you were to share your "faith story" with someone else, what are the main ideas you'd want to include? What makes those details so special?"
